MAY HAVE SYSTEM OF NATIONAL BROADCASTING

Ottawa, April 12—Hon. P. J. A. Cardin, Minister of Marine, announced in the House this afternoon that the government was considering the adoption of a system of national broadcasting similar to that adopted by the British government.

"In view of the development in recent times of radio broadcasting, and having regard to the seemingly satisfactory condition now obtaining," Mr. Cardin said, "the government is giving consideration to the question of whether or not it would be generally advantageous to adopt a policy of national broadcasting along the lines adopted in this respect by the British government."

Mr. Cardin said that the radio broadcasting license of the International Bible Student's Association was cancelled on the strength of a large number of protests by the listening public. The complaints were that the nature of the so-called Bible talks broadcasted by the association was unpatriotic and abusive to all churches. The tone of the material broadcasted was to the effect that all organized churches were corrupt, the entire system of government was wrong and society should be condemned.
