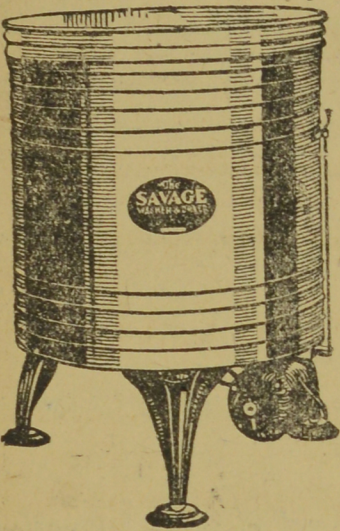

SAYS THE POPE HAS SLAMMED THE DOOR IN THE FACE OF OTHER CHRISTIAN DENOMINATIONS

Darwen, Lancashire, Jan. 22—Demonstrations against the alleged Anglo-Catholicism of the vicar, the Rev. F. B. Lauria, took place in St. Cuthbert's church here today.

Mild protests have occurred on recent Sundays coincident with the rejection of the Revised Prayer Book by the House of Commons but, today, the first Sunday after publication of the Malines conversations between prominent Roman Catholic and Anglican Churches, 400 persons joined the demonstration.

The parishioners protested against the "Sung Eucharist" by persistently singing hymns and preventing the progress of the service. One man in the congregation took advantage of a momentary silence to read the 31st Article of the Prayer Book, which denounces the sacrifice of the mass as a blasphemous fable.

When the Vicar left the church he had police protection and was followed by approximately 1,000 demonstrators who were booing him.

Bishop Farthing.

Montreal, Jan. 22—The Pope's recent encyclical was tantamount to closing the door of the Vatican in the face of all Christian people outside the Roman Catholic Church, after Cardinal Mercier had carried the Lambeth Appeal to the door, the Right Rev. Bishop Farthing of the diocese of Montreal, declared from the pulpit of Christ Church Cathedral here today.

Whether the late Papal encyclical was inspired by the Milanese report, I cannot say, but that forceful pronouncement has swept those results into the discard with ruthless vehemence," the speaker continued. "The bishops at Lambeth made their appeal to all Christian people, and that appeal to all Christian people, and that red Cardinal Mercier to the door of the Vatican, and the Pope by this encyclical has not only closed the doors but he has slammed it in our faces. Be it so.

It must remain closed until the Holy Ghost himself shall open it. We can only leave His Holiness to answer

for his action to the Great Head of the Church."

"The Old Mother Church of England is much in the limelight just now. She is passing through a very grave crisis, which is bound to effect her future life not only in the old land but throughout the world. While these storms which are raging there do not directly effect us, because we in Canada are an independent self-governing church, yet the Daughter can never be unconcerned about what goes on in the beloved Mother's house.

Religious Unrest

"While the controversies may seem to rage about minor things, they involve principles of the first magnitude. Nor do they concern us Anglicans alone. It is spreading in an ever widening circle. The whole religious world is in a state of unrest. A most important religious revolution has taken place in Turkey. The conflict between the Mohammedian and Hindu stirs Indian tranquillity. The Orthodox eastern church has passed through in the history of Russia and Armenia, the most bloody religious persecution which has left her in a chaotic condition. The Roman church is passing through the fires of persecution in Mexico, where a nation, which for centuries has been under her rule, has risen through its government against her. In the United States, bitter controversy is raging between so-called fundamentalists and modernists. Even in Canada we have witnessed bitter contention among brethren and have seen divisions following strife. Now controversies are disturbing our Anglican community. The unrest at the bottom of it all is world-wide.

"The encyclical reveals nothing new. It reiterates what the papacy has stood for in recent years. It is nevertheless grievous to our hearts for it will do, we fear, much harm to religion throughout the world," Bishop Farthing added.

"The Pope has not hesitated to state his position clearly and forcibly. No offence therefore can justly be given if we state our reasons with equal clarity."

THE MARITIME BLACK FOXES, LTD. PAYS DIVIDEND

A Distribution of Three Per Cent Being Made to Stockholders—Business of Concern Increasing.

The Maritime Black Foxes, Ltd., have declared a dividend of three per cent on the capital stock out of the earnings for the year 1927. The company operates ranches at Kingsclear and also at Murray Corner, Westmorland Co. At the Kingsclear ranch which is located on the back road, just above the golf links, no less than two hundred and forty foxes are being wintered. The ranch was lately removed from the Cameron farm to the Hughes farm, near by which the company has purchased. At the Murray Corner ranch one hundred foxes are being wintered. The company marketed only a small number of pelts last fall but made heavy sales of breeding stock and from that it derived the greater portion of its revenue. The stock handled by the company is high class, as a result of careful breeding and its customers invariably receive good value. Black fox ranching is becoming an important side line to agriculture in all sections of the province. The animals are easily raised and the pelts are always in demand at good prices. A majority of the capital stock of the Maritime Foxes Limited is held in Fredericton and vicinity.

N. B. OFFICIALS TO ATTEND CONFERENCES

The advance guard of officials of the Provincial Department of Lands and Mines who will represent New Brunswick at Forestry Conferences this week at Montreal and Quebec, left Fredericton on Saturday night, including G. H. Prince, Deputy Minister of Lands and Mines, G. L. Miller, Provincial Forester and W. W. McCormack, Assistant Provincial Forester, who will attend the Canadian Society of Forest Engineers' Convention opening in Quebec tomorrow morning.

Tomorrow afternoon Hon. C. D. Richards, Minister of Lands and Mines, leaves for Montreal to attend the annual meeting of the Canadian Forestry Association. New Brunswick's representatives at the Convention of the Canadian Society of Forest Engineers will go on to Montreal from Quebec to attend the Canadian Forestry Association meetings and later the meetings of the Canadian Pulp and Paper Association which will also be held in Montreal this week.

From Montreal the Minister of Lands and Mines and the Deputy Minister will go to Ottawa for conferences with federal government officials in respect to some important innovations in connection with forestry operations in New Brunswick, which the New Brunswick Department of Lands and Mines hopes to inaugurate during the present year.

VARSLITY GRADS GIVE HALIFAX 14-1 DEFEAT

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 22—The Toronto University Grads, Canada's hockey representatives at the 1928 Olympic Games, making their last appearance on Canadian ice before sailing for St. Moritz, easily defeated an All-Nova Scotia team here last night by 14 goals to 1. The Grads demonstrated to nearly 8,000 people, the largest crowd ever to witness a hockey game here, just why they are champions of Canada. They completely outplayed the all-stars, scoring five goals in the first period, four in the second and five in the third. Nova Scotia's lone goal came about the middle of the second period when Kuhn, of Truro, scored from the side after a nice piece of combination.

Dave Trotter, left-winger of the Upper Canadians, was the outstanding star of the game, running in five tallies and walking away with a special prize for puck carrying between the second and third periods. Hugh Maxton shot three markers, Frank Sullivan two, Red Porter two, Taylor and Delahay, one each.
