WOMAN SENATORS

The effort of Canadian women, headed by Her Honour Magistrate Emily Murphy of Calgary, to obtain the right to sit in the Canadian Upper House is now being directed through legal rather than political channels. It seems that the objections that stupid male politicians have made to woman's right to sit in the Senate are all centred on the contention that the term 'person' as used in the British North America Act does not mean female persons but only those persons of what was then recognized as the governing sex. The Supreme Court of Canada gave this interpretation and our progressive would-be Senators have carried the battle across the water in an appeal to the Privy Council of Great Britain. Coincidental with this they have launched a press campaign throughout Canada. From a central office in Toronto they are distributing to the newspapers of the country stories that very clearly set forth their side of the question. THE CATHEDRAL ANNIVERSARY

Seventy-five years ago today the clergy and laity of Christ Church Cathedral gathered together in their beautiful new church to observe in a fitting and solemn manner the consecration of that church. They were proud men and women for they had worked and sacrificed and on that day they saw a building of which they might well be proud. Christ Church Cathedral is known as one of the finest examples of Gothic architecture in this country. The nave is simple but majestic. There is a serenity about the whole that impresses one with a sense of the might and dignity of the Church and brings one's mind into an attitude of worship. But the greatness of the church is not so much in its material form—in its architecture—but rather in the men and women who laboured to create it and who have, since, laboured in it. This is an old community with some of the best ideals and traditions of our British ancestry. Perhaps these traditions have been more fostered by this old Anglican church than by any institution here. The high religious ideals for which the Church has stood may well be contemplated with pride by those who gather within its sacred precincts today to observe the seventy-fifth anniversary of its birth.
