HYDRO DEVELOPMENT.

Hon. E. A. Reilly, Chairman of the New Brunswick Power Commission as the Moncton Times points out, announced recently that the operations for the year ended October 31st show the best financial returns of any year since the inauguration of the publicly owned hydro system. Nearly fifteen thousand users are now supplied and with other developments under way and projected New Brunswick will occupy a more important place in this respect. The last year was one of hydro expansion throughout the Dominion and it is an impressive fact that between the end of 1920 and 1927, a period of seven years, Canada's installed hydro-electric power capacity increased 95 per cent although its population increased only 7 per cent. We now have in Canada a total developed hydro electric power close to 5,000,000 horsepower, an amount which would require approximately 29,000,000 tons of coal per annum to generate. Another important fact is that the power developed represents only 11 per cent of the 43,000,000 available recorded horsepower in the Dominion. The capital invested in hydro-electric power development now amounts to about \$900,000,000.

It is recalled that when the Niagara development was planned a very eminent electrical engineer hired by interests in New York State published a big book containing valuable arguments and numerous statistics to show that the undertaking was bound to be a ghastly failure. Today it stands as a public utility almost without parallel in the world and the benefits conferred upon the province of Ontario have been immense.

It was the most enjoyable function of the kind the city has seen in years. the use of the public under restrictions. The outcome had been very satisfactory and had given the province the greatest amount of publicity as an angling resort. He told of four young Americans who had visited Fredericton last year and had afterwards made a fishing trip to the open water of the Restigouche. In addition to the ordinary expenses of the trip they had paid the government \$300 for angling permits. These young men had also made a fishing trip to the Miramichi. "There is certainly a big opportunity for developing the tourist industry in New Brunswick," said the Minister in conclusion.

Mr. E. C. Atkinson, M. P. P., also responded to the toast. He thought the council had shown excellent judgment in the selection of a Warden. Mr. Atkinson delivered a brief but vigorous address which was heartily applauded.

Ex Warden Whipple after complimenting Warden Seymour on his success as an entertainer, and paying tribute to his worth, called upon Coun. Douglass to lead in the singing of "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow." What is generally conceded to have been one of the most enjoyable Warden's dinners in the history of York County broke up shortly before one o'clock.

methods which have not been used elsewhere in the treatment of antimony ore for the retention of the valuable by-products as well as the production of the metal will be a feature. The present state of the antimony market and the usually strong world demand, make it urgent that the development at Lake George be proceeded with as rapidly as possible and a complete plant will be installed just as soon as the deeds of the property have been turned over in compliance with the transfer agreements. It is the intention to erect a concentration plant and later a smelter will be established.
