American Sportsman  
Had Splendid Opportunity to Bring Down  
Forest Oddity — Retarded Growth.

Here is a story from an American sportsman, B. Kuhn, who has been hunting big game in the forest district of the Miramichi. He reports that he was quite surprised the other day while playing his sport in the deep woods of that part of the country, when he discerned a large moose in the distance with one side of his head amply adorned in beautiful antlers, while the other side was barren. Thinking his eyes had deceived him the sportsman crept nearer with an idea of getting a better view and possibly bringing down this huge monarch of the forest.

On coming nearer the wondering huntsman found that his was no optical illusion, but that the animal was just as he had first supposed. Only one side of his majestic head was crowned after the manner of his fellows, while the other side showed nothing but swarthy bump.

This, the hunter thought, was an ideal trophy to take back from the hunt as a token of his activities in the game reaches of New Brunswick. So he prepared to bring the monster to earth. Fate, however, intervened, and just as the excited sportsman had got settled to take a shot at his quarry the ungainly monster bolted into the brush and the disgusted hunter was left to mumble foolishly over the "cursed luck" as he slowly regained his feet.

Regarding the absence of horns on one side of the animal's head, it is quite possible that he may have sustained an injury to that side of his head before the proper growth had been reached. This would, in all likelihood, stunt further growth without retarding in any way the growth of the rest of the body. Or an injury later in life might have been the cause of this unusual appearance of the forest mogul.

At any rate we agree with the hunter, that the animal would certainly present a very grotesque appearance with but one side of his head arrayed in the usual antlered glory.

ON BRIEF VISIT  
TO FREDERICTON

Arrived From St. John  
This Morning by Special Train and Proceeded to Woodstock  
Over Gibson Branch.

Mr. E. W. Beatty, K. C., President of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, made what might be called a flying visit to the city this morning. Accompanied by Mr. J. M. Woodman, divisional superintendent and other officials of the road he arrived from Saint John by special train and left within an hour for Woodstock by the Gibson branch.

President Beatty was present at the opening of the Lord Nelson Hotel at Halifax early in the week and yesterday made a trip of inspection over the Dominion Atlantic Railway, a subsidiary of the Canadian Pacific. He reached Saint John late last night and came on to this city this morning.

Shortly after his arrival here President Beatty boarded an automobile and went for a drive about the city, stopping to make calls on several local business men of his acquaintance. His

COOPERATIVE  
PURCHASING  
IS SUCCESSFUL

Business of N. B. Agricultural Societies had Substantial Increase This Year — Officers Elected Yesterday.

New Brunswick Agricultural Societies United, the co-operative purchasing organization through which the Agricultural Societies of the Province buy their commercial fertilizers, handled approximately \$300,000 worth of fertilizers during the past year, their business exceeding that of the previous year by approximately 50 per cent.

The annual meeting of the organization was held yesterday afternoon at the Parliament Buildings when the report of the secretary showed that materials sold and distributed during the year included 9,071 1-4 tons of fertilizer chemicals and 466 2-3 tons of mixed chemical fertilizers. A most interesting announcement made at the meeting was that a rebate of \$2.80 per ton on each purchase, had been remitted to the participating Societies, the total sum of these remissions being over \$25,000.

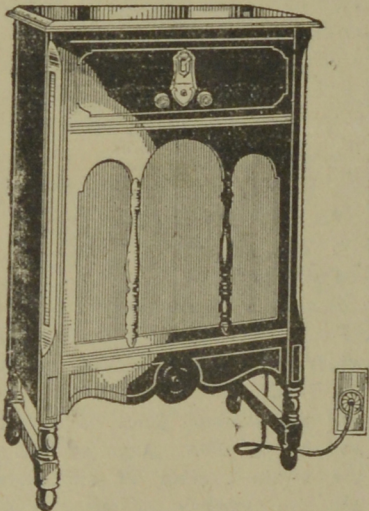
