THE N. S. ELECTION

Polling in the Nova Scotia provincial elections is taking place today under favorable weather conditions. In the contest of four years ago the Conservative administration led by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, was swept into power, with forty seats out of a total of forty-three, defeating a Liberal government which had held office for forty-three years. The campaign which closes today has been lively and rather bitter but there does not appear to be any doubt as to the result. The Liberals have no hope of winning, but feel confident that they can reduce the government's majority and this will probably happen. In the late House the Liberals held one seat in Victoria and two in Antigonish. It is predicted that in today's contest they stand a chance of making gains in Yarmouth, Shelburne, Guysboro Kings and possibly in one or two Cape Breton constituencies. It is possible that when the votes are counted they may have ten or twelve seats out of a total of forty-three.

CUSTOMS RETURNS SHOW INCREASE OVER LAST YEAR

The total revenue of the first six months of the present year shows an increase of \$59,513.95 over last year. Following is the report from L. C. Macnutt, Collector of National Revenues:

The revenue for September, 1927 amounted to \$103,172.18, a decrease of \$229.08 for September, 1928, as compared with the corresponding month last year.

The total revenue of the first six months of the present fiscal year, April 1st to September 30th, was \$484,366.32 as against \$424,852.37 for the same period last year, an increase of \$59,513.95 for the present year.

MADE 300 MILES AN HOUR IN A TEST FLIGHT

Calshot, Eng., Oct. 1.—Flight Lieut. Darcy Greig of the Royal Air force made better than 300 miles an hour today in a test flight in a Gloucester Napier seaplane.

Greig has been preparing for weeks to bring the world speed record to England. His present plane is similar to the machines built for the 1927 Schneider cup races. It is capable of more than 900 horsepower and is streamlined for terrific speed. The present speed record, 318 miles an hour is held by Italy.

He is also survived by four brothers and one sister. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon from the late home at two o'clock and from the Wilmot United Church at 2.30 o'clock. Services will be conducted by Rev. F. H. Holmes and interment will be made at the Rural cemetery.

BURGLARS MADE A HAUL AT BAIE VERTE

Shediac, Sept. 30.—Victory bonds valued at \$800 and a small amount of money were obtained by thieves who blew up the office safe in the general store of R. C. Goodwin at Baie Verte and escaped with these articles of merchandise. The total value of everything stolen is about \$1,000.

Chief of Police William E. Gunn of Shediac who was in the vicinity of Baie Verte today, was notified of the robbery. The break was discovered when the store was opened this morning to accommodate a customer wishing to buy gasoline. It is thought the store was entered late last night or early this morning. The robbers evidently entered the premises through a rear window, which they reached by a ladder.

Three suspicious characters who were seen in Shediac Saturday night are thought to have been the robbers. Provincial Policeman J. M. Boby of Fredericton on duty at Port Elgin is working on the case and police of several localities have been notified and asked to keep a watch out for the men.
