## Keating gets Winning Tally in Overtime for Saint John

**St. John Fusiliers Defeat Capitols by 3 to 2 Score in Overtime Period—Game Fast and Exciting—Southern Team Show Scoring Punch in Sharp Shooting Offensive—Another Record Crowd Witnessed Contest—Diminutive Center Flash Gets Winning Counter for Soldier Team—(Capt.) Aldy Clark on the Wing for Winners—Two More Section Games.**

The second successive overtime game, with a similar 3 to 2 score, resulted last night at the Arctic Rink before a crowd of approximately six hundred fans, when the Saint John Fusiliers broke the 2-2 deadlock in the first five minute overtime period to win from the threatening Green and White sextet.

In many instances it was the exact replica of last Thursday night's game against the league leading Moncton sextet, the game was not as fast, however, all of the excitement being bundled into the last few minutes of play when the whole Capitol squad were striving desperately to shove in the tying counter.

Keating, the diminutive and flashy centre cog of the Soldier machine back shot the winning tally into the Capitol net, when he grabbed a loose puck and taking advantage of the momentary lull in the local defense noise, skated through and put the rubber in four and a half minutes after the overtime opening.

### Near Score in Mixup.

The Capitols commenced an offensive rally and were finally rewarded in shooting in what looked like a good one, but referee overruled the goal judge's decision on the play, counting that the goaler had been charged. In the mixup around the net, the puck was evidently pushed over, however, that net also was pushed aside and it was a regular melee for a few minutes. When things got straightened out Referee Archie Williams faced the puck off again, overruling the goal judge, who had shown the light, evidently thinking it was a fair goal.

### Fusiliers Check Heavy.

The southern city placed a heavy team on the ice and their checking was noticeably rugged. Using a more frequent and better passing game on the front line, the Fusiliers led by their tricky little centre man, Keating making many dangerous rushes into Capitol territory.

The game started fast. "Pee Wee" Harrison, Chalmers and Si Keenan, started on the front line with Charlie Wade and McKenna on the back division. Saint John used the same team throughout, using a relief only once, Mountain going in for Keating in the latter part of the game. The Fusilier front line composed of Aldy Clark, with his high powered shot, Keating and Thompson was doing some good offensive work. Both teams were using individual attempt, rather than combined rushes. The puck was carried back and forth, the goalies being called on to stop quite a few long shots, which harmlessly careened against the big pads.

### Chalmers Off For Trip.

Early in the period "Ev" Chalmers, U. N. B. poke-check artist was chased for tripping. Soon after "Aldy" Clark after being warned once or twice was given two minutes for consistent off-side play. In the latter part of the period the Green and White were aggressive and Wilson, Saint John goaler stopped numerous fast shots.

### New Players Add Punch.

Bartlett, former Amherst player who has been recently transferred to the southern city and Ferguson, a northern N. B. product, was a husky and effective duo on the Fusilier back guard, Ferguson particularly, offending with long rushes. Ferguson, by the way, stands off the ice higher than any player seen here this year.

### Clark Gets First.

Clark counted the first tally of the game, when he took a pass from Thompson, the stocky wingman, the

disc flashing into the net before Hickson had a chance to save. Just before the first period ended the fast skating Keenan measured a clean shot from the front of the cage and slammed it in for the tying counter.

The second period resulted in two more tallies, each team securing one to tie up the second session. Thompson, Saint John wing was given a two minute rest for tripping as the period opened.

In about four and a half minutes of play, Ferguson planted the rubber for Saint John's second and leading goal. Play was fast, Fredericton becoming rather aggressive in their offensive rushing. Chalmers was put off two minutes for tripping. On solo attempts, Aldy Clark nearly pushed a couple of tallies over, but Hickson in the local nets foiled the formidable Aldy by some good stops and quick clearing. The Capitol shooting was away off now, and their long shots were harmless.

### Capitol Team's First.

On a mixup in front of the Saint John net, Chalmers batted the tying counter in, evening the count at 2-2. There appeared to be several Capitol players right in on the goal tender. The southern city defense were not anyways hardy at the time. The period closed with a fast pace, furious solo rushes featuring.

Good goal tending was a feature of the scoreless third session and the large crowd were all keyed up for the winning marker by one of the opposing teams. They were disappointed, however, for the last session proved to be a hard fought scoreless one, with both squads battling for the marginal tally.

### Keating Gets Winner.

It remained for Keating to whisk in the deciding one, when in about four and a half minutes of the first five minute period, he picked up a loose puck and flashed a shot, backhanded at the Capitol net custodian. The disc nestled high and in the inside of the twines. Score 3-2.

In the final five minutes Fredericton tried desperately to score and St. John tried as hard to keep them from netting the rubber. The Green and White offensive rally nearly culminated happily, when McKenna's shot from the wing, slid under the goaler's feet, but the local charge on the goaler caused Referee Archie Williams to overrule the goal judge who called it a goal. In the closing minutes Wilson had a trying time in goal and did some miraculous net minding.

Coach Larry McLean used plenty of shifts. Charlie Irvine and Edgar Wade were used frequently on the forward line and defence respectively. Saint John had "Brad" Gilbert, that once brilliant and now veteran hockey player in reserve and Mountain was also ready, but only once was a relief called, Mountain serving for Keating in the second period.

The game was clean and the penalties were minor infractions. Several of the players received cuts, but none were serious and they were able to continue play immediately. Keating, Clark, Ferguson and Wilson were the bright lights of the Fusilier outfit, while defensively the Capitol team were brilliant.

## DELANEY WINS BOUT IN 29 SEC. WITH FOOTER STAR

**Just Used One Punch For Knockout—Uzcudun Wins by Knockout—Belanger Lost On Foul.**

New York, Jan. 16—Jack Delaney, Bridgeport, contender for the heavyweight title, celebrated the opening of his new campaign for Gene Tunney's title by knocking out Sally Montgomery, former Centre College football star, in the first 20 seconds of a scheduled 10-round bout at the St. Nichols Rink here tonight.

The rapier of the north, fighting for the first time under his new manager, Joe Jacobs, smashed the Chicago heavyweight just once on the jaw.

Montgomery crashed to the canvas in Delaney's corner, rolled over twice, and was counted out with his body half through the ropes.

Rushing from his corner, the former light heavyweight champion who relinquished his crown to mingle with the weightier battlers, danced about Montgomery for ten seconds. Feinting on opening for his right, Delaney slashed his left fist to Sully's jaw and the bout was over.

### Uzcudun Wins.

New York, Jan. 16—Paulino Uzcudun, the Basque woodchopper and one of the contenders in the heavyweight division, knocked out Ed. Keeley of Boston, in the second round of a 10-round feature bout at the New Broadway Arena, in Brooklyn, tonight.

### Belanger Loses.

Buffalo, N. Y., Jan. 16—Frisco Grande, wiry, Filipino, won on a foul from Frenchy Belanger of Toronto, National Boxing Association flyweight champion, in the fifth round of their scheduled 10-round bout here tonight. The blow, which landed in the groin, was palpably low and Referee Dick Nugent stopped the fight.

## SUCCESSOR OF JOHN J. McGEON IN NEAR FUTURE

New York, Jan. 16—It appears now that if John McGraw has any idea of grooming a successor to himself as manager of the Giants he must look for some one besides a second baseman.

Frank Frisch and Rogers Hornsby, the two keystone workers who have been picked in recent years as heirs-apparent to the McGraw throne, both have gone away from here on short notice, a circumstance that lends color to the expert theory that the money interests behind the Giants desire to keep the "little Napoleon" lashed to the helm.

The veteran coach, Roger Bresnahan, if he has any managerial ambitions, has the advantage of not being a second baseman.

McGraw will be 55 years old next April. His health has not always been the best in recent years, but the Giants may reasonably expect him to retain active charge of the team for five to ten years more.

## RICKARD AND TUNNEY LITTLE THEIR TROUBLE

**Gene Will Get Wish to Fight Twice—Both to be Under Tex—Champion Will Train Soon.**

New York, Jan. 16—Differences between Tex Rickard and Gene Tunney over the latter's defense of the heavyweight championship in 1928 were smoothed over this week, and everything now points to smooth sailing towards a few more millions for the promoter and titleholder.

Tunney will have his wish and fight twice this year, but both fights will be under Rickard's direction. By this simple and obvious compromise, both parties to what never really was a very serious disagreement, were satisfied.

The heavyweight champion will swing into action later in the month, when he starts training for an exhibition bout at Houston, Texas, on February 11. On that date, Gene will box three of his sparring mates two rounds each for charity.

Rickard will go to Miami on January 18, at which time the official announcement of Gene's next appearance in the ring in defence of his title may be made.

Any possibility of a further rift between Rickard and the champion seemed to have been removed by the promoter's announcement that a guarantee of \$100,000 would be posted to Tunney's credit here in New York.

## BATHURST BEAT ATLANTICS 4 TO 2

Moncton, Jan. 16—Maintaining a pace that fairly beggars description the Bathurst hockey team defeated the Atlantics here in the Arena tonight, 4 goals to 2. Oldtimers, who watched the struggle, voted it the most exciting and fastest game seen here in many a long day, and they did not deny the North Shore boys right to victory. The three former local men, Blair and Ken Carroll and Dud James, who compose the forward line of the Bathurst team, showed up exceptionally well.

The bright spots in the Atlantics work was Fatty Gould who accounted for both tallies of the locals on individual rushes, and the sparkling net minding of Percy McKenzie, who stopped a ton of rubber.

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
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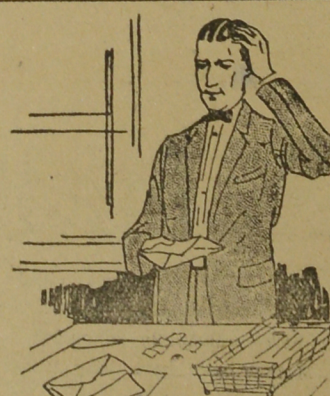
