## CANADA'S NATIONAL WEALTH HAS INCREASED BY THREE BILLIONS IN FOUR YEARS

Ottawa, April 2—Canada's national wealth increased by \$3,000,000,000 in four years. In 1921 the estimated aggregate of the tangible wealth of the Dominion was \$22,195,000,000; but in 1925 the total had increased to \$25,673,174,000 or \$2,772 per head of population. The computation is exclusive of undeveloped natural resources.

Ontario ranked as the richest province, according to the Dominion bureau of statistics, with estimated aggregate wealth of \$9,000,727,000. Quebec with estimated aggregate wealth of \$6,228,284,000 was second; while Saskatchewan, with a total of \$2,870,314,000 came third.

Alberta was fourth with aggregate wealth estimated at \$2,086,688,000; British Columbia fifth with \$1,983,420,000; Manitoba sixth with \$1,839,819,000; Nova Scotia seventh, with \$789,651,000; New Brunswick eighth, with \$643,588,000; Prince Edward Island with \$138,916,000; while Yukon was in tenth position with \$31,827,000.

### Per Capita Figures

While Ontario led in absolute wealth, the western provinces came first in per capita wealth. Saskatchewan held first rank with a per capita wealth of \$3,544; British Columbia was second with \$3,539; Alberta, third with \$3,459; and Manitoba fourth with \$2,909; Ontario was a close fifth with \$2,901; Quebec sixth with \$2,495; New Brunswick seventh with \$1,596; Prince Edward Island eighth with \$1,591; and Nova Scotia ninth with \$1,471; Yukon was tenth, but the per capita figure was not estimated.

Agricultural items, urban property and steam railways comprise the three largest items in the order named making up our national wealth.

### Agricultural Wealth

The total agricultural wealth in 1925 was \$7,832,942,000, representing 30.51 per cent. of the whole. This amount included the value of agricultural production in 1925 or \$1,708,567,000, to cover the average stocks of agricultural goods in the possession of farmers and traders and the amount invested in the preparation for the new crop. For urban real property, the estimated value in 1926 based on returns received from municipalities, was \$6,928,000,000 or 26.99 per cent. of the total wealth of the Dominion. This sum includes the assessed valuations of taxed and exempted property, to which was added one-third to provide for under-valuation by assessors and for roads.

### Money In Railways

The wealth invested in steam railways, computed from the cost of road and equipment, and distributed by provinces on the basis of mileage, amounted to \$2,881,366,000. This sum represented 11.22 per cent. of Canada's national wealth.

Tangible value of the forests amounted to \$11,341,613,000 or 5.23 per cent. Stocks in process, raw and finished products of manufacturing establishments, to which was added 100 per cent. as an estimate of the value of the manufactured goods in the hands of dealers, amounted in all to \$1,324,464,000 or 5.16 per cent. Household furnishings, clothing and other personal property amounted to \$1,200,000,000 or 4.67 per cent.

### Agriculture Per Capita

On the basis of the estimated population in 1925 of 9,269,000, the per capita investments in agricultural wealth was \$854. In urban property the per capita investment was \$747, in steam railway, \$311; in the forest, \$145 and in household furnishings and personal property \$129. The per capita wealth of all kinds was \$2,772.

In these connections, the so-called "inventory" method was employed. This method consisted in totalling the amounts known from various sources to be invested in agriculture, manufacture, dwellings and similar items.

### Streets Getting Bare.

The mild weather of the past few days is having its effect on the city streets. In many places the snow has entirely disappeared. The sidewalks in many parts of the city are also bare of snow.

## LAURIER HOUSE TO OPEN DOORS TO LIBERAL WOMEN

Laurier House, residence of the Prime Minister and formerly of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, will open its doors to Liberal Women from all over Canada on April 17. Right Honourable W. L. Mackenzie King has invited the visitors to the National Liberal Women's Convention to be his guests at a reception and tea on the opening day of the convention.

Arrangements are being made to accommodate an expected attendance of 1,000 at the banquet on the evening of April 18, when Mr. King will be the principal speaker, and Mrs. Norman F. Wilson, Chairman.

Mrs. J. H. King, wife of the Minister of National Health and Veterans' Welfare is convenor of the social programme.

On the arrival of the visitors in Ottawa on April 17, they will be guests at a luncheon in the Chateau Laurier of the Provisional Committee of the National Federation of Women's Liberal Clubs.

The same afternoon at four o'clock, under the convensorship of Madame E. R. E. Chevrier, fire of the Ottawa Member Parliament, a motor drive and tour of the city is planned. From five to seven o'clock, Mr. King receives at Laurier House. At 7.30 a half-hour concert on the carillon will be given by Mr. Percival Price, and later an opportunity will be provided for all out-of-town visitors to see the Parliament Buildings. At 9.30 the wives of the Cabinet Ministers are holding a reception in the restaurant of the House of Commons.

The intervals between business meetings on the second day of the Convention, are being left free for individual entertainment of the visitors.

## Here and There

British Columbia's forest rangers and patrolmen report a reduction in forest fires costs of practically 90 per cent. compared with 1926. The total loss this year was about \$214,000.

An air line between New York and New York city for freight, express and mail, is being considered by Halifax business interests, according to a report made to the United States Department of Commerce by Consul Eric W. Magnuson.

The Canadian Pacific Express Company has extended its service into the new gold field of north-western Quebec, reaching Rouyn over the recently completed extension of the Nipissing Central Railway. This extension provides a new and short route into the rapidly developing mining area.

Turkey raising is a coming industry in Alberta as a number of successes at various fairs would indicate. A recent move in this connection is the formation of the Alberta Bronze Turkey Breeders' Association, which is now active in promoting and extending the turkey breeding industry.


According to Dr. J. B. MacDougall, Assistant Chief Inspector of the Ontario Provincial Department of Education, the operation of the Canadian Pacific school car in northern Ontario has proved a more successful venture than the Department had ever expected. He stated that the progress of the pupils during the year of operation has been remarkable.

The Western Canada Grain Pool contemplates spending \$5,000,000 during the coming year in extensions to facilities in country elevators and terminals in Western Canada, according to George H. McIvor, General Sales Manager of the Pool, on a visit to Toronto recently. The building programme includes 100 or 150 country elevator in Alberta; 150 in Saskatchewan and 40 in Manitoba. At present there are 100 in Alberta, 730 in Saskatchewan and 50 in Manitoba.
