A NORTH SHORE BOOM

The Campbellton Graphic, a Liberal paper, is responsible for the statement that the town of Dalhousie is on the eve of the greatest development ever witnessed on the North Shore of New Brunswick. The Graphic has reference to the preliminary work now being carried on in connection with the construction in the shore town of Dalhousie of a mammoth paper mill by the International Paper Company. An unprecedented building boom has been started and we are told that "new building lots are changing hands daily and additional sites for dwellings are being mapped out." The Campbellton paper goes on to say that "for at least once in its history Dalhousie is experiencing a real estate boom. Scores of lots have been acquired by those taking an active part in the development and hitherto unsaleable property has acquired a high market value. Business generally is picking up very satisfactorily and the coming winter promises to be an active and prosperous one for all business men of the town."

Premier Baxter on taking office promised to develop the great water power at Grand Falls, without cost to the people. This promise has been kept to the letter. He also promised that the development of Grand Falls would be followed by the erection in the northern part of the province of huge pulp and paper mills and we have the evidence of a Campbellton Liberal newspaper that this promise is in a fair way of being satisfactorily fulfilled.

PROBING FIRE LOSSES AT NELSON, N. B.

Newcastle, Oct. 7—"We have not completed our investigations but evidence now in our possession absolutely justifies an original suspicion that the fires were of incendiary character and an arrest will follow in a few days." was the statement made last evening by Captain D. A. Noble, Maritime representative of the Fire Underwriters' Investigation and Loss Information Bureau of Canada, when interviewed concerning the recent destruction by fire of the saw mill and planing mill at South Nelson reported to be jointly owned by the International Paper Company and the Fraser Companies, Limited.

Captain Noble and H. H. McLellan, New Brunswick fire marshal, have been here for some days investigating the cause of the fire as mentioned. Disclosures are promised by the officials who said they would leave no stone unturned in order to bring the guilty party to justice.

Regarding the insurance, it is stated there was no insurance carried on the large mill which was valued at about \$100,000 but a sum which would not cover the total loss was carried on the smaller plant. The mill had not been operating for some time and there were no lumber piles in that vicinity. The damage done by the fire was estimated at \$130,000.
