Three Boys Reported on Way to Fredericton After Very Successful Break From Reformatory at St. John.

A report this morning from the Provincial Police headquarters in this city, was to the effect that three boys had escaped from the Industrial Home in Saint John and were making their way in the general direction of Fredericton. Sergeant John Bird of the local staff, is at present engaged in the search for the young men, having left early this morning for search duty between here and St. John.

Same Age.

All three boys are of about the same age and about the same in stature, average about five feet six or seven inches in height. The boys are Simon LeBreton of St. Stephen, Donald Grey and another by the name of Smith from Oromocto. The latter boy was arrested some time ago for a store breaking incident which occurred at Mungerville and was taken to the Industrial Home by Sergeant Bird.

Seen Yesterday.

All three young boys were seen yesterday at about 12 o'clock making their way toward this city. The expectation is that the three will be taken into custody before the day is over. Incidentally the breaks at the Home in St. John are occurring with startling regularity. A number of such getaways have happened at the institution since this spring.

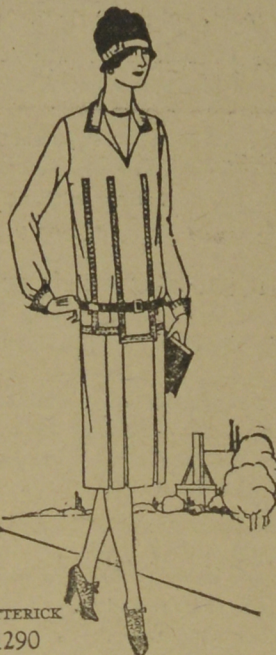
Turns Out For Parked Cars.

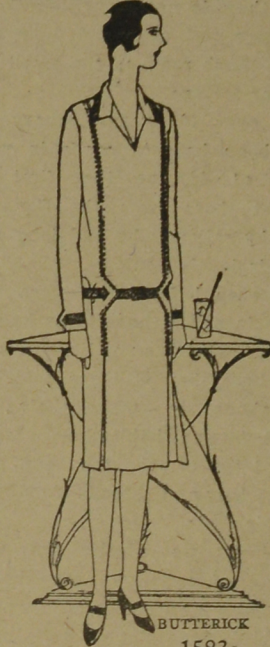
