## SCORING NOT AS HEAVY IN N. H. L. AS LAST YEAR

New York, March 27—Aided by the heavy driving sticks of the flying Frenchmen of the Montreal Canadiens, the international group clubs of the National Hockey League have wrested the goal scoring supremacy from the American division sextets, a survey disclosed today.

The members of the international contingent amassed a total of 443 goals during the 1927-28 schedule which was concluded with last night's games, again 394 counters rolled up by the rival players in the American group.

In spite of efforts to speed up the ice sport this year by limiting the blade of the goaltender's stick to 14 inches and reducing his leg pads from 12 to 10 inches in width, there was a marked drop in the scoring activities from last season.

The aggregate for the circuit for the drive just completed is 837, against 879 for a year ago a difference of 42 goals. In the previous campaign the American group clubs skipped the disk into the cage 462 times against 417 goals from the opposing section.

Premier team honors went to the Montreal Canadiens who netted the rubber 116 times, surpassing by one the high total attained by the Chicago Blackhawks in 1926-27. The Canadiens had a margin of 20 goals on their closest team competitor the Montreal Maroons, also in the international roster.

The New York Rangers ranked third in scoring for the entire circuit with 94 goals, two less than the Maroons, but the 94 was high for the sextets of the American wheel. The New York Americans tailenders in the international were in the cellar in scoring as well with 63 markers.

## Maroons Take Opener While Rangers Win 4-0

Joe Lamb Gets Lone Counter in Maroon Win — Rangers Beat Pirates 4 to 0—Semi-Finals to be Decided by Total Goals in Two Games.

Ottawa, March 27—Joe Lamb, Substitute player for Montreal Maroons, emerged the hero of tonight's play-off game of the Stanley Cup series when he scored the only goal of the encounter between the Maroons and Ottawa Senators, thus enabling his team to carry a one goal lead into the second series game at Montreal Thursday night. The goal which won the game tonight came in the second period.

Phillips broke away and passed out to Lamb from behind the Ottawa net. Lamb back handed the puck into the net. The game drew a crowd of some 9,200 leather lunged fans who filled every seat and most of the standing room of the local auditorium.

On the play it was a characteristic Maroon-Senator battle with heavy checking holding the two forward lines within close bounds most of the time. The first period saw the red, white and black squad holding a slight edge on the attack. The middle period was about nip and tuck, while in the final stanza the Maroons were easily more aggressive.

Their supply of first class subs were injected into the contest at strategic moments and the hard body checking which marked the game, had left the locals a trifle leg weary at the final bell.

New York, March 27—The New York Rangers virtually qualified to meet the Boston Bruins in the final of the American group of the National Hockey League here tonight when they routed the Pittsburgh Pirates by the score of four goals to nothing. The second game of the series which will be decided by total goals, will be played here, Thursday night but on tonight's play the Pirates are not conceded much chance of overcoming the Rangers' lead.

## BI SHIVELY WILL JOIN BIG ARRAY

Winfield, Kas., March 27—Bi Shively, prominent Western reinsman, will join the Grand Circuit parade this season for the first time in several years. He is tutoring a promising string here that should get its share of the money.

Three of Shively's pupils are entered in \$25,000 engagements. His two star pacers, Red Herr, 2.03%, and Atwood, 2.05, are both nominated in the Page Dairy at the second Toledo big time meeting, July 9-14. Donna Cupid 2.07% (half mile track record) is an eligible to the American Pacing Derby at Kalamazoo, Mich., July 17.

Red Herr, who belongs to R. C. Johnson of Winfield, won four of seven starts last year. He paced the half mile track at Janetville, Wifs, in 2.05%. Among others, he defeated such stars as Battle Axe, 2.11%, Courtney Burton, 2.02, and the Canadian whirlwind, Winnipeg 2.08% over the mile track at the Illinois State Fair, Springfield, Ill., pacing the last heat in 2.03%. Atwood, the property of J. T. Allen of Denver, Colo., accounted for seven races and was second three times in ten starts. Donna Cupid took four of eight races and was second twice. Others in Shively's stable are the trotters, Tolus Boy, 2.06%; Betty Ann Maxey, 2.09%; Mack Belwin 2.10%, and The Way 2.24.

## HANDY MANDY WINS TIJUANA TRACK RACE

San Diego, Calif., March 25—Handy Mandy a 4-year-old filly, with Jockey Hardy riding, carried the colors of the three Ds' stable of E. P. Waggoner, Texas oil baron to victory in the eighth renewal of the Tijuana Jockey Club track this afternoon.

Handy Mandy ran the two miles in 3m 25 1-5s more than two seconds slower than the track record for the distance set by Backbone last year in winning the cup. She won by a length over Woolridge, owned by Bowman and Crofton, with Grippeminaud 10 lengths back in third place. Firth of Tay was fourth.

Crystal Pennant, winner of the Coffroth Handicap did not start, although entered overnight.

Handy Mandy rewarded at the rate of \$3.60 to win, \$3 to place and \$2.40 to show in the \$2 mutuels. Place tickets on Woodbridge paid \$3 and show \$2.40. Grippeminaud paid \$2.40 to show.

The race was worth \$11,450 to the winner and three Ds, stable, with second money of \$1500 going to Woodridge, \$1000 to Grippeminaud for third and \$500 to Firth of Tay for fourth.

Nathaniel W. Niles of Boston, the present fancy and figure skating champion of the United States and a member of the Olympic teams of 1920, 1924 and 1928, is one of the many skaters of the first rank who have signified their intention of being on hand.

The school figure sessions which open tomorrow morning will continue through the day and also Tuesday morning and afternoon. The final events, will bring the competition to a close.

In the women's championship singles are Niles, Roger F. Turner Theresa Blanchard and Suzanne Davis of Boston.

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
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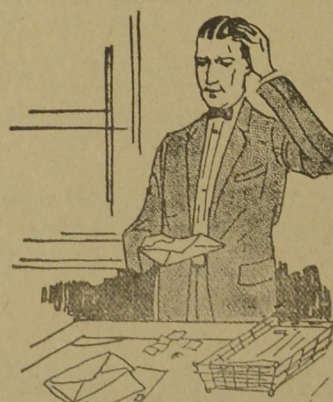
