

LIQUOR CASE  
UP IN COURT  
THIS MORNING

Local Taxi Driver Arrested Yesterday, Liquor Seized — Point Raised by Counsel This Afternoon.

On account of disagreement by counsel this morning in the police court over the right of a citizen to convey liquor to another's residence, irrespective of whether said citizen is a taxi driver or not, led to the liquor case of the King vs Frank Ames, being adjourned until 2.30 o'clock this afternoon for time to look into the law. The case arose over the arrest yesterday by Provincial policemen of Frank Ames, local taxi driver charged with having liquor illegally in his possession. Several bottles of liquor were found in his automobile on St. John street on Sunday and he was arrested and placed in jail and his car seized.

This morning when Ames appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick, he pleaded not guilty to the charge and had as his counsel, J. J. F. Winslow, K. C., Mr. West of the firm of Hanson Dougherty and West was prosecuting attorney.

It was contended by Mr. West that a taxi driver had no license to convey liquor to another person, while Mr. Winslow for the defence claimed that any person might have the privilege of taking liquor from his own house to another's. The seized liquor was produced and consisted of two bottles of ale and one of whiskey. The case is being continued this afternoon.
