

SPORT BRIEFS

Sandusky, Ohio., Dec. 1—Acute dilation of the heart caused the death of Donald "Tiger" Huff, local boxer, who collapsed during a contest here Wednesday night. Coroner A. R. Grieron declared, following an autopsy yesterday. Huff fell to the floor just before the end of the sixth and final round after his opponent, Emil Bartsch, had delivered a series of blows to the head. He was carried out of the ring unconscious and died an hour later in a hospital.

Bartsch, who fights under the ring name of Chuck Mangin, was arrested on a formal charge of manslaughter and released on \$5,000 bond.

Thompson Wins.

Buffalo, N. Y., Dec. 1—Young Jack Thompson, who knocked out Joe Dundee, welter champion, several weeks ago, scored a technical knockout over Sam Bruce in the last thirty seconds of their ten round battle. A left hook to the ear knocked Bruce through the ropes and into the laps of the spectators and he was unable to scramble back before the count of ten.

To Trembath.

Sheridan, Wyo., Nov. 30—Racing over 38 miles of snow-covered highway from Buffalo to Sheridan, in six hours and 23 minutes, Ned Trembath, diminutive runner from the coal mines at Acme, Wyo., yesterday won the annual Sheridan Post-Enterprise marathon.

FUSILIERS OPPOSE CHANGE IN HOCKEY SCHEDULE

Proposed Acceptance of Bathurst in South Loop Opposed as the Jump is Considered to be Too Long—Fredericton Will Continue in Loop.

The Saint John Fusiliers will oppose any attempt to replace the Fredericton hockey team with the Bathurst team in the southern section of the M. A. H. A. This decision was reached at a meeting of the players and management of the team held over the week-end.

It was decided that the long jump to Bathurst which would have to be taken at least twice during the regular season and the amount of the time required away from work by the players were too great handicaps to make the Bathurst idea feasible.

It was announced that it was unlikely that the University of Manitoba, Allan Cup holders, would be able to make an eastern trip, playing here

in the Christmas week. Negotiations were now being completed with the Queens University team to play here instead, and, according to present indications, the Queen's team would appear in Saint John on Dec. 28.

Queen's is one of the big three of Canadian college hockey, the other two being Toronto Varsity and McGill.

The players expressed the opinion that it was time they were getting in some work on the ice, as the regular league season will open in less than a month. It was reported that Moncton would get to work at ice practice this evening, and that several other outfits had been holding regular ice practices for several days.

HOTEL BUILDING IN CANADA HELPS OUT CITY BUILDING TORONTO HAS BIG ONES

Among the new things called into being by the strongly-working force of the spirit of change in this country is the great hotel. Hotels there have always been but the largest the Canadian people had become accustomed to were but modest hostels compared with the big hotels of today. The typical new hotel of many storeys, with its hundreds of well-aired well-heated rooms and luxurious appointments, is of more than palatial architecture. These very costly structures are part of a new order of things that has been ushered in within recent years.

The credit for the inauguration of the new order belongs mainly to the motor car. The motor car made formerly somewhat sedentary population of Canada a mobile one. Canadians are now a people on the move. Of course they have not reverted to the nomadic state, but have enlarged their means of intercourse and their power to enjoy life. The automobile and the good roads it summoned into existence enable people to travel and see more of their own country—Nothing else has done so much to transform that necessary of community life, the hotel.

Not many years ago the idea was prevalent that the average hotel could not afford to maintain the ordinary accommodations for the traveling public if the profits of the bar trade were withdrawn. When the bar was abolished a very large number of hotels went out of business. There was much complaining on that account and some thing was done to encourage people to go back into the business, but the rural hotels have largely disappeared. In the cities the doors of many formerly much frequented inns were closed. Possibly at the outset they were not so much missed, but in due course the strong demand created by the automobile made itself felt.

In Toronto the need for more hotel service became pressing and the great addition to the King Edward was put up. The demand continued to grow. The latest of Toronto's newly-completed hotels is the Ford. By the middle of next year it is expected that the Royal York, erected by the C. P. R., will have its vast structure ready for the accommodation of guests. London, Ontario, has now a new hotel that cost about a million dollars. Oshawa is soon to have a great hotel, and other Ontario cities have hotel projects. In Halifax the Lord Nelson Hotel was formally opened on Tuesday. It adds one more to the great hotels of the C. P. R. system.

Travel especially motor car travel has spread chains of great hotels over this continent. In their turn the hotels are stimulating travel. People who formerly would not leave home to go far for the reason that there was no attractive hotel to welcome them, will now go because there is plenty of hotel accommodation of the desired kind. Cities that are so fortunate as to have fine hotels ought to turn them to account in their advertising literature. Toronto has become a great convention centre because it has been able to give hotel accommodation to delegates. It will become greater in that character and greater as a meeting place generally as its hotel accommodation becomes more spacious and charming. The city that has fine hotels ought to be shrewd enough to keep that fact before the public. It can in this way draw tourists, to the general advantage of local business. Hotel-building can thus prove to be a factor in city-building. Up-to-date hotels are the cities' houses of welcome, public houses in the largest sense of the word. Mine Host works for the city as well as for his inn.
