## EVEN KINGS MUST PARK THEIR UMBRELLAS AT THE MUSEUM

London, June 28.—The King and Queen of England, like 40,000,000 of their subjects, are seldom seen without a capacious umbrella hooked over one arm.

Once one has encountered a London downpour he can sympathize with them. The precaution, however, has its disadvantages, for should one want to drop into a picture gallery to get out of the wet he must relinquish the umbrella and run the risk of losing the elusive metal tag which alone will enable him to reclaim it.

But then even the King and Queen take this risk. When they paid a private visit to an exhibition of antiquities the other day his majesty's quick eye read the notice stating that all walking sticks and umbrellas must be checked at the entrance and immediately insisted on surrendering his own and the Queen's in spite of the Curator's remonstrance that an exception would be made in their behalf.

This incident no doubt recalled to the Queen another which amused her some years ago. She was visiting unannounced a museum in a small town in Norfolk, and the curator, not recognizing her, insisted on taking away her umbrella.

### The Queen Demurred

Unaware that this was the usual occurrence, Queen Mary momentarily demurred, but the curator was adamant, and realizing the situation, the Queen smilingly complied. His embarrassment later, when he discovered the visitor's identity, must have been considerable, but he might have been consoled by the fact that Queen Mary thought him a very conscientious guardian of the town's treasure.

The devotion of royalty to their umbrellas is not confined to the King and Queen. The Prince of Wales is almost always seen with his, crooked over his arm, and the Duke of York carries one on many occasions. Most of the royal ladies are particularly partial to their umbrellas in spite of the fact that they are usually within

easy reach of the shelter of a building or a limousine. No doubt umbrellas are popular with them, however, because they are often a help during long periods of standing on ceremonial occasions.

### Once Weapons

In bygone days it was said that the royal umbrellas were in reality weapons in disguise—a legend perhaps inspired by the existence of a sunshade lined with chain mail, which belonged to Queen Victoria. But whatever the reason, the curious fact remains that royalty has ever had a profound regard for its umbrellas and to this day the whole of England follows suit.

## Of Interest to the Women

### VANILLA FROZEN CREAM

2 cups milk  
3-4 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon flour  
Pinch salt  
2 eggs  
1 teaspoon gelatine  
1 tablespoon cold water  
2 cups cream  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
Scald milk. Add sugar mixed with flour and cook in a double boiler for 15 minutes, stirring until the mixture thickens slightly. Add salt and eggs slightly beaten. Cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Add gelatine softened in cold water. Chill, add cream beaten until stiff and vanilla. Put in two refrigerator trays and freeze beating vigorously at half hour intervals until almost frozen. Recipe makes 12 servings.

### BANANA FROZEN CREAM

Bananas  
1-2 pint double cream  
1-2 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
Slice enough bananas to make one half pint put through colander with sugar. Put sugar through colander with bananas, but do not mix. Then whip double cream. Whip whites of eggs. Then mix the whipped cream with the whipped eggs and add the mixed bananas and sugar. Place in tray to freeze.

Follow the same directions with fresh strawberries. With fresh peaches use two thirds of a cup of sugar instead of one half cup.

### PEACH MOUSSE

2 cups peach pulp  
1 cup sugar  
2 cups double cream  
1-4 to 1-2 teaspoon almond extract  
1 teaspoon lemon juice  
Pare and crush the peaches and add the sugar several hours before the mousse is to be frozen. Put the fruit through a potato ricer add the almond extract and combine with the stiffly beaten cream.  
Pour into two ice drawers of the refrigerator or fill paper sherbet cups and place in the plans after carefully drying them. This will fill 30 cups, 10 to a drawer, or if packed directly in the drawers will make about 12 servings.

### APRICOT MOUSSE

3-4 cup sweetened apricot pulp  
1 cup cream  
Prepare the apricot pulp by rubbing canned or cooked dried apricots through a sieve. Sweeten to taste. Add cream beaten until stiff. Put in tray of refrigerator to freeze. Recipe makes four servings.

### STRAWBERRY MOUSSE

2 cups strawberries  
1 cup sugar  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 cup cream  
Mash the strawberries with the sugar and allow to stand for 20
