## PROSPECTS ARE BRIGHTER FOR RESCUING NOBILE AND HIS CREW; FIRST STORY OF THE DISASTER

Rome, June 13—Latest reports from the stranded crew of the Italia reveal that General Umberto Nobile himself was injured on the right arm and right leg when the airship's gondola was torn from her on the ice north of Spitzbergen.

The General in his report, however, said that his arm was cured and that his leg was nearly sound.

The report was made public in a communique by the official news agency Stefani said that in addition to General Nobile, the others injured were Dr. Finn Malmgren, Swedish meteorologist, who suffered bad contusions of his arm and chief technician Cecione, whose right leg was broken below the knee.

Dr. Malmgren has recovered from his hurts by the time he and two others of the crew left the Nobile party on May 30, in an effort to reach land.

Cecioni, however, will need long attention before being cured.

### Hope Grows

King's Bay, Spitzbergen, June 13—Hope grows for the rescue or the relief of General Umberto Nobile and his companions of the wrecked dirigible Italia, and those daring Norwegian Arctic fliers, Capt. Riiser-Larsen and Lieut. Luetzow Holm for make ready aboard the seater Hobby for flights over the pack ice in the neighborhood of Foyn Island.

The Hobby has reached open water to the west of Northeast Land and is forcing her way along in the hope of reaching North Cape, where she probably will be halted by the ice. That would put her less than 100 miles from the Italian explorer and the five others with him comprising what is known as the radio party who are believed to be drifting on an ice floe.

The moment conditions permit the

aviators will go into the air and they will drop supplies for the castaways, if they are so fortunate as to sight them. Their position as reported by Giuseppe Biogo, radio operator of the Italia, at 80.37 north latitude and 27.34 east. The party was being carried in the drift in a northwesterly direction, which is carrying them slowly toward their would-be rescuers.

### Prospects of Relief

The drift, however, is not considered of much importance here unless there is a shift and the pack ice moves toward the sea.

The ice breaker Bragandza is back at King's Bay, taking on gasoline and provisions, together with dogs and sledges. It will proceed as soon as possible to northern Spitzbergen.

The best the present rescue expeditions hope to do is to definitely locate the Italia's men and supply them with food, medicines and proper equipment to withstand the cold.

The work of transporting the castaways must be left to the bigger planes or the Russian ice breakers if they succeed in breaking their way through.

### NOBILE'S STORY

Rome, June 13—General Umberto Nobile's own story of the wrecking of the dirigible Italia in the Arctic was received today by the Stefania News Agency. It was summarized as follows:

"At 10.30 a. m. on May 25, while the Italia was flying normally at a height of 500 metres, suddenly the weight increased (apparently by snow and ice forming on the bag). The airship began a rapid plunge which it was impossible to halt, and in two minutes it crashed upon the polar ice pack.

"The cabin and part of the upper bracing were torn away, while the bag was carried by the wind in an easterly direction.

"Among the debris on the ice all the occupants of the cabin were found miraculously to be alive. Scattered on the ice around them was almost all the material which formed the cabin.

"Only a minute after the plunge, Nobile and his companions cried passionately: 'Vive Italia.'

### Started for Cape

"On the evening of May 30, about 12 kilometres northeast of Foyn Island, Captain Amarino and Captain Filippo Zappi and the Swedish scientist, Dr. Finn Malmgren, started with provisions for North Cape. They intended to cover 10 kilometres a day.

"They were left with Nobile, Prof. F. De Hounek, Lieut. A. Viglieri, Engineer Troiani, Motor Chief Natale Cecconi and Giuseppe Biogi, radio operator.

### Others With Airship

"The other members of the crew remained with the dirigible. They will have food enough for three months and are supplied with complete equipment.

In the group with General Nobile there are two injured. One of them is already convalescent. The other, suffering from a leg injured below the knee, will recover eventually."

General Nobile said the ice had broken up a little and open leads were showing between the floes. He gave his position last night as 80 degrees, 38 minutes north, 26 degrees, 55 minutes, east.

Radio communication between the Italia's survivors and the base ship Clitta Di Milano, which was difficult last night, was good today.

### Will Try it Again

Among the Americans who fished salmon at the Hart's Island Pool last season was Dr. George Parker Holden of Yonkers, N. Y., a noted angler and author of several works on fresh water fishing. The doctor recently notified Raymond Currie that he was planning to return in July with a party numbering from four to six and would remain a week. The doctor has fished in many states of the union and also in Quebec but he caught his first salmon at Hart's Island pool.

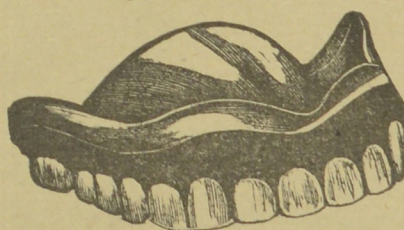
