Caused by Lamp.

The fire was caused by a lamp which exploded when the owner of the house, Mr. Hudson, tripped and fell over a mat. The flames spread quickly and soon the whole house was a mass of red the flames licking at everything. The house is a new one and was not entirely completed at the time of the fire. Workmen have been working at the house for some time past. This probably aided the flames in their work of destruction. However, with the exception of water and smoke damage the house is intact.

The premises are occupied by Mr. Hudson, his wife and three children, who were all in the house at the time of the fire. It is understood that little or no insurance is carried. Quite a crowd collected around the spot last night to see the conflagration.
