Capitols Defeated by Sussex Puck Chasers

Sussex Colts Take Fourth and Last Game of Series From Capitols by 4-3 Score Last Night—Game Decided in Final Period by H. Radcliffe's Goal—Game Clean and Fast—Small Crowd Attend—Green and White Make Shift in Lineup In Second Session—Keenan and Irvine, Capitol Scorers—Keene Back on Defence—Few Penalties.

The Capitol hockey squad tried desperately but vainly to come out about thirteen minutes of play that of their losing slump in their Sussex got their winning goal. sex clash last evening at the Arctic Rink and the Colts romped away with a 4-3 decision after sixty minutes of hectic hockey which the crowd certainly enjoyed.

The second period proved to be the big noise and for awhile the Green and White sextet had the visitors from the Dairy Town worried. Starting the middle session with a one goal handicap the Capitols rushed play from the start "Si" Keenan playing a fast and tricky game throughout beside netting two of Fredericton's three tallies, flashed a shot from the blue line; the rubber striking Roach high in the breast and glancing into the net. This was shot two minutes after the opening of the period.

Capitols Force Play With Spares

Hunter, speedy wing man of the Dairy Colts scored the visitors' second counter on an individual attempt after about seven minutes of play in the second period circling down and sending the disc by Young into the Capitol nets. With the score two goals to one the management of the local squad sent "Knucker" Irvine and Creighton into the offensive and "Kato" Keene was shifted back onto the defence with Charlie Wade. Eloi McKenna regular defence cog who was a bit off form was sent to the box.

Pace Gets Faster.

Forthwith the Green and White began an offensive which nearly upset the dope, Sussex, tradition and any other name or word which could be recalled. The three youngsters Keenan, Creighton and Irvine went through the Sussex defence and on "Si" Keenan's fast shot which wasn't cleared quite quick enough "Knucker" Irvine batted in the tying counter from in front of the net; the goal coming at about halfway through the period.

"Si" Gets Another.

About thirty seconds after the tying one Keenan and Irvine went through again and "Knuckers" perfect pass enabled Keenan to again plant the water where it belongs.

This put the Green and White on top and it looked like more than an even chance for the Capitols to top the decision. They were featuring with a better passing game than has previously been shown and the two speed boys Keenan and Irvine appeared to be working good together in a short passing game. "Kato" Keene and Charlie Wade were effective on the defence, Charlie always in there with his steady play and rugged checking.

Wall Evens Count.

About one minute before the session ended Wall, curly headed center man of the Colts shot one by "Cliff" Young for the tying tally and the period closed with both teams trying long shots.

The third session proved interesting and exciting. With the score tied at 3-3 play was continuously fast both sextets working hard for the

one goal lead. It was not until about thirteen minutes of play that Sussex got their winning goal. Harold Radcliffe captain of the Sussex squad who played his usual fast and brainy game on the wing dented the strings on a solo rush and back handed shot which Young kicked at futilely. Sussex used defensive tactics from then out, shooting the puck down the ice and were booed by the crowd. Percy Radcliffe and young Lutz on the Dairy defence proved their worth in the trying final minutes when they stopped the savage Capitol offensive drives and whisked the rubber back down the ice time after time. The veteran Percy with his brother Harold are certainly towers of strength to the Colts and have been mainstays on the Sussex hockey teams for the past five or six years.

Play Fast and Clean.

Although the game was not as fast as previous games here this season it proved equally exciting and in the second period when the capital team threatened the supremacy of the Colts and took the lead he capitols fans went wild. Their joy was short lived, however, for the Colts, tied it up before the period ended, the Capitols failing to resort to a defensive game. The play through the game was fast and slow intermittently. The first period especially was dragging. Harold Radcliffe got the opening and only counter of the first period when he picked up a loose one and back shot the disc through Young's feet. There were but two penalties handed out by Referee Archie Williams, MacKenna in the first period for checking Hunter into the boards and Wall for tripping. Each got two minutes rest.

Capitols Shift Lineup.

The Dairy Kings used practically the same lineup as in all their games this winter; but the Capitols although starting with the regular arrangement made a complete change about half way through the second session. "Kato" Keene regular wing was relegated to the defence to team up with Charlie Wade. Although Keene played a steady game there it is obvious that his position is on the offensive line. "Knucker" Irvine and C. Creighton were sent into the front line and fitted in well with Keenan and Chalmers. Jake Lynch was used several times during the game but was not up to form.

The two goalers stopped some hot shots and then again allowed a couple of easy ones to lob through. However, the shots came thick and fast both guardians being called on many times for quick saves which they turned aside.

Will Begin a New Campaign For Crown—He Will Meet Leo Lomski For the Light Heavy Crown.

New York, Jan. 30—Old Mike M'Tigue refuses to be counted out by father time.

Dethroned twice as light-heavy-weight champion M'Tigue will begin another campaign which he hopes will end with the 175-pound title in his possession again when he meets Leo Lomski the Aberdeen (Washington) Assassin, in Madison Square Garden, Friday night.

Knocked out by Mickey Walker and badly battered by Tommy Loughran, in his last two important bouts M'Tigue who admits to 35 years by the record books is confident that he can conquer the rough tough Westerner and earn the right to meet Jimmy Slattery.

To Meet Slattery.

The winner of the M'Tigue-Lomski bout will meet Slattery and the survivor has been promised a title bout with Tommy Loughran, the title holder.

During his 13 years in the ring, M'Tigue has lost to many second raters but always he has had the stamina and courage to come back and score a surprising victory just when he was counted as through.

Lomski who had Loughran on the floor twice in the first round of their recent title bout but lost decision at the end of 15 rounds is a 7 to 5 favorite over M'Tigue.

Although devoid of boxing skill, Lomski packs a terrific punch and many boxing critics say he will eventually succeed Loughran as light heavyweight champion.

HUGH JENNINGS NEAR DEATH AT SISTER'S HOME

Former Star of Giants is Reported to be Near Death's Door—Was Stricken With Meningitis on Friday.

Seranton Pa., Jan. 30—Hugh Jennings one of baseball's most colorful figures was believed to be dying today at his sister's home here.

The former star of the New York Giants was stricken Friday with spinal meningitis. Four physicians in consultation at his bedside today said death was expected momentarily.

Jennings now 56 years old has been unconscious since his malady became acute Sunday night.

Jennings manager of the Detroit Tigers for 14 years later going to the New York Giants as assistant manager under John McGraw. Before the 1927 season opened he caused a stir in the baseball world by announcing that nothing could ever take him back to the New York team he explained his stand by saying he had been given an unfair deal by the owners and that when he suffered a nervous breakdown no one connected with the club even bothered to inquire about his condition.

New York Jan. 31—The New York Rangers lengthened their winning streak to four games when they defeated the Montreal Maroons by the score of 3 to 1 here tonight and retained their three point lead over the Boston Bruins in the American group of the National Hockey League.

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
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
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
