## OFFICERS APPOINTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL FOR THE ENSUING YEAR; SOME SMALL SALARY INCREASES

The City Council held a special meeting last night in committee and in the council chamber and besides routine business the annual appointment of officers were made. On recommendation of the Finance Committee the salaries of several officers were increased. Among these were: Treasurer F. I. Haviland, E. R. Colter, Assistant, J. J. Malloy, Chief Engineer and Melvin Bearisto who besides being appointed Assistant Fire Chief was given a \$200 increase in salary.

Ald. Thompson moved that Fraser Saunders be appointed to the position of City Marshal vice Murray Patterson, Ald. Jewett was the only one who voted against the motion. Ald. Mitchell moved that the salary of J. J. Malloy, chief engineer of the pumping station be increased from \$125 to \$135 per month and also that H. G. Hoben and Robert Bayley be appointed auditors to the school board. The motion was adopted.

Mayor Clark mentioned that the U. N. B. had applied for use of the Opera House for their Acadia debate on Friday evening. On motion it was decided to comply with the request.

Mayor Clark said that the Opera House sadly needed renovation and a discussion arose as to the rates charged for the rental of the building. His Worship declared that each party who hired the hall had a different rate charged and he thought that the rates should be uniform. After discussion the matter was referred to the City Hall committee.

The question of a motor pump for the city arose and a heated argument ensued. Ald. Mitchell had discussed the matter with F. G. Barbour, C. E. of Boston, and he had said that a motor pump would be useless to the city except to pump direct from the river.

## CITY OF LONDON ADMITS ENTRY OF KING AND QUEEN

London, March 27—King George, accompanied by the Queen, today carried out a quaint centuries' old ceremony when he paid a visit to "the city" on the occasion of the opening of the new headquarters of Lloyd's, the world's largest association of underwriters, in Leadenhall street, not far from the Bank of England.

A silken cord of red, stretched across the roadway at the site of Temple Bar, once a gate of the wall of old London, barred the King's way as he approached in the royal carriage, drawn by four horses. On the other side was the lord mayor, resplendent in his cloak of ermine and crimson, with other city officials also in full robes. The King wore the undress uniform of an admiral of the fleet.

Spectators gathered there watched his majesty ask for admittance, just as in the days of long ago when the city jealously guarded its rights and was hemmed in by a wall. They saw the lord mayor advance to the side of the carriage and presented him the ancient pearl sword of the city, gift of Queen Elizabeth, together with the keys, as a symbol of the temporary surrender of his rights to his sovereign. The King did not take the weapon, but merely touched it, indicating its restoration to his lordship, together with the keys. Both the King and Queen then said a few gracious words, the cord was lowered and they proceeded to Leadenhall street.
