IMPERIALS AGAIN DOUBTFUL WINNERS

Imps Are at Least Tied by 6 to 3 Victory Over Devon Last Night at Queen's Square-Devon's Early Lead Overcome by Timely Hitting.

The Fredericton Imperials evened things up in the York County playoff series by a 6-3 victory over Devon in 5 innings at the Queen's Square diamond last night. Each team has now won 2 and one more game will be played this evening to decide the series and declare a provincial playoff entrant. One of the largest crowds of the season attended last night's game.

Devon opened the scoring in the second and by clean hitting produced two runs. Another in the third gave the visitors the commanding lead of 3 runs to none. But the Imps characteristically, started the ball rolling in their half of the third. Hits by Cain, Thompson and Kierstead and slow fielding by Devon allowed four tallies to tickle over giving the Imps a one run lead. The Imps strengthened their lead in the fourth when they secured wo more markers.

Eddie Dinsmore hurled good ball for the locals and was touched for only 5 hits; three of them being bunched in the second. "Johns" Keene experienced difficulty on the slab the local hitters lining out 9 hits. Murray Kierstead and "Snap" Thompson each got a pair; one of latter's was a triple sending in a
