## GENE TUNNEY MAY MIX FIRST WITH DELANEY

New York, Jan. 24—Jack Delaney, one of the principals in the present heavyweight elimination series, has filed a challenge with the National Boxing Association to box champion Gene Tunney, and it has been accepted. Joe Jacobs, Delaney's Manager, announced here tonight.

The National boxing group covers 46 States.

Delaney will demand an immediate bout with Tunney, without further eliminations, in the event he knocks out Tom Heeney on March 1, Jacobs said.

Jacobs stated he had signed Delaney to oppose Leo Gates, New York heavyweight, at Rochester, on Feb. 13, and for another bout against Jack McAuliffe 2d of Detroit at New Haven on Feb. 20. Delaney is down to box Battling Levinsky at Motor Square Garden in Pittsburgh on Feb. 6.

### TURF NOTES.

New Orleans, Jan. 24—Display, owned by Walter J. Salmon, is given top weight of 128 pounds for the New Orleans handicap to be run at the Fair grounds Friday, February 3 with a \$50,000 purse to the winner.

The list of nominations and weights announced by Joseph McLennan, racing secretary, contains 112 horses for the rich winter stake. Jock, being prepared for the race by J. F. Scorr, is assigned 126 pounds and the same weight is given Black Maria. Jock is expected to enter at top weight as neither of the other two horses is expected here.

## ST. JOHN HURLER TO TRAIN WITH SOX IN SPRING

Lloyd Sterling, Ace of the Fusiliers to Get Major Tryout—Pitched Against the Local Team Last Season.

Saint John, Jan. 25—Lloyd George Stirling, Saint John baseball pitching ace, basketball and tennis star, will make his debut this season in major league atmosphere, according to advices received here from Boston and instructions personally received by the 20-year-old twirler.

The Boston Canadian Press dispatch on Wednesday reads: "Lloyd George Stirling, of Saint John, N. B., is one of the two young pitchers who will make the southern training trip with the Boston Red Sox next month. Stirling, along with Ralph Stoker, Ardmore southpaw, was recommended a try-out by Hugh Duffy."

The local boy first came into baseball prominence during the season of 1925 when he pitched his team The Water Department, to the Maritime Championship. In the following year he delivered his war for the Saint John and in 1927 carried the Fusiliers to the title of N. B. Champions, losing in the Maritime play-offs to Springfield. Included in his phenomenal pitching feats, is recorded a one-run no-hit game, when he took the "mound" against the Bathurst nine during the play-off in 1925. Another occasion worthy of comment was the game in 1927 against the Martelloes, when he struck out 20 opposing batsmen.

## 3 WORLD CHAMPS PICK OPPONENTS BEFORE FEB. 16

Middle, Light and Welterweight Divisions Threatened—National Boxing Assoc. Gives Out Ruling.

New London, Conn., Jan. 25—The honor roll of logical contenders, from which three world champions must pick opponents for title fights before Feb. 16 or be declared null and void by the National Boxing Association, was discussed today by Thomas E. Donohue, head of the fistic union that controls boxing in 26 member States.

Amplifying an earlier statement, the association's executive served notice today that recognition will be given only to bouts "to a decision, at the stipulated poundage in each class, with certain men recognized by the association as challengers."

Middleweights named as foremost contenders for Mickey Walker's title are Jack McVey, New York; Dave Shade of California, Joe Anderson of Kentucky, George Courtney, Oklahoma cowboy, and the winner of the match now pending between K. O. Phil Kaplan and Maxie Rosenbloom, both of New York.

Joe Dundee, welterweight king, may choose his challenger from a list including Sergt. Sammy Baker, Ace Huddins of Omaha, Neb.; Tommy Freeman, Hot Springs, Ark.; Hilario Martinez of Spain, and My Sullivan, Minneapolis welterweight.

Contenders for Sammy Mandell's lightweight crown are Sid Terris, New York; Billy Wallace of Cleveland, Louis (Kid) Kaplan of Meriden, (Conn.), Billy Petrolle, the "Fargo Express," and two New York youngsters, Bruce Flowers and Joey Kaufman.

Chicago, Jan. 23—Joe Witry, Loyola University football and baseball star, has been signed for a tryout with the New York Giants.

Witry, who weighs 190 pounds and is 5 feet 10 inches tall, is one of the best catchers turned out by Loyola. He will report at the Giants' training camp at Augusta, Ga., March 1.

## DAVID C., 2.03 1-2 STILL GOING GOOD AFTER 18 YEARS

Descendant of Electioneer Won 50 Out of 90 Races in Long Career—Bred in Colorado Springs.

Boston, Jan. 25—If the old man with the scythe does not get busy, the 18-year-old trotter, David C., will race away and hide from him and go on winning races until the end of time. At least his campaign in New England last year and the fact he is ready for another season would indicate as much.

David and his western trainer, Ted Bunch, from Kansas City, Mo., were in the middle of things on the half-mile tracks, the Colorado bred gelding taking part in 17 races in Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Vermont and New York. At Malone, N. Y., Springfield, Mass., and Rochester, N. H., he was returned the winner, trotting his fastest miles in 2.09, 2.08½, 2.08¾, at each track, which is pretty fair racing for any trotter over half-mile tracks, to say nothing of one who is almost out of his teens.

This descendant of the famous Electioneer has been one of the busiest of race horses during nearly all of the past nine years. He has started in no less than 90 races and has been victorious in 50 or more. He has raced on the Grand Circuit with signal success.

Among others he defeated such good trotters as Kilo Watts, Peter Coley, Herbelwyn, E. Colorado, Great Britton and Princess Etawah in the famous Russian Handicap, August 10, 1922, at North Randall. Later in the year he took a race record of 2.03¼ at Lexington, Ky., and was supposed to have outclassed himself for all time. He was not raced the next year, but 1924 found him in the hunt once more and in 1926 he was good for 14 starts, of which he won nine, an average of .642—good enough for any league.

Few race horses have been of much account after their 12th year and there is no record of any other than David C., that was a 2.10 trotter on the half-mile tracks and a good race winner at 17. Perhaps the mountain air in which he grew up accounts for the heart and lung power he must surely possess, for he first saw daylight on the ranch of his breeder, Thomas W. Stark, near Colorado Springs, Colo. He raced the past year as a member of the stable trained by Ted Bunch for Mr. Allan J. Wilson, president of the Metropolitan Driving Club of Boston.

## BILLY COUTU IS SUSPENDED FROM CAN.-AMER. LOOP

Boston, Jan. 25—Billy Coutu of the New Haven Eagles stands suspended from further competition in the Canadian-American Hockey League because of his assault on George Redding of the Boston Tigers at New Haven, Sunday night.

It was Coutu's third major foul, which automatically suspends him. His case has not been taken up by Pres. Charles C. Clapp of the Canadian-American League as yet. Pres. Clapp was at New Haven Sunday watching the game, but departed for New York five minutes before the contest was over. The "fuss" occurred after he had gone. Clapp went to New York to confer with those interested in placing teams in the league in Newark and Hartford, and will not be in Boston until today.

The Boston players were in this city yesterday and said that the game was cleanly played excepting for the Coutu assault on Redding.

They spoke highly of everything else and regretted that the ex-Bruin lost his head and attacked their teammate with a stick.

Redding came home with the team with his head bandaged.

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

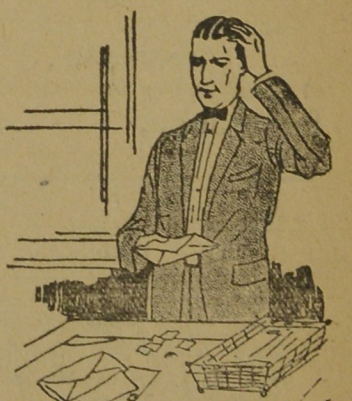
