CHICAGO LAWYER MAKES STRONG PLEA FOR LAW OBSERVANCE AT AMERICAN BAR ASSOCIATION

Increased Wealth, Automobiles and Better Organization Makes Crime so Successful and Prevalent is Claim—Prohibition Tends to Offset Crime Rather Than to Promote it.

Seattle, Wash., July 27—A strong plea for law observance, pointing out an alarming increase in crime and violence during the last fifty year period, was voiced by Silas H. Strawn, of Chicago, at the fiftieth anniversary convention of the American Bar Association in session here. Prohibition should be considered a social problem, not a political one, he said, and that enforcement and not nullification offered the only possible solution of the liquor question.

The six general causes of crime increase were given by Mr. Strawn as follows:

"The increase and development in the means of communication, hard roads and high-powered automobiles making the 'getaway' easy.

The vastly increased wealth of our citizens and especially of the criminal classes, enabling them to buy fast motors and expensive firearms.

"Organized crime, which enables underworld to make liberal contributions to political campaigns and exert a powerful influence in politics.

"Delay in the apprehension and speedy punishment of criminals due in part to the leniency and faltering of political judges and in part to our too liberal laws. We do not give

MAY STROKE TIGER IN SPARKS CIRCUS

Some Have Enjoyed the Privilege of Touching the Glossy Coat of Striped Beast.

enough attention to the selection of our judges and prosecuting attorneys.

"To the apathy and indifference of our best citizens toward their duty as citizens. The best qualified to serve as jurors seek to avoid the service because of the discomforts or because they dislike to leave their business.

"Unrestricted traffic in firearms."

Prohibition Helps

"Notwithstanding decisions of the court the Eighteenth Amendment and its enforcing legislation are still the subject of much acrimonious debate," he said. "It is asserted by some, who should be in a position to know, that prohibition has been of incalculable benefit to our industries by reducing absenteeism and improving efficiency and production. Also that it has greatly promoted the general welfare and increased the savings of our laboring people.

"New York State's endeavors to modernize its treatment of the crime problem and criminals were outlined by Senator John Knight of the New York Baumes Crime Commission.

Senator Knight stressed the importance of the legislation recommended and enacted by his State to check the prevalence of crime and pointed out the necessity of further law-making to strengthen statutes against lawlessness.

Restoration in the Empire State of "a full and lasting appreciation of the rights of citizens to the enjoyment of their lives, liberty and property without undue interference from the lawless," was declared the aim of the commission.

Professional Crime

"The crime problem is not the problem of the occasional criminal, nor are the crimes committed in passion nor by the defective," said the senator. "Surveys made by the commission bring to light the fact that the majority of the crimes are committed with deliberation and with the specific purpose of taking property by an act of violence and are attributed to professional criminals."

A proposal for setting up an entirely new tribunal for sentencing persons convicted of crime and taking from the court the power of sentencing and so limiting the functions of the trial courts and jury to determination of the guilt or innocence of the defendant, is one of the matters now engrossing the attention of the commission, said the senator.

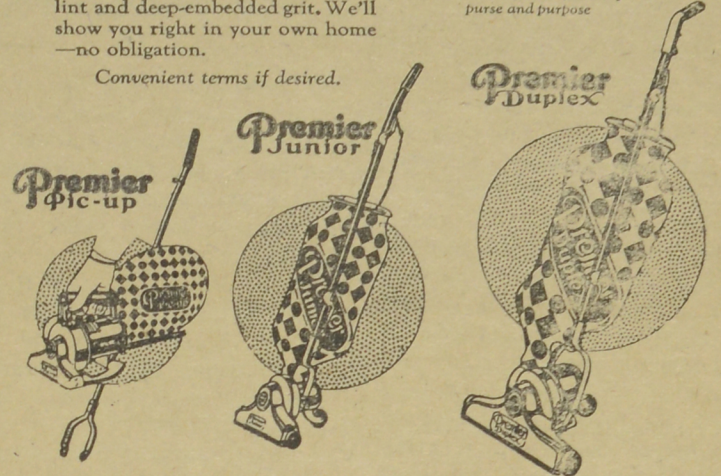
