ANOTHER SEVERE STORM
SWEEPS OVER OLD COUNTRY;
HEAVY LOSS OF LIFE FEARED

London, Nov. 23—Another autumn gale bringing loss of life, distress to shipping, interference with land transport and extensive property damage, raged throughout England today. The wind reached an official velocity of 84 miles an hour in one place. It was estimated at 100 miles an hour in Yorkshire.

Two persons were killed in Liverpool. One of them was a sandwich board man whose humble means of livelihood caused him to be blown under a motor truck. The other victim was caught under a falling tree. An aged man, struggling homeward through the gale, fell dead from over-exertion. A school girl was killed when a chimney collapsed as the pupils were leaving the class rooms. Bricks and debris showered all of the children, but the others escaped with bruises.

At Edinburgh the barometric pressure was 28.11. This was the lowest on record since 1894.

Service Cancelled.

So fierce was the blow on the channel, that railway steamer service between Dover and Ostend was cancelled at mid-day. The afternoon aeroplane trips from Crydon to the Continent were also called off.

In London, roofs, shop windows and hoardings (known in Canada as billboards) suffered severely. The whole city was drenched with heavy rains.

A terrific gale swept the north riding in Yorkshire. It was accompanied by torrential rains which swelled the streams to flood stage. Lincolnshire suffered similarly. At Carlyle a fallen tree blocked both of the main railroad lines of Scotland.

Fleets in Danger

A number of fishing fleets, caught away from their bases by the gale were subjects for anxiety. It was believed, however, that all these small craft managed to make port without loss of life.

The fury of the gale was perhaps felt more strongly at sea and along the coast than in the interior. The Spanish steamer Cantabria was driven ashore at Ayr, Isle of Man. A rocket brigade was standing by tonight and

an attempt will be made to refloat the vessel at high tide. The crew of 25 was reported to be in no immediate danger.

The gale and sea had apparently taken an undetermined toll of life in the sinking of the German steamer Herrenwyk off the Irish coast.

Ship Abandoned

Fog rather than wind was blamed for the mishap to the Greek steamer Virginia, abandoned by its crew off Portugal. The crew were rescued by a Spanish trawler and after being landed at Oporto charged that their ship had been struck by an unidentified vessel which had made no attempt to aid them. The Virginia tonight was reported under tow for Oporto by those who had found her abandoned and floating.

The violence of the wind at the busy port of Southampton caused delay to several liners scheduled to depart. These included the Tuscania, bound for New York. The Majestic, from New York, was late in berthing. Shipping was also inconvenienced in the Mersey River, where the Canadian Pacific liner Montclair landed its passengers at another port and had them carried to their scheduled destination by motor coach.

Heavy Toll Feared.

London, Nov. 23—The loss of an undetermined number of the crew of the German steamer Herrenwyk was indicated by a radio from the Danish steamer Estonia, which had stood by for more than 24 hours in an effort to succor the distressed craft.

The message received by Lloyd's tonight relayed by the S. S. Transylvania and the Portis Head radio station read "Steamer Herrenwyk sank approximately 54.22 north 23.53 west. Terrific northwest gale. "Standing by, but impossible to launch boats. Seven men picked up. Total saved 13. Patrolling spot."

Old seamen here, from the information given, believed the crew had been forced to abandon the Herrenwyk and take to boats and that one of these may have been picked up by the Estonia today.

and offence. A term of six months in jail and a fine of \$500 was imposed by the magistrate. Objections were taken on several grounds after case was appealed to Judge Slipp off the York County Court and the appeal was dismissed, thus upholding the jurisdiction of the magistrate. Following this an application was made to the Supreme Court for writ of certiorari with nisi to quash conviction on several grounds touching the jurisdiction of the magistrate.

These grounds were argued in April last and in view of a decision by the court of appeal of Nova Scotia this was further argued in September as to whether or not a magistrate had a right to try an offence under the criminal code. The court yesterday followed the decision of the Nova Scotia court and decided that the magistrate had no jurisdiction to try the case and the conviction was accordingly quashed. J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., was the counsel for the defendant, Monahan.

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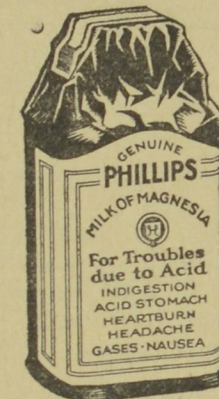
