

NEW ENGLAND
PACING DERBY TO
OCCUR JULY 4TH

Windsor, Conn., June 27—With the early season races of several star eligibles as a criterion the \$25,000 New England Pacing Derby to be raced here July 4 is virtually certain to develop into one of the fastest contests of the year over a half mile track.

Chattanooga 2.06%, owned by Congressman James S. Parker of Salem, N. Y.; Grattan Bars 2.07%, the Canadian whirlwind; Widow Grattan, 2.02%; Bonnie M., 2.06%; and Volo Rico 2.05, have shown sensational speed. The first named, a son of Napoleon Direct, 1.59%, who was campaigned by the late Edward F. (Pop) Geers, has paced faster in a race than any other sidewheeler over a two lap course this season. He turned the Sturbridge, Mass. track in 2.06% in the first heat eased up through the last 100 yards and took the next two heats in simple fashion in 2.08% and 2.08%.

Grattan Bars, the most talked of pacer in America and favorite for the New England Derby and the American Derby at Kalamazoo, Mich. traveled the Mansfield, O. track in 1.07%. That was in a second heat and he did it with much in reserve. The victory was his second straight in the States as he had opened with a triumph at Sandusky, O.

Widow Grattan went three trips over the Sturbridge course in 2.07%, 1.07% and 2.09. Bonnie M. scored in 2.08%, 2.11% and 2.08% over the same track. Volo Rico scampered to victory at Greenfield, Mass. in 2.09%, 1.09% and 2.08%.

Such a display of speed this early in the season leads one to believe these stars will go in 2.05 here should the track be fast.

Kinney Direct 2.02% the gelding that 15 of 16 races in the west last season, has not yet started in a race but his workouts certainly indicate he will be in the thick of it. He worked the Toledo, O. track in 2.03% with the last half in 1.00% and the final quarter in 29 seconds before being shipped to Avon, Conn. to make his first start in the \$10,000 pace at Avon, Conn. this week.

Deloraine, Man., June 27—Battle Ave, 2.01%, the 12 year old Canadian pacer, traveled the fastest mile either in a race, workout or against time when he negotiated the half mile track here in 2.03 in an exhibition. He was driven by James M. Kealey.

DEVON DEFEAT M'ADAM 6-0
IN EXHIBITION GAME AT DEVON
KEENE ALLOWING ONLY TWO HITS

"Johnston" Keene Hurlled Devon to a Two Hit Shutout Win Over McAdam—Devon Bunch Hits in Third and Fifth Innings For Six Runs—McAdam Used Three Pitchers—Visitors Have Practically The Same Team as in Previous Years.

Harold "Johnston" Keene's masterful pitching coupled with timely hitting by his teammates enabled Devon to romp away with a 6-0 victory over the visiting McAdam nine last evening in an exhibition fixture at the Devon ball park. The rugged Devon hurler permitted only two hits and one of these was of the scratch variety. Not a man reached second base on the superb pitching if Keene who seems to grow in effectiveness as the season advances.

On the other hand the McAdams sent three hurlers to the slab in an effort to forestall the bludgeoning of the younger Devonites. O'Hara, a portside flinger, commenced the game and went good for two frames. In the third he opened by walking a couple. The fireworks was begun when three basehits followed, E. Miles, "Johns" Keene and Robertson being the stick wielders. W. Blair was now sent in to stem the onslaught. In the first half of the fourth "Sprig" Bailey got his first hit for several games and strutted to the initial cushion with a satisfied grin. Jack Watson was walked. A fielder's choice and an outfield fly ended the inning.

In the fifth inning the Devon bats threatened again and after two runs were scored on three successive base hits by "Johns" Keene, Malloy and Robertson.

R. Blair Pitches Well

R. Blair, pitching ace of the visitors, who was being saved for an important league game and who was holding down the first sack, was forced to go to the mound. He opened in Robertson and it was the latter's two base wallop that scored Devon's two runs in this frame. Devon went out one-two-three in the next few innings.

Devon's Two Big Innings

Devon's big inning was the third when four runs crossed the platter. Lawrence and Jack Watson were given free trips to first by O'Hara who was hurling wildly. "Kato" Keene fled out. "Buck" Miles placed

a pretty single through Miller at shortstop and Watson raced to third easily, Lawrence taking second. "Johns" Keene smashed a good one and scored Watson and Lawrence. Miles was now on third base. W. Blair replaced O'Hara on the slab.

Malloy was whiffed by Blair, but Ralph Robertson who was in a hitting mood patted out a single, scoring both Miles and Keene for the fourth run. Bud Miles struck out for the third man.

A good sized crowd turned out at last evening's game and watched a good game, especially from a local standpoint. The Devon team composed of young players are displaying a fine brand of ball and have won their last six games without an intervening loss.

Rafferty who replaced W. Miller on third base in the latter stages of the game secured McAdam's only clean hit in his first time at bat in the 6th inning.

RAMPANT ON

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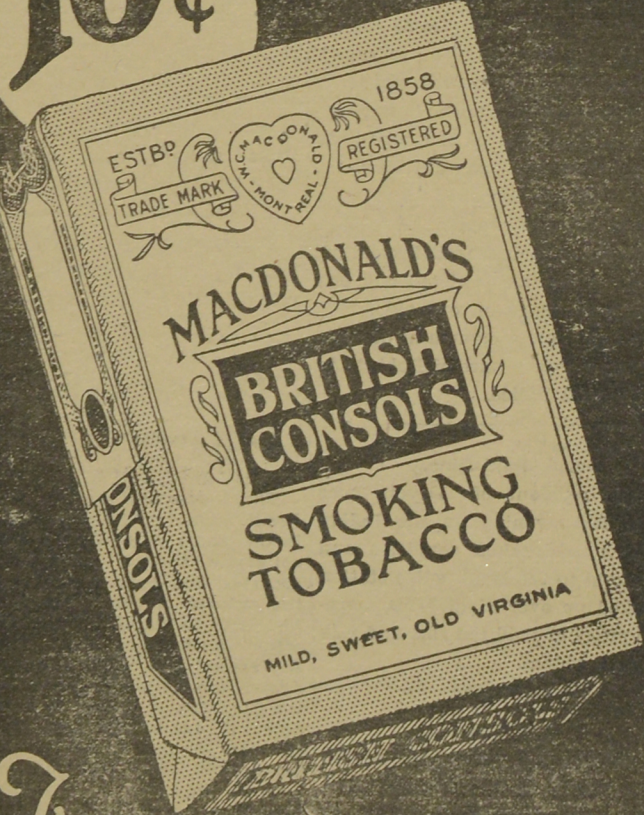
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
