MAROONS BEAT CANADIENS IN N.H.L. FIXTURE

First Defeat in 19 Games — Score Was 1 to 0 — Rangers Win — Bruins Lose One and Tie One.

Montreal, Jan. 22—The seemingly impossible but the inevitable has happened. Canadiens were beaten by a 1 to 0 score by the Montreal Maroons at the Forum last night, and thus was brought to an end one of the most impressive records ever compiled by a team in the National Hockey League. It was the first defeat sustained by the Flying Frenchmen in 19 straight games.

A lone goal in the second period by Ward, substitute Maroon right winger was all that was needed to accomplish the downfall of the wonder team.

The indentation made on Canadiens' lead at the top of the Canadian division of the National Hockey League by the Maroons' victory was scarcely noticeable, but the win kept Maroons in the thick of the fight for second place with Toronto, who also won Saturday night. Canadiens have 33 points, while the Maroons and Leafs each has 25. The Maroons, however, have played a game less than the Queen City sextette.

Leafs Defeat Senators.

Toronto, Jan. 22—In the most bitterly contested National Hockey League fixture to be played at Arena Gardens this season, the Toronto Maple Leafs triumphed over the world champion Ottawa Senators by a score of 2 to 1 Saturday night and thereby strengthened their hold on third position in the Canadian group.

Hawks 1, Bruins 1.

Chicago, Jan. 22—The veteran Hugh Lehman, 41-year-old goal-keeper, coach and newly appointed manager of the Chicago Black Hawks, last night led his last place team into a fighting one to one tie with the Boston Bruins, leaders of the American division of the National Hockey League.

Rangers 4, Pirates 1.

New York, Jan. 22—The New York Rangers defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates by 4 goals to 1 in a National Hockey League game here tonight and went into a tie with the Boston Bruins for first place in the American group as the Hub sextet was on the losing end at Detroit.

"Ching" Johnson and "Bunny" Cook tallied in the first period and Frank Boucher and Paul Thompson added two more goals in the middle frame. "Tex" White saved the Pirates from a shut-out when he scored near the close of the contest.

Captain "Bill" Cook, of the Rangers and Harold Cotton of the visitors traded punches in the final period. A major penalty was imposed on each.

Bruins 2, Cougars 3.

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 22—The Boston Bruins, leaders in the American section of the National Professional Hockey League went down to defeat before the driving onslaught of the Detroit Cougars, 3 to 2, in a hard-fought game that went into two over-time periods for decision here tonight.

George Hay, Cougar star wingman, scored the winning goal. Johnny Sheppard and Frank Foyston netted the other Detroit goals.

Hitchman and Galbraith scored for the Bruins.

Defeat Chestnut Canoe Co. by 1 to 0 Score Saturday Night — Earl Chappell Gets Bad Cut in First Frame — C. N. R. Swamps John Palmer Co. in Second Clash 8 to 2.

The Hartt Boot and Shoe Company is out in front with two wins and no defeats as a result of their 1 to 0 victory Saturday night over the Chestnut Canoe sextet in the first game of a Commercial league double header.

The last half of the double header relegated the John Palmer hockey entry into the cellar, when they were given a crushing 8 to 2 setback from the C. N. R. team after three periods of action in which the railway team showed supremacy throughout.

Despite the bitter weather conditions, a fairly large crowd of rooters of the various teams and hockey enthusiasts viewed the games.

Hartt Get Early Lead.

Early in the first period Roy Ward of the Hartt Boot and Shoe outfit shoved a fast one into the twine for a goal lead. Although battling desperately the opposing Canoe sextet were never able to tie up the score. Three periods of erratic hockey in which all descriptions of action occurred and still the score remained the same.

Earle Chappell, defenceman on the Hartt team received a bad gash in his hand after about five minutes of play in the first period and had to receive medical attention. The game ended with the Shoe team on the defensive, warding off successfully the last minute efforts of the Canoe team to tie up the score.

"Pee Wee" Harrison opened scoring activities soon after the period started when he slashed one by the chubby Lyons in the Palmer nets. Thereafter there was no doubt as to the outcome. The Palmer team seemed unable to stop the railway offensive and after three periods of hectic and furious hockey the railway team had dented the meshes 8 times while twice was sufficient for the John Palmer Co. "Dukey" Delong, George Clark and "Sprig" Bailey were effective for the losers, while "Pee Wee" Harrison showed well for the winners, nobly assisted by Arnold, Dunham and Gulliver, the latter securing half of his teams eight goals.

BOB SHAWKEY WILL PLAY WITH MONTREAL CLUB

Signs Contract with Mgr Stallings — Contracts of Northern Club All Sent Out.

Montreal, Jan. 23—Contracts went out this morning from the offices of the Montreal Exhibition Company, Ltd. to all players upon the Montreal club's reserve list that it is Manager Stallings' intention to use the coming championship season.

A few of the players have, of course, already been signed in the event of being acquired since the close of last season, and so are not upon the reserve list. In this category belongs Bob Shawkey, the noted pitcher of the world's champion New York Yankees, who affixed his signature to a contract at the time the deal was made for him in New York during the December meeting of the International League. Shawkey is wintering in New York, where he makes his home, and has notified Manager Stallings that he will be one of the first to arrive at the latter's Georgia plantation, the last of next month, for preliminary training in advance of the arrival of the main squad around the middle of March.

VARSITY GRADS DEFEAT VICS BY 7-1 SCORE

Outclassed Vics in Fast Ice Battle—Joe Lamb N. B. Player Shows Class Against Them.

Montreal, Jan. 21—Canada's Olympic hockey hopes entertained close on to six thousand fans last evening in the Forum, and added another win to their prodigious string of ice victories when they disposed of the local Victoria sextet, this province's leading amateur puckchasing aggregation and present leaders of the Senior Group, in a sympathetic manner that permitted the Montrealeers' one sole tally, gained in the dying moments of the encounter, to their own seven goals, collected at leisure. The noise had just subsided from the hoarse-throated throng that cheered McGill's thrilling 2-0 finish over a University of Montreal squad, when the much-vaunted Toronto Varsity Grads, in their spotless white jerseys with the national emblem thereon that will be worn in their continental games, took the ice to engage in an exhibition with the best here. But the initial period of that exhibition started out in a hopelessly innocuous manner that presaged a listless display. However, the Vics surprised many with their doggedly determined rushes that resulted in near scores more than once and this served to arouse the ire of Canada's Olympic representatives, all of which culminated in a fairly exciting tussle.

GRAND CIRCUIT REINSMEN ARE STARTING GRIND

Noted Trainers Make Preparations for 1928 Season — Ben White Has Bunch of Good Ones — Mr. McElwyn, 1.59 1/4 Holds Records.

Cleveland, O., Jan. 21—Reinsmen who make things hum along the Grand Circuit again are heeding the call of the warm climes of the south land. Seven of the most prominent drivers already are putting their pupils through their paces below the Mason-Dixon line. They are Ben F. White, America's premier trainer of trotting colts and fillies; Tommy Berry, the Hanover Shoe Farms tutor; Will Dickerson of Gashen, N. Y.; Will Rosemire the Cleveland colt developer; John L. Dodge, the millionaire horseman of Lexington Ky', and the two Indianapolis luminaries, Lon McDonald and Sep Paine.

White, as usual is located with a large group of royally bred youngsters at Orlando, Fla. This city has proved an excellent training base for him. Greatly benefitted by several months of work in ideal weather the White pupils as well as other equines that winter in the south generally are in better condition than the horses that receive their lessons through northern drifts for the rich early offerings and also attain their peak before the latter.

In the last few years White has prepped such steller performers at his Orlando camp for Grand Circuit warfare as Mr. McElwyn 1.59 1/4; Sumatra 2.02 1/4; Lee Worthy 2.02 1/4; Kashmir 2.03 1/4; Aileen Guy 2.03 1/4; Isola's Worthy 2.03 1/4; Station Belle 2.04 1/4; Behelwyn 2.04 1/4 and Ruth M. Chenault 2.07 1/4. All were great futurity stars.

Mr. McElwyn who has entered the ranks of sires and is owned by the Dallas, Tex. sportsman W. H. L. McCourtie holds a string of records. Jointly with Fireglow the juvenile sensation of last season, he boasts the 2 year old trotting mark of 2.04. He is the only trotter that has shaded two minutes as a 3-year-old, whizzing in 1.59 1/4 in 1924. He also holds the record for the fastest two heat by a stallion 2.02, 2.02 1/4 and the fastest heat by a 3 year old in a race 2.02.

Sumatra holds the record for 3 year old trotting fillies, 2.02 1/4 gained in a winning heat in the \$25,000 Geers Memorial at Toledo in 1925 and in addition is a winner of the Rainy Day Sweepstakes richest juvenile classic on the Grand Circuit that annually features the program at North Randall. Lee Worthy now dead, was a star in the free for all trots following a sparkling record in the futurities.

McGILL SQUAD GET SEVENTH HOCKEY WIN

Montreal, Jan. 21—Dr. "Vee" Heney's red-clad McGill hockey team captured its seventh straight victory and swung into a decisive lead in the inter-collegiate hockey series by virtue of its 2-0 shut-out of the University of Montreal last night at the Forum. The large crowd which came to witness the amateur hockey feast which the evening's double-header provided were treated in the introductory engagement to a bang-up sixty-minute battle for supremacy with the issue in doubt until the final minute.

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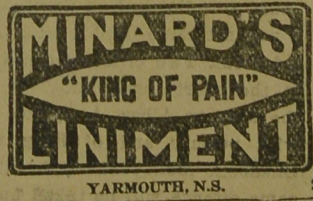
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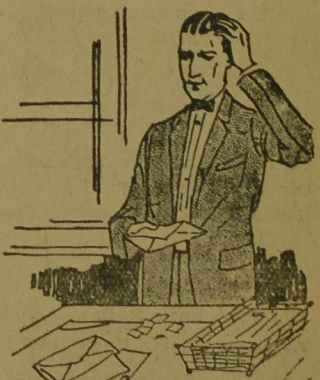
