

ICE FROZEN IN  
RIVER PORTENDS  
COLDER WEATHER

Temperature as Low as  
Eleven Degrees Last  
Night—Ice Gradually  
Moves From River—  
No Snow Here.

The approach of the cold season was with a vengeance foretold when the St. John River across from this city was frozen over completely this morning, with at first little or no signs of moving out. The expanse of ice from shore to shore was a brilliant glare when the citizens arose this morning to go about their daily duties. The ice stayed in the river practically all day long, though in the afternoon at about two o'clock it was gradually moving out. It is expected that the ice will have completely run out before nightfall. The temperature last night was as low as eleven degrees, which is probably the lowest of the season.

The ice was still choked up at Camp Sans Souci this morning at about twelve o'clock but with the moderation of the weather around the noon hour and the melting rays of the sun, the ice will in all probability move at a much faster gait this afternoon.

Though the city of Fredericton has had a full share of cold windy weather, there is still no sign of snow in this locality. Other parts of the province, and particularly in the north have been visited with snowstorms of varying intensity. Some of these were of an inch while others saw a fall of more than four inches. The storm of course did not stay on, but the residents of those outlying districts, were made well aware of the impending winter. However, in this city there has been a decided scarcity of snow, which is rather usual. Past seasons have seen snowstorms here as early as the middle of October, while at yet there has not been more than a very slight flurry in this locality.

LIQUOR CONTROL  
LAW IS UPHELD  
AT OTTAWA

The Doherty Appeal  
Case Was Given a  
Short Shrift—Attorney  
General Baxter  
Not Called Upon.

An appeal to the full bench of the Supreme Court of Canada at Ottawa this morning in the case of John F. Doherty, proprietor of the Springhill Hotel, Kingsclear, York County, now serving a sentence of six months here for violation of the New Brunswick Liquor Control Act, was dismissed without the Court calling upon Hon. John B. M. Baxter, Premier and Attorney-General of New Brunswick, to present the Crown's reply to the application for release of the defendant under Habeas Corpus.

Given Short Shrift.

A telegram advising the result of the appeal was received at noon today by Chief Commissioner G. R. Fulton of the New Brunswick Liquor Control Board from Premier Baxter, who wired that the appeal was dismissed in fifteen minutes without his having been called upon. A few weeks ago Mr. Justice Mignault of the Supreme Court of Canada refused an application for release of the defendant.
