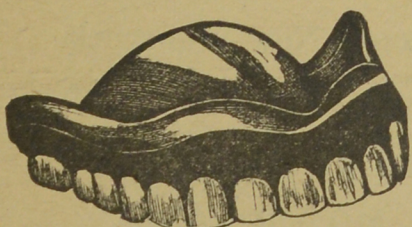

BRITISH HOUSE OF COMMONS REJECTS THE REVISED PRAYER BOOK BY A VOTE OF 266 TO 220

London, June 14—By a vote of 266 to 220, the House of Commons tonight again rejected the Revised Prayer Book of the Church of England. The vote coming after two days' close debate on which the attention of the nation was focused, recorded a majority almost identical with that in the previous rejection last December, when the vote was 247 to 205.

The revised prayer book after rejection last December was altered by the bishops and after approval by the Church Assembly was submitted to Parliament yesterday.

The speech of Sir William Joynson-Hicks, Home Secretary, this afternoon with the high light of the efforts of the opponents of the revision. The Minister, staunch evangelist, who led the opposition last December, today declared the House was being asked to "revoke its own decision" and inferred that the church was resisting Parliament's decision. He asserted the book was essentially the same as the one defeated last December.

Lord Hugh Cecil and Premier Baldwin speakers in favor of the revision to win were outstanding among the day.

Sir William Joynson-Hicks was greeted with loud cheers when he rose to speak. He declared he spoke with even greater responsibility than he had in December, when the first revision had been rejected by the

House. He stressed his personal unhappiness differing from his revered leader, Premier Baldwin, on any matter but this question went far beyond ordinances and ceremonies. A definite change of doctrine was concerned, going far beyond the questions of vestments and the like.

Answers Critics

The Minister said that his action in recently writing a book opposing the revised prayer book, had been subjected to criticism by the Bishop of Manchester who alleged that while holding official position in the government, he had written a partisan book. "Nowhere at all in my book," Sir William declared, "is my official position mentioned. I wrote it as an individual member of Parliament. No possibility of office would keep me silent on this matter."

Sir William went on to scout the idea that this matter was one of merely domestic concern to the church. "Was the reformation only of domestic concern?" he asked. "Let them ask the Free Churches."

He paid tribute to the high tone and deep sincerity of Hon. F. B. Meriman's speech in favor of the measure last evening and agreed that the announcement on the cover of his own book, of which Mr. Meriman complained might have been expressed differently.

appeal, the case was ordered to be entered for hearing at the September term for argument on question only of jurisdiction of magistrate to try the case.

In the case of King vs. Joseph S. Cyr, the appeal was dismissed. In the case of King vs. Chateau Restigouche, the appeal was dismissed also. Both were liquor cases.

Leave to appeal the case from the decision of the County Court, and the defendant be given unconditional leave to defend the action, was the judgment handed down in the Johnston vs. Barrieau appeal. In the final case, that of Curtis vs. Harris, the appeal was dismissed with costs and judgment of Mr. Justice Byrne's is confirmed.

There were two appeals in the Chancery Division. An order was made declaring Sophie Hamilton, to be a lunatic and appointing Charles E. Fish, William E. Fish, and E. Clifford Fish, her brothers as a committee of her person and estate. J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., made the motion and also made a motion for an order permitting the Royal Trust Company to act as guardian for John Francis McCluskey and also to make further expenditures on his behalf, in addition to permission already granted.

Upon application of J. P. Hughes, K. C., leave to appeal to the Supreme Court of Canada was granted to the plaintiff company from a recent judgment of the Court of Appeal in the case of Creggan vs. Davidson, etc.

ROCKEFELLER TO RESTORE A HISTORIC TOWN

Williamsburg, Va., June 15—At a cost of \$4,000,000 or more, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., is to restore this historic town, founded in 1632 and rich in memories of the cavaliers and the genesis of the nation's independence. More than 100 colonial structures are to be restored and the whole town will be made a museum of the beginning of the United States.

FARM WATER SUPPLY MUST BE SAFEGUARDED

(Experimental Farm Note)

That many farm wells are not amply protected from pollution and are potential sources of danger from water-borne diseases as typhoid, dysentery, etc., is the conclusion drawn from the results of the analyses at the Central Experimental Farm of water samples from rural wells. Of 450 samples of water submitted during the past four years, bacteriological tests indicated that but 37 per cent was quite free from pollution. Thirty-one per cent of the samples were definitely polluted, while a like number were of the suspicious character pointing to possible contamination.

In the majority of cases contaminated water comes from the ordinary shallow well with its much greater possibility for admitting germs of excretal origin than the drilled well which taps lower, purer depths. The location is very frequently at fault, and an examination of the data furnished with the samples shows a very distinct relationship between the quality of the water and the distance from such sources of pollution as privy, cesspool, barnyard, etc.

Fifty yards may be considered the minimum safe distance from any source of pollution, indeed experiments have shown that it is possible for bacteria from polluted sources to enter the water of a well 200 feet or more away when the well is in the direction of the ground water flow.

If the well is situated at a safe distance, it is next in importance to have it so constructed that any ground water must pass through soil and thus be filtered before entering the well. This can only be affected by insuring that the sides of the well, for a depth of 12 to 15 feet, are tight and impervious to water. The top, naturally, should be so constructed that no contamination can enter.

The water from contaminated or suspicious wells can be rendered safe by boiling and also by chlorinating with chloride of lime, but at best this is only a temporary makeshift and does not get at the root of the trouble. The remedy is to construct a safe well and bear three points in mind: (1) That a deep well is best, (2) That a safe distance from contamination is essential and (3) that the construction is right.

Drizzled Last Night

The culmination of yesterday's cloudy weather was a constant drizzle of rain which commenced last night at about seven o'clock and kept up throughout the night. The weather has remained fine today with occasional threats of rain. The rains of the past few weeks have been very opportune for the farmers, who are busy with their seeding operations.

The shad fishing season is now on but the catch so far has not been quite up to the average. Salmon fishermen residing above Croft's Point are requested by the regulations to take their nets from the water tonight and keep them out until July 1st.

Large Registration.

The enrollment committee reported as registered, 22 pastors, and 31 visitors apart from casual visitors, making a total of 144 registered attendants. Resolutions

In addition to resolutions expressing gratitude for hospitality of the South Devon pastor and church and those who helped to make the services a success, a further resolution was unanimously carried and entered in the minutes and voted to be sent to the various papers:

"Whereas: at present there is, on the Statute Books of the Province of New Brunswick a law providing for the sale of intoxicating liquor for beverage purposes by a system of so-called government control, which in our judgment is nothing less than a sanction of Government sale of Intoxicating Liquor for beverage purposes,

And, whereas, a well organized police force has been employed and assigned the duty of enforcing said law, thus proving to us that a government can enforce laws if it so desires;

Therefore Resolved: That this Western Association of United Baptist Churches of New Brunswick assembled in Annual Session at Devon, York Co., this 14th Day of June, 1928 A. D., do hereby place ourselves on record as being uncompromisingly opposed to the principle of Government Sale of Intoxicating Liquors for beverage purposes.

And further resolved, that we give our heartiest support to any policy which in our judgment will best serve to remove this law from the Statute Books of the Province, and to replace the same by an effective law Prohibiting the Sale of Intoxicating Liquors for beverage purposes.

And further resolved, that we demand that just as well an organized Police force be maintained as long as the same is necessary for the purpose of enforcing a Prohibition law as is now being employed to enforce this Government Control Law.

The River Falling.

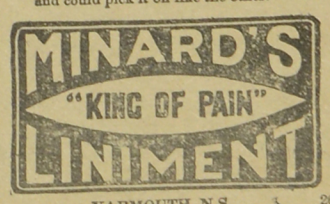
The water in the Saint John River is now falling quite rapidly, having dropped more than two feet during the week it will probably be several weeks yet before it gets down to summer level.
