

SNOW WELCOMED
BY WOODSMEN
IN PROVINCE

Lumbering Operations
Speeded by Recent
Fall of Snow — Some
Parts Heavy, Others
Light.

The heavy snowfall throughout the Province of New Brunswick during last week will be a boon to operations in the woods, where the lumbermen are putting in the last few weeks before breaking up for the Yuletide season. Conditions are as good as in past years, according to report from the various logging sections, and in some places there is more lumber being cut than was at first anticipated. Especially is this true in some of the southern counties.

The weather has remained ideal for cutting operations during these past few weeks, but now that other work is going forward, there is need for more snow and the appearance of such would be enthusiastically received by the lumbering magnates. In the northern counties, such as Restigouche, Northumberland, etc., snowfall has been ample and lumbering conditions are of the best. In the south, in this county and along the St. John river valley, conditions have not been so acceptable, there being little snow in a majority of places. York County, however, has had seven inches of snow and at most places, logging activities are being very satisfactorily advanced.

Lights Out
Practically all of the city was in darkness last night between the hours of five and six o'clock on account of the failure of the lighting system. The trouble was found to be in the engine at the power house and about an hour was taken in the repairing process. Inquiry at the Maritime Electric headquarters this morning resulted in the statement that the lights are now back into good working order again.

Spoke at St. Paul's
Rev. J. B. M. Armour, secretary Canadian Bible Society gave an interesting address at the St. Paul's United Church yesterday morning which was listened to by large congregation. Rev. Mr. Armour was sent to Canada during the present year to succeed the late Rev. Dr. Cooper who was the former general secretary for Canada. His address was broadcast through radio station CFNB. With 61 Inch Spread

trict.

New Brunswick's big game hunting season for 1928 closed on Friday with every indication that the Province has well maintained its record as the mecca for moose and deer and the sportsman's paradise. Hunting conditions have generally been good, and the number of non-resident hunters coming to New Brunswick from the United States this season has been especially gratifying for a year in which the U. S. Presidential elections were being held.

Conditions Good.
While more moose have been shot in the southern half of the Province the moose with the biggest spread of antlers came from the northern half, so honors are more or less even. Albert County and along the Bay of Fundy was the territory in which moose were most plentiful, according to reports received from the Chief Game Warden's staff, but more moose have been taken from the Miramichi district than for some years and (Continued on Page Four.)

INQUEST IS NOT
NECESSARY IN
DURHAM DEATH

Coroner Decides Inquest
Unnecessary in Dur-
ham Drowning—Bur-
ial Takes Place From
Home of Brother.

After viewing the body of Partlow Woodworth, sixty-year-old farmer of Durham Bridge, who lost his life by drowning in the Nashwaak river opposite his home on Saturday morning around eight o'clock, the coroner, Dr. D. W. Ross, of this city decided that an inquest was unnecessary and ordered the removal of the body for burial. The body was taken to the home of Fred Woodworth, brother of the deceased from whose home burial will take place.

Cap and Axe.
The body of the drowned man was discovered floating in the water by Constable Mugridge of the Provincial Police, a short distance from where he had evidently cut a hole in the ice and jumped into the water. The body was taken from the water at about three o'clock on Saturday afternoon. An axe and cap was found on the ice near where the man was drowned. Became Alarmed.

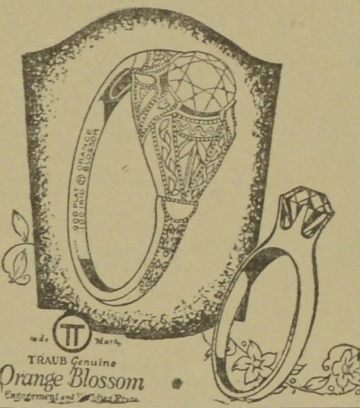
