

FTON MAN DROWNED IN NASHWAAK

Edward Barrett of This City Met Tragic End in Black Waters of the Nashwaak Yesterday.

A tragic accident occurred at a late hour yesterday afternoon when A. Edward Barrett of this city met his death by drowning in the Nashwaak River while he was in swimming. Mr. Barrett was employed with Seymour and Currier, contractors, in constructing road along the Nashwaak River and at the time of the accident they were working about twenty miles up the river. Mr. Barrett was operating a stationary steam engine. He was over-heated and decided to go for a swim. So he plunged into the waters of the Nashwaak and waded the stream. When recrossing he struck off at an angle so as to come out where the workmen were. This necessitated his swimming a deep hole whereas in crossing the river he had not been in water over his knees.

Heard Cry.

Barrett was seen to spring into the hole and to strike out. He was able to swim. Suddenly a friend who was near heard a cry and looking for Mr. Bennett saw only his hand. The friend was unable to swim and ran for help. The unfortunate man came up once and then sank and was not seen again alive. The body was in the water about ten minutes and attempts were made to restore life. It is thought that death was due to cramps because of being over-heated. The sudden plunge of the entire body into the cold water would be liable to cause this and the manner of his sinking so suddenly and his crying out seem to indicate that such was the case.

The deputy-sheriff of Gagetown was summoned and attempted to arrest the man. The Indian fought with the deputy sheriff who had been injured and was in no condition to do battle with the mad "warrior".

Threw Sheriff Over Fence.




