A MOTION FOR THE SIX MONTHS' HOIST ON NATURALIZATION BILL VOTED DOWN IN HOUSE

Ottawa, May 9—Another thorough test of party strength came in the House late this afternoon when Hon. R. B. Bennett, Leader of the Opposition forced a division by moving the six months' hoist of the bill introduced by Hon. Fernand Rinfret, Secretary of State, to amend the Naturalization Act, after several days of heated discussion. The Conservative motion which was in amendment to the motion for the third reading of the bill, was defeated by 74 to 104, three Labor members (J. S. Woodsworth, A. A. Heaps, and H. B. Adshead) and two Progressives (J. H. Jelliff and T. W. Bird), voting with the Government and the remainder supporting the Conservatives.

Both Mr. Bennett and the Secretary of State spoke briefly in the last stage of the discussion of this bill, Mr. Bennett declaring that the proposed legislation would place Canada's legislation in conformity with that of the other Dominions while Mr. Bennett, on behalf of his party, protested against the substitution of a very doubtful agency for that of the judicial method of investigating the applications for naturalization.

Bennett's Views

"In 1914," said Mr. Bennett, "we enacted legislation with respect to naturalization, which legislation might be divided into two parts. The first part deals with the conditions under which applicants for naturalization may obtain British citizenship—no longer Canadian citizenship but British citizenship. The second part deals with the procedure under which the Secretary of State satisfies himself that the conditions imposed have been observed by the applicant."

"We differ with respect to the question of procedure. Heretofore in this country the procedure has been to leave the matter to the judges of the country. There is a provision in the present statute that unless there be grave reasons why it should not be so, the applicant should appear before a judge and satisfy him of his having complied with all the conditions of citizenship. These conditions are now being swept away, and hereafter two persons, who are natural born British subjects and a justice of the peace, who may not be, will certify to the Secretary of State that there has been compliance with the conditions under which citizenship could be obtained."

Reasons for Objections

"We object to these changes for two reasons, first, because no evidence has been adduced of any sufficient weight indicating that there has been any difficulty, that should be consid-

ered sufficient by this parliament, in the administration of the act as it now stands. In other words, there has been no crying grievance for which a remedy should be provided.

"Secondly, the minister himself, as well as the only judicial opinion to which he referred in the debate on this matter, has made it abundantly clear that the department desired uniformity, or, as Chief Justice Meredith said, the even administration of the law. There being no evidence of any crying grievance on the part of any one that could not be remedied by existing legislation, the first ground disappears.

"As to the second, the method now proposed not only does not make for uniformity or convenience in the laws, but permits a variation in the administration of the law, within an area of five miles, in dealing with two applicants. Entirely different standards are observed. It puts a premium on laxity of administration. For the discretion of the judiciary we are asked to substitute a discretion of two persons, perhaps illiterate. Against that we protest, and for that reason we move the six months' hoist."

The Secretary of State, speaking in support of his measure, following the Leader of the Opposition, declared that "in no other Dominion does the applicant for naturalization appear before a judge. This is a provision that exists only in Canada. I asked the House to pass the third reading of this bill which will rest in the government the power of allowing or disallowing the granting of a certificate of naturalization, which we claim is a matter of policy and not a matter of judicial nature. This legislation will bring our act into perfect harmony with the statutes in other parts of the Empire."

Other Matters

Third reading was also given to the bill introduced by Hon. Dr. James H. King, respecting the amalgamation of the Department of Soldiers Civil Re-establishment and Health.

Notice of motion by the Prime Minister providing for Parliamentary recess on Ascension Day, and on May 24 were allowed to stand until tomorrow at the request of the Leader of the Opposition.

In answer to a question Hon. James A. Robb, Minister of Finance, announced that the supplementary estimates would disclose what the government proposed to do for the further relief of the Home Bank depositors.

VALIDATION ASKED FOR PROXY MARRIAGE

Cambridge, Mass., May 9—A young mother who married her soldier sweetheart by proxy four months after he had been killed in action has asked the Middlesex probate court to validate the marriage.

Annie Hiscock made the appeal so she could collect the 5,000 government insurance carried by Wales T. Hawes of the A. E. F., the father of her 10-year-old daughter, Pauline.

In her petition, Miss Hiscock said she first met Hawes on Jan. 17, 1917. Before Hawes could carry out his intention of marrying her, he was sent to France with the A. E. F., the petition said.

On April 13, 1918, the child was born, and on August 9 of the same year, Hawes appeared before a summary court martial in France and signed a marriage contract. It was then sent to Boston, where Miss Hiscock also signed it in the presence of an assistant judge advocate on Feb. 27, 1919. Four months previously, however, Hawes had been killed in battle.

4 ROOMS FOR \$160 A YEAR IS HOUSING PLAN

Paris, May 10—Ten thousand Parisian families, now living in whatever poor habitation they can find are to be lodged within the next eighteen months in modern low-rental apartments to be constructed by the city.

The new apartments, construction of which is to start in the early summer, will be thoroughly up-to-date and hygienic and the cost to the tenants, for four rooms and a bath will be only about \$160 a year. Use of German reparations in kind together with an appropriation of governmental as well as municipal funds will make this possible.

CHURCH UNION STEP TAKEN IN KANSAS

Kansas City, Mo., May 9—Unanimous approval of steps looking toward union of the Methodist Episcopal church with Presbyterian churches and the Congregational church was given here late today by the Methodist Episcopal committee on the state of the church.

A sub-committee report providing for the appointment of a commission of 27, to handle all unification discussions was passed without dissenting vote. The report will come before the Quadrennial General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church tomorrow for final approval.

WENT AROUND THE WORLD IN THIRTY-SIX DAYS

Tokio, May 10—Teichiro Araka today completed his around the world tour, just 36 days after he started from Tokio. He thus won the \$1,500 first prize offered by the Tokio Jiji Shimpo or an around the world tour by regular carriers, in less than 40 days. Araka also defeated his rival Ryukichi Matsui who is bound home now from California. It was a little more than a month ago that Araka and Matsui started their speedy world girdling tour, Araka starting east and Matsui going west.

SAINT JOHN STORAGE BILL WAS PASSED

Ottawa, May 9—The House tonight gave third reading to the bill respecting the Saint John River Storage Company. Final reading came after defeat by a vote of 113 to 21 of an amendment moved by J. F. Pouliot (Liberal, Temiscouata), that legal questions involved to be referred to the Supreme Court of Canada. When his motion was defeated, Mr. Pouliot rose to speak on the main motion for third reading. But the Speaker held that in moving his amendment Mr. Pouliot had already spoken on the main motion and could not be heard again.

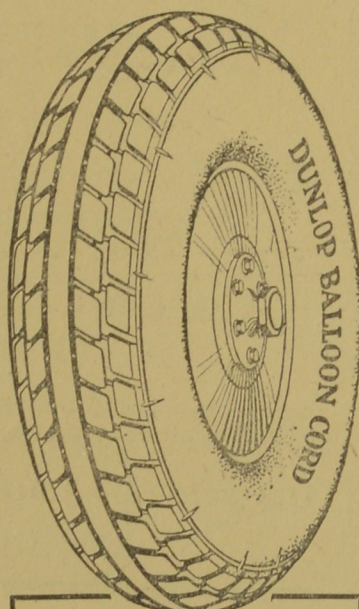
