TOOK A LONG CHANCE

The passing of the days has extinguished all but a tiny spark of hope for Lieutenant Commander H. C. MacDonald, who began a flight from Newfoundland to England with the expressed intention of matching or bettering Lindberg's record. There is an overwhelming probability that his plane or his engine failed him, that it plunged into the sea and that he succumbed quickly. The only hope is that he might have had the luck to survive a forced descent and was picked up by a nearby ship which had no wireless apparatus. Some have suggested that he may have reached some out of the way island off the coast of Europe; but that is beyond consideration. MacDonald, though an inexperienced aviator, was an expert navigator and he was well able to keep on the course he had mapped.

The little plane was reported by a steamship at a point 700 miles from the Newfoundland coast. Another ship reported a mysterious flare dropping from the sky 150 miles from the Irish coast; but the time did not accord with MacDonald's flight schedule or available information concerning the winds which determined his ground speed.

His effort was that of an adventurer. It could not have been of any benefit to aviation, for others had made the flight before him under less favorable conditions and with less efficient equipment. The odds were immensely against his success. Mastery of the trans-Atlantic airway is not to be achieved either by the taking of such narrow chances or by the reckless sacrifice of life. Still, in mourning him it should not be forgotten that had he succeeded the world would have rung with praise for his achievement. That is the way of the world.

Had Fine Camps.

Mr. Cremin's sporting camps on Nepisiguit Lake and adjoining waters are the equal of any in the province. A few years ago he built and equipped for a New York sportsman a lodge which cost upwards of \$10,000 and had Mr. D. J. Shea, a Fredericton plumber go up and instal a water system. A man of jovial disposition, always good natured and a master of woodcraft, the late Mr. Cremin was universally esteemed, and by all those with whom he came into contact and he is going to be greatly missed.

The deceased was one of the incorporators of the Fredericton Silver Black Fox Company, owners of a large ranch at Kingsclear and had been a director of the concern from the start.

The late Mr. Cremin was fifty-eight years of age and is survived by a widow formerly Miss McGrand of Keswick Ridge, Esther and Marjorie, students at the U. N. B. and Gertrude and Eleanor. Miss Esther Cremin was a member of a jolly student party which motored to Sackville to witness a football game arriving home at six o'clock. Lockland Cremin of Winterport, Maine is a brother of the deceased. Another brother, David, expired suddenly here three years ago.

The funeral will take place tomorrow morning leaving the house at 8.45 o'clock. High Mass of Requiem will be celebrated by Very Rev. Dean Carney at St. Dunstan's Church at nine o'clock and interment will be made at the Hermitage.
