

FAMOUS TRACK STARS WILL BE IN HALIFAX MEET

Halifax, Aug. 7.—R. E. McKenzie, energetic president of the Pictou Amateur Athletic Club, plans to have many famous stars compete in the big athletic meet at the shire town on August 29.

If present plans materialize, and McKenzie says amendments have been completed, Nova Scotia track and field followers will see in action such world known runners as Joey Ray, Clifford Bricker, Johnny Miles, Clarence DeMar, Hughey McLeod, Silas McLellan, Billy Taylor and others compete in the big ten mile race, feature of the programme.

Besides these distance stars McKenzie hopes to show to Nova Scotia field experts Sabin Carr of Yale, Olympic pole vault champion and world's record holder. Lee Barnes, of the coast will be invited to compete with Carr in this event.

Leigh Miller, sensational Halifax sprinter now located in Hamilton, Ontario, and Howard McCurdy, Sydney flash will be the leading sprinters to take the short distances. Bill Smith and Reg Beazley of the Wanderers, will also be starters as will Ross Cameron, Frank Chisholm Forbes and others.

A capable list of officials have been selected to handle the events. Dr. John Logan, Frank Stephen and others are listed as the finish judges while William McDougall of New Glasgow will act as starter. Fritz Schaefer and others will also be among the officials.

This appears to be the finest entry list ever known for a track meet in the Maritime Provinces and the Pictou A. A. Club deserves praise for their efforts in making such a list possible.

Good Crowd of Spectators Witness Poor Exhibition at Devon—Imps Without Regular Keystone Sacker—Six Errors and Eleven Hits Cause of Massacre—Final Game to be Played at Queen's Square on Wednesday Night—Bill Rutter Gets Only Two Hits Off "Johns" Keene in Last Evening's Game.

Devon and the Imperials are now tied in the second section of York County League each having won four and lost four. The final and deciding game will be played at Queen's Square on Wednesday evening. Should Devon win, the championship will be theirs, but in the event of the Imperials winning a playoff will be necessary to decide the championship. Devon already has the first section tucked away and are making a strong bid for the second section.

Devon ran away with last night's game at Devon 12 to 0. The Imp team was all at sea by the loss of their second sacker, Leo Cain and used Garvie a pitcher, and Myshrahl an outfielder to plug the gap but both proved ineffective and the half-way region proved a regular sieve. Coupled with this was the fact that the local squad couldn't hit a ball. Two hits were all that were secured off "Johns" Keene, big Devon hurler, Rutter collecting both of them.

Imps Demobilized

Dinsmore, the young college pitcher hurled and was not effective as usual. He was found for eleven hits. These eleven bingles mixed in with six juicy errors accounted for the majority of the scores. There is no doubt the absence of Cain, regular second sacker destroyed the Imps morale and they floundered through the game half heartedly. A good crowd of spectators were on hand but witnessed a poor exhibition of baseball. "Kato" Keene and "Johns" Keene were the hitters of the evening each collecting three hits. One of "Kato's" was a two bagger. "Pop" Donovan, Imp receiver had ten put-outs and four assists. Dinsmore struck out 8 men and H. Keene 5. Watson McLean umpired behind the bat with Murray Quarterman on the bases.

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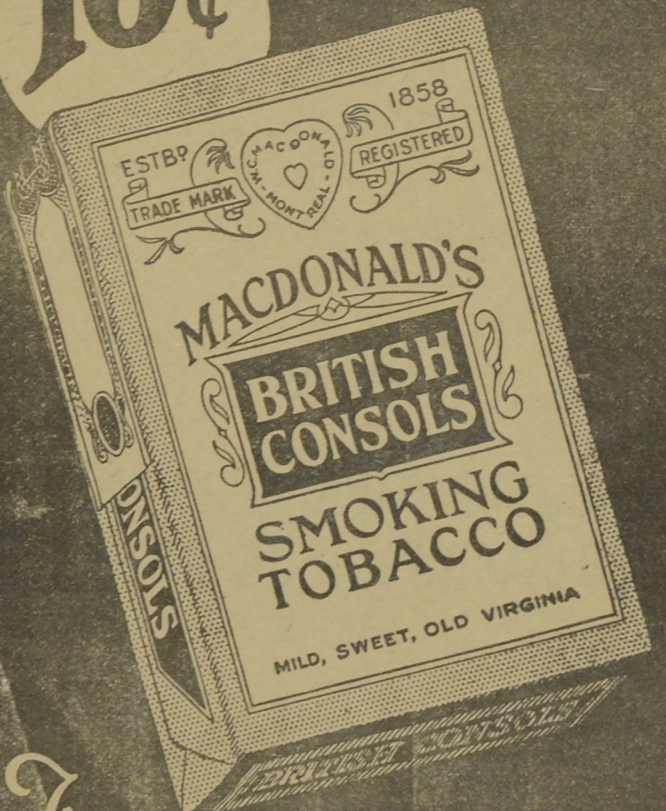
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
