

CAPITAL CITY IN STORM'S GRIP THIS MORNING

Electrical Storm in City
Between One and Two
O'clock This Morning
—No Damage Report-
ed—Rainfall of 33 in.

One of the worst electrical storms of the year came upon the capital city "like a thief" between the hours of one and two o'clock this morning, and lasted for about an hour. Heavy peals of thunder with brilliant flashes of lightning caused more than one citizen to awake and peek timidly through the windows. It is quite probable that some of the more nervous ones refrained from going back to bed until the conclusion of the fireworks festivities. Inquiry this morning brought no report of any material damages in this locality. An estimate from the Experimental Station this morning showed that .33 inches of rain fell during the hour.

First Since July

Last night's storm was the first electrical one since early this summer. The last big storm occurred on July 11th when considerable damage was done. Seven bulls and a calf belonging to R. L. Young of Taymouth were instantly killed while huddled under a tree near the Young home. Damage also was done to electric wiring about the city and elsewhere by the last storm.

Long Season

With the coming of the fall season storms of this intensity will become scarcer, with rainfall coming more consistently. Some of the old farmers predict a long autumn season with plenty of fine weather throughout, but the likelihood is for the usual heavy rainfalls during the latter days of fall.

Fair Preparations

Midweek Market

A large quantity of vegetables were on hand this morning at the midweek market at Phoenix Square. Apples, both eating and cooking as well as Golden Bantam Corn made appearance. The apples sold for prices ranging from 30 cents to 50 some luscious golden bantam corn sold for 25 cents a dozen. Other prices were as follows: Potatoes, 80 cents a bushel; cucumbers 20 cents a dozen; tomatoes, ripe 65 cents a box; carrots 5 cents a bunch; beets 5 cents a bunch; cabbages, 4 for 25 cents; hazel nuts 20 to 25 cents a pound; eating apples 40 to 50 cents; cooking apples 30 to 40 cents; squash 5 cents a pound; corn 25 cents a dozen.

THIRTY THREE OF GRADUATES ARE EMPLOYED IN CAN.

Of 41 U. N. B. Graduates
of 1928 33 are Staying
in Dominion—Only 4
Go to U. S.—7 Gradu-
ate Study.

Of the forty one members of the 1928 graduating class of the University of New Brunswick, thirty three are living in Canada, according to the gleaned from an investigation which was suggested by articles in a prominent Canadian magazine which stated that large numbers of the graduates of our eastern universities go to the United States.

May Take Schools

Now that the schools have opened it has been possible to find out how many of these graduates are teaching in Canada. Six of them are teaching in various schools scattered throughout this country while only one is teaching in the United States. Employed in the scientific industries and engineering professions in Canada are 10 of the graduates, while only two are so employed in the country to the south. 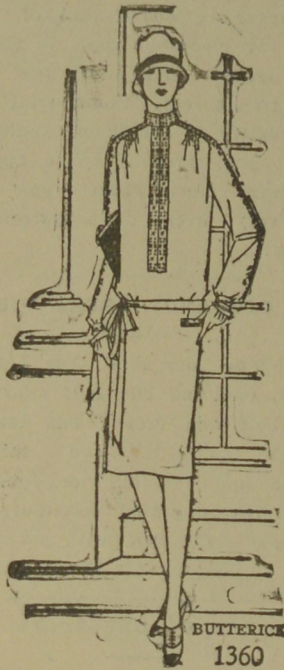
