

DEVON TOOK REVENGE ON CAPITAL TEAM BY 12-3 VICTORY LAST NIGHT AT QUEEN'S SQUARE DIAMOND

Steady Drizzle of Rain Kept Fans From Attending—Devon Pounded Garvie For 12 Hits in 5 Innings—Capital Team Without Services of Several Players—Burse and H. Keene on Mound For Rival Squad.

Devon took sweet revenge at the expense of the weakened Fredericton Imperials and walked away easily by the score of 12 to 3 in a rain storm that fell continually during the five innings which were played. The handful of fans which were on hand saw the Imperials short handed through injuries and other unforeseen reasons. Donovan, Davis, Rutter and McLennan were the only regulars on hand besides Garvie, who was away off form and with the slippery ball could not keep control of it. Currie played first in place of Shannon who has removed from the city for the summer. Gorman an old timer, filled in at second, Baker being injured in Saint John. Block was used in centre field and as he is carried by the Imps, needs seasoning. Maxwell was in leftfield for a time, but was replaced by Armstrong who was late arriving for the game.

Devon presented the same line up as was used previously with the exception that Burse, their portsider, was sent to the slab as moundsman. After 2 hits and a brace of errors in the first inning he gave way to H. Keene who held Fredericton helpless allowing but one hit and scoreless.

The game played last night was postponed from June 8th.

Garvie was away off form and when he got the ball near the plate the Devon batters bled on his offerings for a total of twelve hits, Malloy leading attack with a two base hit and a single in two trips to the plate. Jones' Keene hit a three-base wallop and a single in four times up. Watson hit a two-bagger and a single in three trips up.

Fredericton scored three runs in the opening inning but could not get a run off Keene's delivery after he replaced Burse.

Devon won the game in the second stanza when they scored three runs after tallying once in the first frame. They added three in the third, one in the fourth, and sewed the game up by putting over four more runs in the fifth.

Last night's game was no example of the brand of ball which the Imps are capable of putting up and the attendance at tonight game should be better. The fans should support the team to the limit and encourage the management who have gone to considerable expense in placing the team in the league. Too many non-cash customers are on hand, and the team will never get anywhere without financial help.

The same teams play again tonight at the Queen's Square Diamond. The Imps will be strengthened with some new material and all the regulars will be on hand. A real game is assured and a large crowd of spectators should be on hand for the game.

SPORT BRIEFS

Interest in the American League race now seems to be centered in whether or not the champion Yankees are going to break the major league record for victories in a single season, 116, hung up by the Chicago Cubs of 1906.

The year the Cubs led to the late Frank Chance, made their mark they had an early season battle with New York and Pittsburg so that at the end of June their figures showed 46 victories and 20 defeats for a percentage of 697. In the great drive from June 30 to the finish the Cubs won 70 games while losing only 16.

The Yankees seem likely to reach July 1 with a better record than the Bruins had on that date in their record year, and if they keep going have a good chance to shatter a mark that looked unbeatable for years.

At the other end of the ladder the Phillies, despite their weakness can hardly equal the mark for the most defeats in a season, 134 made by the Cleveland team in the old 12 club National League in 1899.

MADE MISPLAY

Horace Ford, Red Shortstop Makes First Error in 27 Games.

New York, June 13—Horace Ford, Cincinnati shortstop, snapped his errorless record at 26 consecutive games here today when he fumbled and then threw wildly past first base for two misplays on the same chance in the fifth inning of the clash between the Giants and the Reds. Ford previously had handled 135 chances without an error.

BIG LEAGUE UMPIRE DIES IN BROOKLYN

New York, June 13—Frank Wilson, National League umpire, died of appendicitis at Victory Hospital in Brooklyn today, after a brief illness. Wilson was stricken a week ago Monday and was rushed to the hospital where operations were performed Wednesday and Saturday.

Wilson is survived by his widow and two young sons, who were with him when he died. He got his start in umpiring around the sand lots of the metropolitan district after throwing out his arm while serving as a catcher in the South Atlantic League before the war. He went into the Western League about eight years ago and joined Ban Johnson's staff in the American in 1922.

The Brooklyn umpire served only briefly in the younger major circuit. He ordered Cobb and Heilman from a game in Detroit early in the season, and resigned when Johnson failed to give him the support he considered his due.

Wilson then returned to the Western League for a few months. But was recalled to serve in the National League at the start of the 1923 season. He soon became one of the best men on Heydlers staff and was recognized as the fastest umpire on the bases in either league.

SONNENBURG IS ONE OF GAME'S BEST MAT MEN

Providence, June 13—"Bull" Komar Lithuanian wrestler became Gus Sonnenberg's 45th straight victim in a rough wrestling match at the Arcadia tonight. He went down for the first fall in 33 minutes 15 seconds and for the second in 6 minutes 46 seconds. The ex-Dartmouth "minute man" used his famous flying tackle to pin Komar the first time, but scored the second fall with an overshoulder headlock.

In staying with Sonnenberg more than half an hour Kimar accomplished something no other wrestler has ever done.

In other matches John Frieberg Swedish champion who piled up 54 straight victories before Sonnenberg toppled him was thrown by George "Former" McLeod, John Spellman, ex-Brown star, defeated Dr. Carl Sarpolis of Chicago and Joe Devito Italian idol, tossed Hans Lobert of Germany.
