### Grant to Hospital.

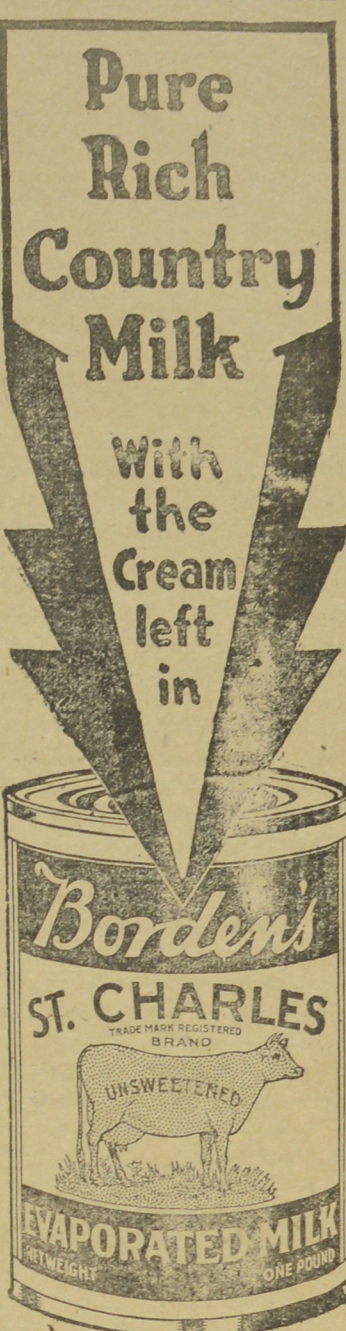
### Favors National Park.
