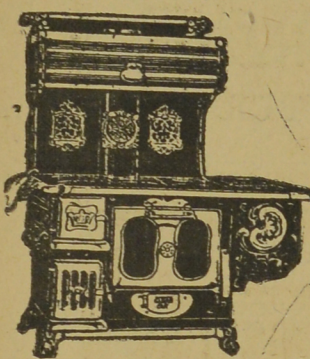

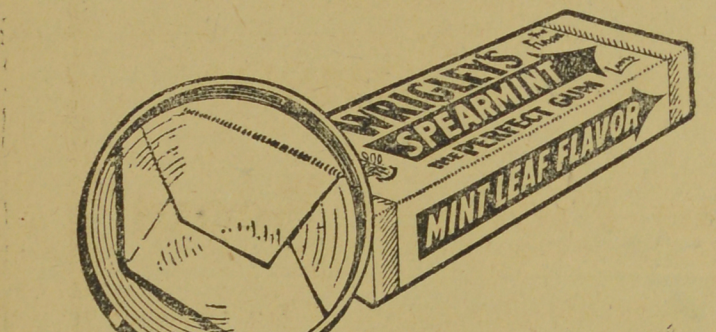

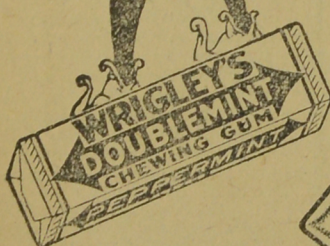

representatives in this Legislature to press upon the Government and the Hydro Commission the need of electric power. That portion of the Province to which I refer is the lower Saint John River Valley and as one of the representatives of that important district I want to take this opportunity of stating that the people there are demanding that electric power be produced for their requirements from some source so that they may enjoy the benefits and the avenues to progress which cheap electric power alone can make possible. I hope and believe that the time is not far distant when the lower Saint John Valley residents will be enjoying the benefits of hydro.

Agricultural Developments.

The announcement in the Speech from the Throne that the Department of Agriculture will extend the District Representative service so that there will be a District Agricultural Representative for each County in the Province will, I feel sure, meet with general approval throughout New Brunswick. There is no department that requires active officials more than the Department of Agriculture. What can be accomplished by aggressive work is shown by what has been done in the extension of club work. I am pleased to report that during the past year there has been established in the County of Queens three boys pig clubs, the first to be instituted in our County, and I have been asked by some of our leading farmers to look into the possibility of having one or more calf clubs established this year. No county in this Province, Sir, offers better opportunities for agricultural development than does the County of Queens. Particularly is this true of the dairy industry. Queens County's almost boundless marshes provide good grazing grounds and there is a great territory which would supply interval hay of the finest quality for dairy cattle. But if the dairy industry is to be developed to any marked degree in Queens County there must in my opinion, be established at least two creameries at such strategic points as Gagetown and Hampstead to which the farmers would bring their milk and cream and be assured of a convenient, centrally located market for their products. What has been accomplished in the Province in connection with the expansion of the dairy industry during the past year, as a result of which there has been an increase of 32½ per cent. in dairy production in New Brunswick, is indicative of what can be done in Queens County and I look forward confidently to the requirements of the constituency I have the honor to represent being given the necessary attention by the Department of Agriculture this year.

The Poultry Exchange.

The Minister of Agriculture is to be congratulated upon the progress made by the New Brunswick Poultry Exchange, which showed a marked increase during the past year in its activities, in supplying chicks to the farmers and in giving them the benefits of improved marketing conditions for their eggs and poultry. I feel that I am well within the mark, Mr. Speaker when I state that the Horticultural Branch of the Provincial Department of Agriculture is a very live and energetic division, but this branch should be given the financial resources to expand its operations. The Provincial Horticulturist is a very competent and efficient official, but there is a need for more field work and a closer supervision of packing. The Saint John river valley offers virtually boundless opportunities for the extension of the apple growing industry and it has already been proven that New Brunswick grown apples when properly marketed demand the highest prices.

Land Settlement.

In connection with the activities of the Department of Agriculture I feel that the Province of New Brunswick is to be congratulated upon the Land Settlement Scheme which is the basis of the immigration agreement which has been entered into by our Government with the Dominion and Imperial Governments. Under this scheme one hundred selected families will come to New Brunswick annually during the next five years from Great Britain and in addition we are assured of a steady influx of suitable settlers from Denmark, the Scandinavian countries of Northern Europe and also from the British Isles. New Brunswick offers opportunities for these people who will find in this province conditions more like those to which they have been accustomed than they would find elsewhere in Canada and I feel certain that we can absorb in a profitable way the fine class of settlers now being brought into this Province.

Mineral Development.

The adoption by the Legislature at its last session of extensive changes in the Mining Law and mining practices of the Province may be said to have had beneficial results beyond reasonable expectations. Usually it takes years before beneficial results flow from changes of mining policies but when it became known that the Province of New Brunswick had brought its Mining Law up to the standard of the provinces of Quebec and Ontario in which provinces mineral development is playing such an important part in the prosperity, it was but a much shorter time than anticipated before New Brunswick was attracting the attention of many qualified to investigate and who were also provided with the financial resources necessary to undertake development of an extensive nature.

The Antimony Mine.

As a result of what has been done we already have mineral development being commenced on an extensive scale in several sections of the Province and properties which were known to exist but which had been lying dormant because of the lack of either sufficient capital or modern methods to make possible their successful exploitation are now being operated or are to be operated in an extensive way. We have an example of this in York County where a well-organized company have obtained control of the Antimony Mines and some of the leading mineral experts of the country have advised that New Brunswick through the operation of these Antimony Mines at Lake George stands in a position to take a foremost place in the antimony trade of the world, which heretofore has largely depended on China for its supply of antimony. There are indications that another rich antimony deposit exists on the borders of Queens and Kings Counties near Mountindale, and in that same locality, not very far removed from this antimony deposit there is a rich copper deposit, the operation of which on an extensive scale is to be undertaken. Already a sample shipment of ore has been sent overseas to Swansea, England, and we are told that the assays have proven highly satisfactory to those who are interested and who are now prepared to proceed with development.

New Brunswick Coal.

While the operation of the coal mines at Minto has not been as steady or as rushing as we might like to see it, we can congratulate ourselves upon the fact that we have not had the difficulties at Minto that there have been in some of the other mining areas in the Dominion during the past year. The mining operators at Minto have lately commenced to advertise their product and to urge upon the people of this Province to burn New Brunswick coal. I am glad of the opportunity to raise my voice in support of this campaign. There is produced at Minto coal of as high a quality as required for ordinary domestic and steaming purposes. Minto produces good coal and there is no good reason why much larger percentage of the production of the mines there should not be used in the Province of New Brunswick by our own people and to a much larger degree than at present by the large transportation companies operating railways in this Province.

Railway Cooperation.

While I say that the railway companies might burn more New Brunswick coal than they do at the present, I feel that we should give credit where credit is due, and in this connection I wish to express gratification at the aggressive action that has been taken by the transportation systems in the encouragement of the development of the mineral resources of the Province of New Brunswick. The Canadian National Railways have had a very efficient representative in New Brunswick as a mineralogist for some months past, and it has been very largely through his efforts and through the hearty cooperation of the Canadian National Railways with the Provincial Department of Lands and Mines that several of the substantial developments which are now being entered upon are being brought to fruition. For all this, I know that the people of New Brunswick are thankful to the Canadian National Railways and I know that the Government have been pleased with the fine spirit of cooperation that has been shown by the Department of Natural Resources of that system. All that the Government have done towards the encouragement of mineral development has been along the right lines and I hope that the investigation work which has been carried on will be extended to an inquiry into the possibilities of development of some of the numerous coal deposits in sections of Queens County which in some cases are considerably removed from the Minto district.

The Provincial Police.

The Provincial Police Force which was organized during the past year has, in my opinion, Mr. Speaker, already justified its existence. There was a need in this Province for such an organization to police the districts which were absolutely without police protection of any kind. In the selection of the Commissioner to assume the duties of organizing the force the Government went to the Royal Northwest Mounted Police and were fortunate in securing the services of the present head of the Provincial Police who through the careful selection of members of his force and by the application of the knowledge he had personally acquired through years of experience has already been successful in building up an organization which is a credit to the Province and has the endorsement of the law-abiding people of New Brunswick.

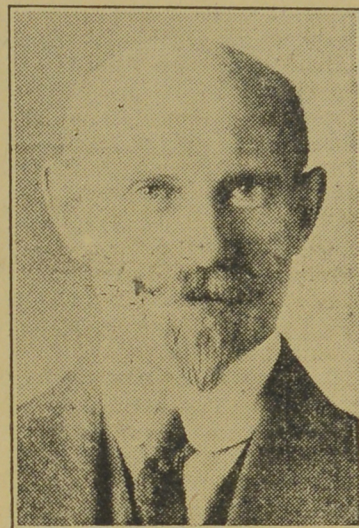
A Good Record.

Colby Smith) has so ably dealt with the various subjects referred to in the Speech from the Throne that I feel it is not necessary for me to take up further time of the House or to attempt to duplicate what he has so well said.

Mr. Price-Green comes to New Brunswick at the invitation of the Bureau of Provincial Information to give a series of addresses which it had been hoped could be extended so as to include visits to Moncton and other centres to arouse a mineral consciousness, on the part of the business men of the Province, but pressure of other duties have made it necessary that his coming visit to this Province be restricted to Saint John and Fredericton.

Heavy Rain Storm.

The heaviest rain storm of the season set in yesterday afternoon and continued until late in the evening. The snow in this section has nearly all disappeared and the streets and sidewalks have been left in a slippery and dangerous condition.

Debate Adjourned.

MR. DYSART moved the adjournment of the debate.

HON. MR. BAXTER moved that further consideration of the Address be made the order of the day for Tuesday next.

HON. MR. BAXTER moved that a Committee of five be appointed to nominate all Standing Committees, and that the Committee be Hon. Mr. Baxter, Mr. Atkinson, Mr. Brooks, Mr. Dysart and Mr. Doucet.

HON. MR. LEGER laid upon the table of the House the municipal returns off assessed values and bonded indebtedness of practically all the municipalities in the province; the report and accounts of the University of New Brunswick; the report of the Public Utilities Commissioner and the report of the Superintendent of the Provincial Hospital.

HON. MR. LEGER read a memorandum of agreement with W. W. Hubbard for the taking and publishing of the synoptic report. It was concurred in and the official reporter assigned a seat on the floors of the House.

The Valley Railway.

HON. MR. BAXTER introduced a bill, an Act to provide for an extension of time for the completion of the St. John Valley Railway from Centerville to Andover, and said he desired to inform the House that he had just received a communication from Sir Henry Thornton enjoining as to terms under which the Valley Railway would be sold. It was to be hoped that this meant some action would shortly be taken in the matter and the road taken over by the Canadian National.

HON. MR. BAXTER introduced a bill, an Act to amend Chapter 100 Revised Statutes, respecting the suppression of fires. He said the Board of Fire Underwriters asked for an amendment to enable them to assess themselves for fire funds in connection with the Fire Marshal's duties.

HON. MR. BAXTER introduced a bill to provide for references by the Governor-in-Council to the Supreme Court on matters of law, etc. The Act was largely a replica of the Supreme Court Act of Canada. These several bills received their first reading.

HON. MR. SPEAKER announced that immediately the House adjourned His Honor the Lieutenant Governor would unveil a memorial tablet in the rotunda and he would invite all present to attend the unveiling. The House adjourned 4.15 p. m.

ENGLAND TO TRY FOR AIR SPEED RECORD

London, Feb. 24—It has been officially announced that England will make an attempt for the air speed record now held by Lieut. Debernardi of Italy. The attempt will be made by Lieut. Kinkead in a supermarine Napier flying machine probably at Calshot airdrome. The second week in March has been selected at the tentative date for the test.

CHINESE DENS ARE RAIDED BY THE POLICE

London, Feb. 24—Acting on instructions of the Home Office, police staged simultaneous raids in the Chinese quarters of London, Liverpool, Cardiff, and other British ports in the belief that Chinese in Great Britain exceeded the number registered. It was alleged that traffic in drugs had increased as a result of the unregistered Chinese. These without satisfactory papers were arrested pending investigation.
