LEO LOMSKI BATTERS WIN OVER LATZO

Brooklyn, N. N., June 13—A blight in the form of a foul blow, a right to the body that stretched Pudgy Pete Latzo writhing on the canvas in the sixth round, ended a furious light heavyweight battle tonight with the disqualification of Leo Lomski, slugging Pole from Aberdeen, Washington.

It was a discouraging ending to one of the fastest and most exciting clashes of natural sluggers New York has seen in many a day. The end came after Latzo, fighting as a man possessed had battered Lomski to the verge of a knockout with a series of smashing volleys to the head.

The crowd of 18,000 that had flocked to the big National League ball yard rose almost to a man and hissed Lomski—the fair haired boy a few moments earlier—from the ring. The fans plainly showed that they believed Lomski on the raggedy edge of defeat, took the "best way out."

Latzos showing against the man who knocked Tommy Loughran down twice last winter in a title match was little short of amazing.

After the first two rounds when Lomski hammered the former welter weight champion's body with lusty short right smashes, Latzo swarmed all over his rival, battering him with left and right hooks to the head and body, until the Aberdeen woodsman barely could stand.

Lomski scaled 175, Latzo 170½.

PREFER A MOTOR CAR TO A BABY

Oxford, England, June 13—"Do not for the sake of a motor car, which perhaps you could not otherwise afford deprive yourselves and the country of children. There is a great deal of selfishness in this matter, and it is rather growing."

This appeal to young people was made by Dean Inge of St. Paul's Cathedral, at the inaugural meeting of the Oxford Eugenics Society, at which he condemned what is called "The Bungalowoid System."

Young couples, he said, were settling down in small houses with no spare bedrooms, and were taking care to have no children.

"That is not the way to fulfill one's duty to the next generation," he continued. "We are populating the country from the worst stocks." Those classes which are the best are not reproducing their kind. The better class of artisan is also reducing in numbers.

"On the other hand, dwellers in slums have a high birth rate, and the feeble-minded have the highest birth rate of all.

"It cannot be denied that the members of the learned professions, and officers of the army and navy are not inferior for intelligence and physique, and it is a dangerous symptom that these classes are dwindling while the feeble-minded are increasing so rapidly. There is no question that the upper middle-classes are the cream of the community."

The government, he said, is taking the cream of the working classes, and was educating them at the expense of the taxpayers to enable them to take the bread out of the mouths of professional man's sons.

The knowledge which was at the disposal of educated people should not be withheld from the population as a whole. As far as possible, the slums should be abolished. He said he does not think that measures for sterilization would ever be introduced into this country, and he was not certain that it was desirable.
