HOOF PRINTS

Chicago, April 2—State, district
and county fairs to the number of
over 400 have taken dates for 1928
in the 12 states from Indiana to the
Rocky Mountains and their offerings
for harness races will reach the
grand total of more than one and a
quarter million dollars.

The states with the number of
fairs in each are: Colorado 7; Illin-
ois 38; Indiana 26; Iowa 60; Kansas
29; Michigan 30; Minnesota 47;
Missouri 14; Nebraska 27; North
Dakota 8; South Dakota 12. Other
fairs that have not yet announced
dates will swell the number to
450 and add materially to the race
purses.

DREAMS THAT
HINCHCLIFFE
PARTY IS SAFE

Sydney, N. S., April 2—Local au-
thorities are wondering whether they
should be interested or amused over
a letter received today by Postmaster
D. Ross MacDonald from a woman in
Bridgeport, Conn., describing a dream
in which her son "saw and talked"
with Captain Walter Hinchcliffe and
Miss Elsie MacKay, the two aviators
who set out from England to fly the
Atlantic a month ago and have never
been heard from since. They were on
"an island ledge, it seemed," said the
letter, and had devised a shelter from
the wings of the plane. "It seemed as
if they could not reach land—rocks
and ledges and ice intervening—and
they told him it was near Sydney, N.
S."

The most intriguing part of the let-
ter is the woman's statement that her
son, whose age is not mentioned, had
never heard of Sydney, but remember-
ed the word and looked it up in an at-
las. The woman asked that her name
be withheld but furnished a stamped
and addressed envelope for the post-
master's reply, advising her "if there
is such a place and if ledges are to be
found where people could find shel-
ter."

COCOA BISCUIT

- 2 cups pastry flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1-2 teaspoon salt
- 6 tablespoons sugar
- 4 tablespoons cocoa
- 4 tablespoons shortening
- About 1-3 cup milk

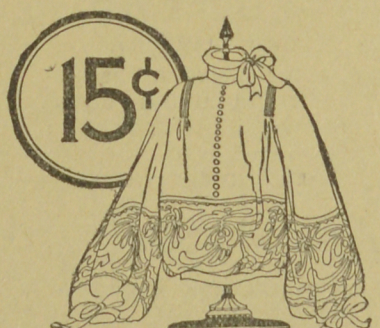
Sift all the dry ingredients to-
gether, cut in the shortening with
a knife and add milk enough to
make a soft dough. Turn out on a
slightly floured board. Roll or pat
out to desired thickness, shape and
place close together in pan and
bake in hot oven (450 degrees
Fahrenheit) about twelve minutes.

COCOA HARD SAUCE.

- 1-3 cup butter
 - 1 cup powdered sugar
 - 1-4 cup cocoa
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Cream the butter, add sugar, mix-
ed with cocoa, gradually and then
work in the flavoring.

STEAMED CHOCOLATE PUDDING.

- 1-3 cup butter
 - 1 cup sugar
 - 1 egg
 - 1-2 teaspoon salt
 - 2 cups pastry flour
 - 4 teaspoons baking powder
 - 1 cup milk
 - 3 squares chocolate
 - 1 teaspoon vanilla
- Cream butter and add sugar gradu-
ally; when well mixed add beaten
egg. Sift flour, baking powder and
salt together and stir into first mix-
ture alternately with the milk. Melt
the chocolate and add with the va-
nilla. Turn into small buttered
molds. Cover and steam about one

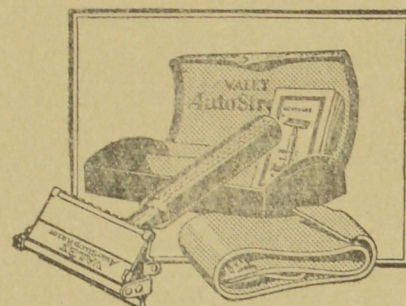
