WHERE THEY GO.

What becomes of worn out automobile tires? Few persons know. Uncle Sam didn't know, but he determined to find out, and did. The department of commerce reports that thousands of old casings are sent to Greece for conversion into tchariks. A tcharik, it is explained, is a crude shoe—a strip of leather or rubber held around the foot by lacings. In Mexico also some natives use casings for the same purpose. They cut a piece of rubber into the shape of a sole and fasten it to the foot by means of leather thongs. That is a guarantee.

Such shoes have the merits of durability and low price. They are utilitarian if not beautiful and fit well into the scheme of things where the people are poor.

A MATTER OF SPIRIT.

It is said few people in India know how old they are. They have little interest in their own age or in that of others. AUSTRALIA'S DEBT GREATER THAN CANADA'S

Grafton, New South Wales, Oct. 10—The enormous payments to be made on Australia's public debt of nearly six billion dollars is the greatest financial problem of the Commonwealth, declared Hon. Dr. E. C. G. Page, Federal Treasurer in an important speech on the financial policy of Australia today.

The burden of interest amounted to \$175,000,000 annually on the public debt of \$5,950,000,000 of which the Federal Government is liable for approximately one third and the States of the Commonwealth for the remainder, Dr. Page said.

IMPROVED TRAIN SERVICES BETWEEN NEW ENGLAND & MARITIME PROVINCES

Effective with the general change of time, September 30th, service between Halifax, Saint John and Boston will be considerably improved.

Boston train will operate daily instead of six days a week as formerly.

Eastbound, train will leave Boston at 10.40 p. m. instead of 7.40 p. m. as at present, thus giving passengers a considerably longer evening in Boston; and will arrive in Saint John at 12.00 noon, or practically the same time as last year.

This train will make daily connections with Canadian National train No. 14, for Moncton, Halifax and points East.

Westbound, train will leave Saint John at 7.00 p. m. daily, Atlantic, as at present arriving in Boston 7.05 a. m., which is earlier than last year.

An added feature will be the operation of a Dining Car between Saint John and Mattawamkeag which will serve breakfast Eastbound and the evening meal Westbound.

As a further improvement Buffet Club Compartment Observation Car will be operated between Boston and Moncton, both East and Westbound.
