### EIGHT KILLED

Montreal, July 23—Eight persons lost their lives in three level crossing accidents in Montreal and district over the week-end and four others were injured, one of them critically. In two of the accidents the drivers were trying to beat the trains to the crossing while the third case the car stalled in the path of an approaching train.

### PASSENGERS KILLED

Boston, July 23—Two passengers were killed tonight and a score injured when a four car train on the Atlantic Avenue loop of the Boston Elevated Railway let the tracks at a curve where the loop leaves the main line. The cars piled up on the trestle and firemen were called to rescue those on board.

## ROUSING WELCOME GIVEN THE HON. R. B. BENNETT, K. C., BY MONCTON FOLK

Conservative Leader Revisits Old Scenes in County of His Nativity—Accompanied by Sister—Will Address Largest Gathering Ever Seen in Westmorland County.

Moncton, July 23—Hon. R. B. Bennett, K. C., M. P., Conservative leader, was today given a royal welcome by a large number of Moncton citizens on the occasion of what will be his first extended visit to his native province for several years. The large gathering that assembled at the C. N. R. depot to greet the Conservative chieftain as he stepped off the Acadia train from Montreal at 2 o'clock was a thoroughly representative one. Hon. Mr. Bennett was accompanied by his sister, Miss Mildred Bennett, and with Dr. O. B. Price, M. P. for Westmorland, they moved around freely amongst the large number present, exchanging friendly greetings and recounting anecdotes with old friends.

Particularly interesting were the reminiscences of Hon. R. B. Bennett's school teaching days at Irishtown, when Albert Hennessey and Patrick Larracey, two of his pupils of 40 years ago, came up to welcome him, and they recounted with him happenings that took place during his early days of teaching in the settlement.

To them he was still the same "Dick" Bennett, who was in his teens during the evenings after school ably defended the principles and platform of the Conservative party against the expositions and arguments of the staunch Liberals of the old school who gathered at the home of "Cob" Sullivan, where the young teacher boarded, and who were endeavoring to turn his convictions towards the pats of Liberalism.

After exchange of greetings were over, Hon. Mr. Bennett and his sister left by motor with their brother, Capt. Ronald V. Bennett, and Mrs. Bennett, of Sackville, for their native county of Albert, where the afternoon was spent visiting the old Bennett homestead at Hopewell Cape, as well as relatives and many old friends of the family in that vicinity, after which they returned to Moncton and proceeded to Sackville for the night and

where tomorrow morning the Conservative leader will address the pupils at the summer school at nine o'clock.

Tomorrow afternoon Hon. Mr. Bennett will officially open his Maritime tour, which will extend over four weeks and carry him to all parts of the provinces by the sea. He will leave Sackville at 10 o'clock for Hillsboro, where he, with his sister and brother, will be the guests at a luncheon of C. J. Osman, M. P. P., and Mrs. Osman at 12 o'clock. After this the party will proceed to "The Rocks," a short distance from the Hon. R. B. Bennett's birthplace, where a big picnic is being held and a fitting reception will be tendered the Conservative chieftain, commencing at two o'clock.

Thousands of people from Albert, Kings, Kent and Westmorland counties plan being there to do honor to Alber county's most distinguished son, and the reception that will be tendered him will, without doubt, be the greatest ever given a public man in this province. Hon. Lewis Smith, provincial Minister of Agriculture, will act as chairman of the gathering and addresses will be given by the Hon. Mr. Bennett, Col. Murray MacLaren, C. M. G., D. S. O., and Thomas Bell, members of the Federal Parliament for St. John-Albert, and by other leading Conservatives.

Following the picnic at "the Rocks" the Conservative leader and his sister will go to Saint John, where on Wednesday, Hon. Mr. Bennett will address the Canadian Club at noon and will be the guest of honor at a banquet to be tendered him in the evening by Conservative friends.

On Thursday morning he will leave Saint John for Digby en route to Halifax to open his tour of Nova Scotia, after which he will visit Prince Edward Island and conclude his Maritime tour in the eastern, northern and central parts of New Brunswick.

## SPARKS CIRCUS AND POLAR BEARS

Men have been known to sign as sparring partners with kangaroos, have elephants walk over them, and tigers jump over them. But now comes Franz Woske with a brand new stunt. He puts on wrestling bouts with Polar bears.
