### TO HELP THE MARITIMES.

There will be a considerable gathering at the Lord Nelson Hotel in Halifax on Tuesday, Dec. 4, of next week, in connection with the Maritime Provinces Association in Toronto. A considerable number of representative public and business men of Nova Scotia have been invited to meet leading members of the Toronto Maritime Association. The meeting will take place at 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon and in the evening, at six o'clock there will be a banquet to which 200 citizens of Nova Scotia have been invited. The delegates from Toronto, who will be present are Prof. E. D. MacPhee and Messrs. E. M. Saunders, R. W. E. Burnaby and A. C. Pike all of whom were very active in looking after the welfare of the Maritime Province contingent which visited the Queen City in August last. The object of the gathering is to make better opportunity for placing Maritime Province made goods in the Upper Provinces markets.

### NOT TOO BIG.

The island of Jamaica has about a million people and a per capita annual import trade of about £5, 14s. of which Canada would be represented by about £1, the United Kingdom by £1 12s. the United States by £1 14s. and all other countries by the small remainder, writes F. L. Casserly, officer of the Canadian Trade Commissioner at Kingston, in the forthcoming issue of the Commercial Intelligence Journal. of the £5 14s. food, drink and tobacco would account for just under £2, raw materials (chiefly oil, gas, lime, coal and lumber) for about 14s. and manufactured goods for £3. The Dominion has a favored position in Jamaica's trade. In general, Canadian goods get a tariff preference of 5 per cent ad valorem over similar foreign goods; but there are certain items on which special and larger preferences apply—these articles being flour, butter, cheese, lard, condensed milk, meats, fish, apples and potatoes.

Dr. S. Parker Cadman of New York was asked recently by a member of his radio audience if he thought it was

better for a person to go to church and listen to a poor sermon or remain at home and hear a good one over the radio. In his reply he was decidedly in favor of the church goer. ance of his brother on Saturday morning at about nine o'clock, Fred Woodworth, of Durham investigated and by following tracks out on the ice in the Nashwaak river, soon came to a large hole in the ice, which had obviously been cut with an axe. His brother's hat and an axe were lying on the ice and there was no sign of the missing man. Mr. Woodworth was now thoroughly alarmed and fearful of what had actually happened he immediately notified the Provincial Police in this city and a search was made. At about three o'clock the body was recovered from the river and the suspicions justified that the elderly Woodworth had taken his own life.

The deceased is survived by his widow and two daughters and a brother, Fred Woodworth also of Durham Bridge. Funeral arrangements are now being made.

### PENN. STATE MAN SECURED BEST HEAD

Arthur Pringle, veteran guide, of Stanley has reported a larger number of bull moose on the Northwest Miramichi this fall than ever before in his recollection. Deer were plentiful practically all over the province, there apparently being more than ever.

### Record of 61 Inches.

The record moose for the season had antlers spreading 61 inches. It was shot by R. W. Crouse, of Norwood, Pennsylvania, who was one of a party of Pennsylvanians who were hunting with Imhoff Brothers, of Bathurst, as guides in the Tetagouche river district, Gloucester County. Mr. Crouse also shot two deer and a bear while on the trip and other members of the party shot two more moose, four more deer and another bear. The record moose of the 1927 season had antlers spreading 63½ inches and was shot by A. W. Christiani, of Keyport, New Jersey, and was the record head for all Canada last year. So far as known no other moose has been shot in Canada this season with antlers having a larger spread than New Brunswick's record head for 1928.

### No Figures Yet.

The Department of Lands & Mines have no figures as yet to show how receipts from game licenses for the 1928 season compare with the previous year's receipts. "Returns are now coming in to the Department from vendors all over the Province covering the sale of hunting licenses during the season but it will be a little while before a definite statement can be made regarding the total sale of licenses in 1928 as compared with 1927," Deputy Minister, G. H. Prince said on Saturday, "but there is every indication that it will be satisfactory. Returns are required from all resident hunters on or before December 5th by the Chief Game Warden giving the number of moose and deer killed and the counties where they were killed. Until these returns have been received we cannot give any definite figures as to the number of moose and deer that have been shot during the season ending today."
