NEW YORK AND CHICAGO CONFER ON MUTUAL GUNMEN PROBLEM

New York, Aug. 30—Gunmen and bootleggers' warfare figure in difference of opinion as to Chicago and New York.

The New York World printed a cartoon lampooning an offer by Chicago of a prize for a poster boosting its proposed world fair in 1933 and thereby started something.

The cartoon depicted a gunman leaning over the dome of an exhibition hall in the act of firing a pistol, the smoke from which formed the greeting: "Chicago welcomes you" another part of the cartoon showed a "British Empire exhibit" in flames while two gentlemen with sawed off shotguns exchanged musketry in the foreground.

Over the main hall waves a flag carrying the words: "100 Per Cent American—Thompson Hall."

The Chicago Daily News asked The World, "Will you state for publication whether this expresses the sentiment of the New York public regarding Chicago and its proposed world exposition?"

And The World replied: "The cartoon expresses only the view of the

artist, Will B. Johnstone, who is a Chicagoan by birth and who lived there many years."

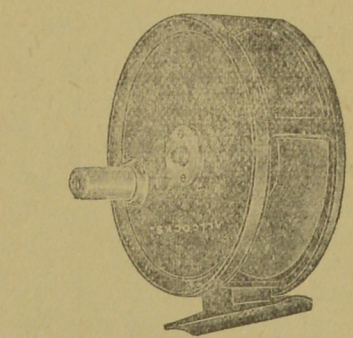
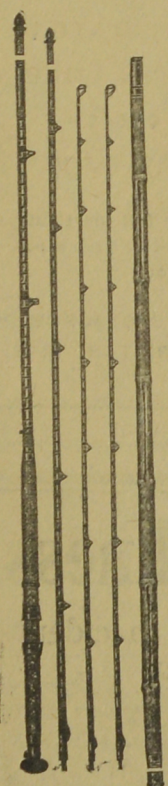
The World asked the Daily News for an article "on the public excitement in Chicago" aroused by the cartoon.

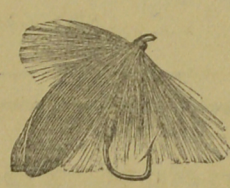

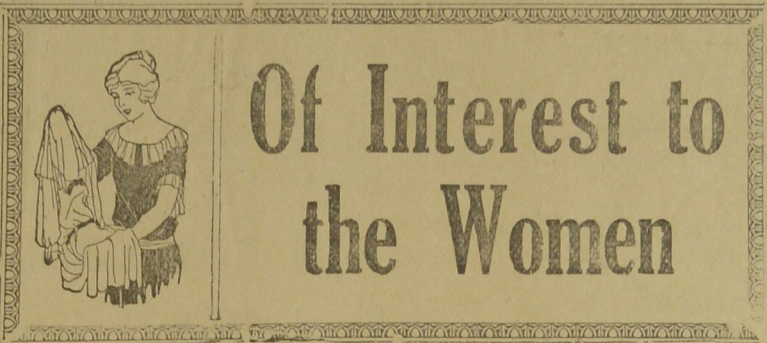

ROLLED WAFERS

Cream one fourth cupful of fat, add half a cupful of sugar gradually then one fourth cupful of milk drop by drop. Add seven eighths cupful of bread flour and half a teaspoonful of vanilla. Spread very thin on an oiled inverted baking sheet. Crease into four inch squares, sprinkle with half a cupful of chopped walnut meats and bake in a slow oven until a delicate brown. Cut the squares apart and while warm roll over the handle of a wooden spoon. If the squares become too brittle, warm them in the oven to soften them.

FRICASSED CHICKEN

Clean and draw a 4 1/4 to 4 pound chicken; cut the breast into four pieces; joint the thigh and wing; cut the back into pieces; put all into boiler with 1 onion cut; 1 tablespoon salt, a small piece of carrot and 1 quart of water; boil two hours or until tender; then add flour mixed with a little cold water and boil five minutes or until creamy. Serve on hot platter and sprinkle liberally with finely chopped parsley. It is very attractive when a border is made of the mashed potatoes and the chicken arranged in the centre.

MOLDED CHICKEN SALAD

2 cups picked chicken
1 cup finely cut celery
1 tablespoon green pepper
1 teaspoon grated onion
1 hard boiled egg
3 cups chicken stock
1 teaspoon granulated gelatin
Lettuce
Soak the gelatin in two table-spoons of cold water ten minutes; then dissolve in the hot stock; then add the remaining ingredients. Rinse custard cups with cold water put in chicken mixture; set in cold place until firm. Turn out on bed of shredded lettuce and garnish with stuffed olives cut into rings; put a spoonful of mayonnaise on top of each mold.

LEMON SYRUP

This is a good thing to have on hand at all times. Lemon syrup helps to bring out the flavor of the other syrups and it only buys a half dozen lemons and makes the syrup it takes less sugar and is always ready.
2 cups water
3 cups sugar
1 cup lemon juice
3 tablespoons grated lemon rind if desired
Put the sugar and water into saucepan, stir until dissolved, then boil 20 minutes; add the lemon juice and rind. Put into Mason jar or bottle. A tablespoon of this syrup added to a glass of cold water makes a very refreshing drink.

ICED TEA

Scald the tea the same as for hot tea; strength is a matter of taste, but always bear in mind that iced tea should be stronger than hot tea. Let the tea steep about five minutes, then drain from the leaves. Add one half lemon and sugar to taste while the tea is hot. When cold add more lemon and serve over finely cracked ice. Put a liberal slice of lemon on the side of the glass or on the plate beside the glass. A good way to change the flavor of the tea is to add one tablespoon of orange marmalade to the hot tea after straining.

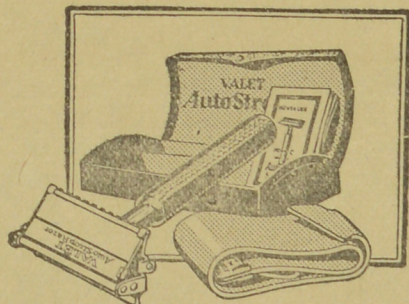
