

DECLARES QUEEN OF SHEBA WAS ONLY A MALAY LADY

New York, March 26—Alfred Aloysius Smith (Trader Horn), who, at the age of 75 left his peddling of pots and pans in South Africa to dictate a book which has been a best seller in this country for months, has a new slant on the Queen of Sheba, which he expects to put in his book.

The first beauty of her time was "only a Malay lady out of Madagascar," says the old African trader, fighter and explorer here to prove to a doubting America that such a person as the glamorous figure that stalks across the pages of Mrs. Ethelreda Lewis' book really exists.

He made his announcement at a tea given by the Literary Guild of America.

Found Proof of Story

"She was a Malay lady, but came out of Madagascar to make her mark on men and history," he said, "I got it from the natives. They knew all about her and told it to me straight. I found a good solid proof of it, and you can lay to that, on a totem pole later. Links up the old and new. You have to go to Peru, then to India and back to Africa to tie it all up, but it's there—heh-heh—it's there. I told John Galsworthy about it and John said 'Old man you've got it,' and I

have."

Then turning from the Queen of Sheba to Stanley, the African explorer, he said:

"I paddle my own canoe. I carry my own gun. I discovered more than Stanley did. Stanley discovered Livingstone, but he knew he was there all the time. Aye, he knew it."

Bitter Against Stanley

The old bewhiskered man, who resembles portraits of Walt Whitman and Longfellow, is very bitter against Stanley and suggests darkly that the fate of some of Stanley's white assistants was not entirely due to natural causes.

"That last 'un, that chap that was reported went over the falls. They say he did go over the falls." Then, squinting angrily, "maybe so—he could have. The natives would tell you what happened. I'm not pleased because he turned the Congo over to that song and dance artist, Leopold, anyhow."

Unembarrassed, as he stood knee deep in authors and literary critics at the tea, he showed scars on his arms and legs to prove the truth of some of his tales.

Went to Witch Doctors

"Rocks and spears, folks, rocks, and spears," he explained as he showed a leg scarred deep and ugly just below the knee. "The white doctors told me it was amputation, but I went to the witch doctors and here's my leg—the original."

The old soldier of fortune, who is averaging \$4,000 a week from his royalties, jingled a few coins in his pocket when queried as to his wealth.

"Do you know how much money I've got?" he asked. "All the money I've got now is two pounds, six," and he chuckled.





APPLE DUMPLINGS.

Temperature, 275 degrees; time three hours, or temperature, 400 degrees; time 40 minutes.

Two cups flour, four teaspoons baking powder, four tablespoons fat, two thirds cup milk, one teaspoon salt, six medium sized apples, six tablespoons sugar, six teaspoons butter, cinnamon. Mix flour, baking powder and salt, sift together. Cut in the fat, add the milk, and mix lightly to a soft dough that can be rolled. Roll out to about one fourth inch in thickness. Cut in squares about six inches and place one peeled and cored apple on each square. Add one tablespoon of sugar, one teaspoon of butter and a sprinkling of cinnamon to each apple and place in a buttered pan for three hours at 275 degrees. Serve with a lemon sauce.

CHOCOLATE MACAROONS

1 1-2 ounces chocolate, 1 small can of sweet condensed milk, 2 packages of cocoanut. Melt chocolate in top of double boiler and add condensed milk. When well mixed stir in the cocoanut and drop by spoonfuls onto a buttered baking sheet. Bake in a very slow oven until macaroons are firm. (About one half hour). The time for baking may be decreased if mixture is cooked for a short time in the double boiler.

ICE BOX COOKIES.

Three quarter cup butter, 2 cups brown sugar, 2 eggs, 1 cup nut meats, 1 teaspoonful baking powder, 1 teaspoonful salt, 2 1-2 cups flour. Cream the butter and sugar together and add the well beaten eggs. Sift the dry ingredients and add gradually to the first mixture. Add the nut meats and form into three rolls. Let stand in ice box until chilled. Slice and bake in a quick oven (450 degrees F.)

FUDGE SQUARES.

One quarter cup butter, 1 cup sugar, 2 beaten eggs, 1-4 teaspoonful salt, 1-3 cup pastry flour, 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1-2 cup walnut meats, 2 squares chocolate. Cream the butter and sugar together and add the melted chocolate. Stir in the remaining ingredients and mix well. Spread the mixture very thin in the bottom of a well greased pan and bake in slow oven for about 35 minutes. Cut in squares.

BAKED KISSES.

Two egg whites, 1 cup powdered sugar, 1 tablespoonful cocoa, 1-2 teaspoonful salt, 1 cup chopped nut meats, 1 cup finely cut dates. Beat the egg whites until very stiff and fold in the other ingredients and mix well. Drop from a teaspoon onto a greased baking sheet and bake at 325 F. until the kisses are dry.

RHODE ISLAND ORANGE PIE.

2 oranges
6 tablespoons sugar
Pinch salt
1 pint hot milk
4 tablespoons cornstarch
2 eggs (whites for meringue)
Baked pastry shell
Peel, seed and cut in small pieces the oranges. Combine dry ingredients, and add to oranges. Add hot milk and cook until thickened in top part of double boiler. Add slightly beaten yolks. Cook over hot water another three minutes. Let cool. Place in pastry shell. Cover with meringue made with whites and two tablespoons of sugar. Bake in an oven for 10 minutes of 300 degrees F.


