## VISCOUNT HALDANE, NOTED BRITISH STATESMAN, PASSES AWAY AFTER A LONG ILLNESS

Cloan, Perthshire, Scotland, Aug. 19.—Viscount Haldane of Cloan, equally famous as philosopher and statesman, and former War Minister, died today after a long illness. He was 72.

Lord Haldane is credited with the reorganization of the British army that took place between the year 1905 and 1914 and permitted Great Britain to send a strong expeditionary force to France within a day after the Great War began.

It was his initiative that brought about a revision of the British general staff and the creation of a new army of "territorials."

Richard Burdon Haldane, created first Viscount of Cloan in 1911, was born in Scotland in 1856 of an old Scotch family. He was educated in Edinburgh University, later studied philosophy at Göttingen, Germany, where he first acquired his eagerness in the pursuit of German thought. Lord Haldane was possessed of ample means but early entered the law, where he made his name distinguished as an advocate and jurist, and politician.

#### Late John E. Kennedy

The funeral of the late John E. Kennedy colored resident of Devon who passed away at the Victoria Hospital on Friday afternoon following an operation took place on Saturday afternoon from the late home at Devon and was attended by relatives and friends of the deceased. Rev. I. F. Fierstead conducted the service following which interment was made in the Sunnybank cemetery.

#### In the Government.

He entered the British government in 1905 as Secretary of State for War in the Ministry of Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, and retained that portfolio until he was named Lord High Chancellor of England in 1912.

His early love for German scholarship told against him after the war commenced, and despite his record in creating a new army, he was excluded from the coalition ministry formed in 1915. That virtually closed his career in politics, although he remained a judicial member of the Privy Council and in 1924, forsaking the Liberal party, entered the Labor ministry of Ramsay MacDonald as Lord Chancellor.

Despite his age Lord Haldane enjoyed excellent health until early this year and predicted that he would live as long as his mother who died a centenarian a few years ago. He was taken ill in March but recently seemed to have improved. A few days ago his illness again manifested itself and yesterday became critical. He died today after a severe heart attack.

He is a lawyer and resides at Amherst, N. S.

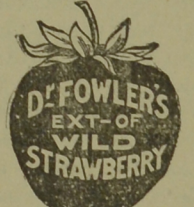
