Two Cases on Crown
Paper Completed on
Opening Day of Court
— Another Crown
Case on Thursday.

The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court which opened its November session on Tuesday morning, with Chief Justice Sir Douglas Hazen and Justice Grimmer presiding, after considering in two cases on the Crown paper, was adjourned until Thursday at one o'clock at which time another Crown case will be taken up. The first case on the crown paper, that of King vs Adolphe LeBlanc was heard yesterday morning, court considering in the matter. Ex Allison MacKay and J. C. Sherren appeared for the crown and W. E. McMonagle was contra. The case had to do with the storage of dynamite and the defendant is charged with irregularity in the work of storing dynamite.

The second case on the crown paper, ex parte H. Murray Lambert, was to compel the Moncton School Board to admit a Sunny Brae Pupil to Moncton High School. P. J. Hughes, K. C., showed cause for the school board against the writ of mandamus. Court considers in this case.

The third case which has been placed on the crown paper for hearing is that of King vs Cormier ex parte LeBlanc. It will be taken up at resumption of court on Thursday morning. This action arose out of issuing of a writ of certiorari to quash the finding of a magistrate which upheld a superintendent of the New Brunswick highway division in the construction of a piece of road through private property in Kent County. LeBlanc the owner of the property is indignant over the trespass over his property and claims that the superintendent acted beyond his jurisdiction, and as a result is taking steps to have the judgment quashed.

Midweek Market
The midweek market at Phoenix Square this morning was about up to the usual Wednesday morning market. There were plenty of apples, potatoes, vegetables and meats on hand and a fair number of buyers. Eggs were scarce and sold for 65 cents a dozen. Apples sold for prices ranging from \$2 to \$6 according to the variety. Several farmers had deer meat and sold it for 8 and 12 cents per pound; turnips, 80 cents per barrel; apples \$2 to \$6 per barrel; cabbage \$1 a dozen; eggs 55 cents per dozen; butter 40 cents per pound; deer meat, 8 to 12 cents per pound.

Although there are still more than two weeks before the hunting season closes in the province of New Brunswick, two weeks in which the usual last minute influx of sportsmen will take place, yet the hunting season for 1928 is very obviously on its last legs. The closing two weeks will not likely swell the season's total record of game shot over much and soon the statistical heads will be busy delving into figures and preparing reports of the season's totals. The season closes, for both deer and moose, on December 1.

Sports Not Plentiful.
Though no exact reports have been made out yet, it is generally felt that the present season has not been as successful as in previous years, especially as regards tourist sportsmen from the United States. During the past several weeks there has been a dire scarcity of American sports. This may, and probably is, due to the re-

DR. JAMES PEAKE
PASSES AWAY
NEAR WINNIPEG

The Deceased Practiced
His Profession at Oromocto for Some Years
and Was Active in
Politics.

Word has been received here of the death at his home near Winnipeg, Manitoba, of Dr. James Peake, a well known physician who for a number of years practiced his profession at Oromocto and was prominent in the politics of the County of Sunbury. The sad news was embodied in a telegram received by Mr. Charles Clowes of this city, which stated that his death was sudden and unexpected. The deceased was sixty years of age and widower, his wife who was formerly Miss Willmot of Belmont, having died some years ago. Two daughters, Misses Ruth and Jean Peake survive. These young ladies have been visiting relatives at Oromocto and on the receipt of the news of their father's death Miss Jean Peake boarded the afternoon train for Montreal en route to Winnipeg.
