MY NEIGHBOR SAYS

Silver spoons discolored by egg may be cleaned by rubbing them with salt before washing. Wash in hot, soapy water.

When little boy's colored suits fade with constant washings they may be bleached white if boiled in cream of tartar water. Allow a teaspoon of cream of tartar to each quart of water.

The best way to wash a dirty clothes-line is to wind it round a long board and scrub the line with a brush. This prevents its becoming tangled and makes it easy to wind when dry.

Save the wax paper that bread is wrapped in. It is excellent for cleaning off gas and coal ranges after frying or cooking a meal on them.

If the wooden handle of your coffee percolator catches fire and can no longer be attached to the percolator, a new handle may be purchased. They are easily attached.

CHEESE SANDWICHES

2 tablespoons butter.
2 tablespoons ground green pepper (in meat grinder).
2 tablespoons ground onion
½ cup juice strained from can of tomatoes
1-2 pound cheese cut in bits
¼ teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons cream
1 egg well beaten
Melt butter, add pepper and onion cook 2 minutes. Add tomato juice, cook 3 minutes. Add cheese and salt and cook over slow fire until cheese is melted. Then add cream and egg and pinch of cayenne pepper, cook 2 more minutes, stirring constantly. When cool, spread on bread. A nice sandwich is made by spreading the mixture on a slice of bread rolling it and fastening it with a toothpick. Put into an oven and brown, remove the toothpick and serve.

PEANUT OR ALMOND COOKIES

Stir together one cupful of softened butter and one cupful each of brown and white sugar. Add three-well beaten eggs one pound of shelled roasted peanuts finely chopped or half a pound of finely shredded blanched almonds, and about five cupfuls of flour sifted with two teaspoonfuls of soda, one quarter teaspoonful of salt and one table spoonful of cinnamon. Make into several rolls, two inches thick, chill and slice.

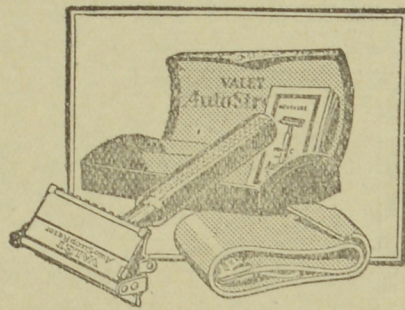

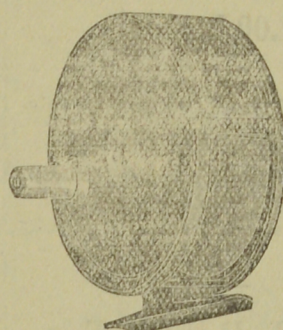
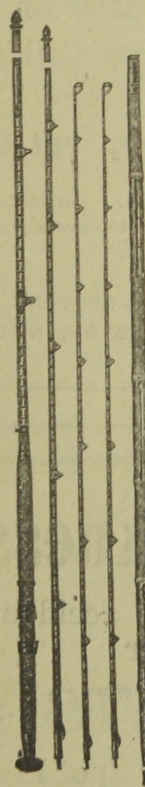
