## SEAGOING CAT SPEARS FISH FOR THE CREW

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 5.—The interesting story of a seafaring kitty named Jenny, who grabs flying fish out of the air for the officers' mess on the good ship Cokesit of the Roosevelt Line, is being told here by Thomas A. Hewson, one of Washington's famous mariners, who was commissary chief for Comdr. Byrd's north pole expedition. Capt. Hewson, on his return here recently from a trip around the world as steward of the Cokesit and the City of Calcutta, told of being offered the sovereignty of the little South Sea Isle Pitcairn, discovered by British mutineers.

The fish story involving Jenny, he has been reluctant to tell, however, because he feared ridicule. The captain just couldn't keep the story from leaking out, somehow, and he finally has consented to give the details for the first time, whether anyone believes him or not.

Chief Officer Gustave Green, Second Officer Frank Brewer and Third Officer H. P. Simmons of the Cokesit will corroborate the story of Jenny's piscatorial exploits, Hewson declared. Jenny belongs to Green, it seems, and she doesn't really begin to get in her fish-catching stride until the ship passes through the Panama Canal and gets in Pacific waters, where flying fish abound.

"Jenny would sit on the lower deck aft," Hewson said, "and watch for flying fish. When she saw one heading her way, she would grab it with her paws and mouth, kill it by chewing the head and save the rest for the crew."

"Training did it. We had a very difficult time training the animal to serve us in this way, but it proved well worth while. It is a fact that flying fish often jump aboard ships, especially in the Pacific. The fish are capable of flying at a height of 15 feet off the water. When the ship has a full cargo and is lying low in the water, we frequently find a number of fish marooned on deck. They make fine eating."

"Sometimes Jenny wasn't very polite, and ate the fish herself. We did not suppose at first that Jenny caught the fish herself, but one night an apprentice was patrolling the deck aft, and he saw the cat reach up and grab a fish right out of the air."

Jenny's principal work, he said, was to retrieve fish which just slid along the edge of the deck and were about to fall into the water again. She was quick as a flash at such duties.

## LOUGHRAN AND LOMSKI TONIGHT

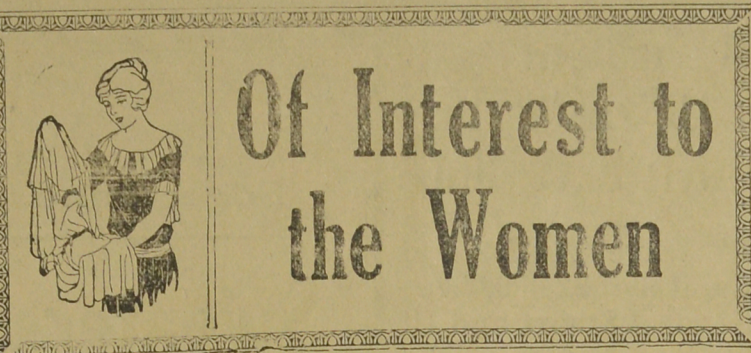

## Of Interest to the Women

### COMMON SENSE IDEAS ALL HOUSEKEEPERS SHOULD PRACTICE.

A coddled egg is dropped into a vessel of water just under the boiling point the vessel covered and removed immediately from the heat while the egg cooks slowly for about eight minutes. It will have a tender jellylike white and a soft but sufficiently cooked yolk.

A simple remedy for scorch stain is to moisten the stain with water and place in the sun. For more serious cases a piece of cloth moistened with hydrogen peroxide may be placed over the stain covered with a dry cloth and the spot ironed with a medium hot iron. If the hydrogen peroxide soaks through replace the upper cloth or the contact will cause the iron to rust rapidly. Rinse the garment thus treated before ironing. This method must be used carefully on colored fabrics as the dyes may bleach out.

A pillow may be washed just as it is but a better method is as follows: Transfer the feathers to a larger cotton bag by sewing the edges of its opening to the edges of the opening in the tick, shake the feathers from one to the other. Sew up the opening and wash in lukewarm water using a neutral soap. Rinse well. Press out as much of the water as possible and place on a cloth in the sun. Turn often and beat from time to time. Wash the tick separately and starch it on the inside with a stiff starch mixture applied with a brush or sponge transfer the feathers again when dry.

### JELLIED CUSTARD.

(especially appropriate for children)  
1 package lemon gelatin  
1 cup boiling water  
1 egg  
1-4 cup sugar  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
2 cups milk  
Make a soft custard as follows: Beat eggs, add sugar, salt and mix. Pour on milk and scald until it thickens. Cool. Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Chill. When it begins to thicken add the custard. Chill in molds until firm. Serve with any fruit desired.

### ALMOND BISQUE.

1 package lemon gelatin  
2 tablespoons sugar  
1-4 teaspoon salt  
1 cup boiling water  
1-2 cup cold water  
1 cup cream whipped  
1 teaspoon almond extract  
6 macaroons dried and rolled  
9 marshmallows cut in pieces  
3 tablespoons candied cherries, chopped

Dissolve gelatin, sugar and salt in boiling water; add cold water. Chill. When mixture begins to thicken whip until frothy. Fold in other ingredients. Mold and chill.

### FRUIT WHIP

1 package strawberry gelatin  
1 cup boiling water  
1 cup canned cherry juice  
1 cup canned white cherries, stoned and cut in pieces  
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add cherry juice. Cool. When gelatin is almost set, beat to very stiff froth. Fold in fruit and marshmallows. Pile in glasses. Chill.

### VEGETABLE SALAD

1 package lemon gelatin  
1 1-2 cups clear meat stock  
1-4 teaspoon paprika  
1 teaspoon salt  
1-8 teaspoon pepper  
1-4 cup vinegar

1-2 teaspoon onion juice  
2 cups cooked vegetables well drained.

Dissolve gelatin in the boiling stock. Add vinegar and seasonings. Chill. When it begins to thicken, add the vegetables. Mold and chill.

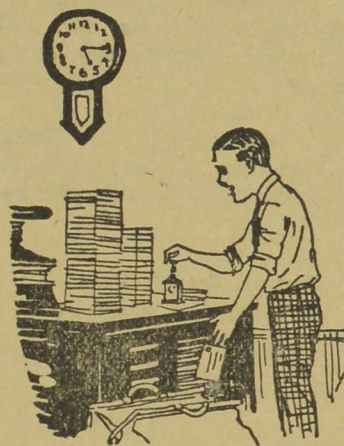
## CHILDREN ARE DROWNED BY GRANDMOTHER

Takes Her Own Life by  
Drowning Immediately  
Afterwards.

Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 4.—Two children, aged one and a half years and five years respectively, were drowned by their grandmother, who also drowned herself in a bath tub at their home here late today. The victims were Helen Showle, one and a half years old; her sister, Dorothy, five, and the grandmother, Mrs. Ella Showle.

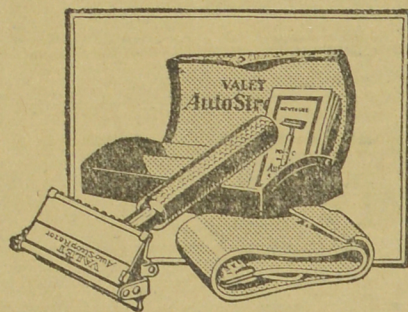
