RAIN, WIND, ELECTRICAL STORMS AND HAIL CAUSE SERIOUS DAMAGE TO WHEAT CROPS IN MAN. AND SASK.

Reports From Winnipeg and Other Prairie Cities
Shows Recent Weather Inclemencies —
Wrought Grave Destruction.

Winnipeg, July 26—Rain, wind and electrical storms have caused considerable property damage in several Manitoba and Saskatchewan districts during the past 36 hours.

Crop damage in Manitoba was of minor character, but in the southern sections of the province high winds played havoc with telegraph and telephone lines, breaking scores of poles, especially in the Emerson and Morris districts, and wrecked small farm buildings.

Storms of cyclonic proportions have swept several Saskatchewan areas, causing property and crop loss. At Plenty, Sask., many buildings were wrecked by the high winds and several struck by lightning. In North Battleford buildings were shifted from foundations while hail stones broke hundreds of windows. In Saskatoon the mounted police barracks was struck by lightning and several residences similarly damaged.

Heavy Crop Damage

Several of the districts escaped serious crop loss, but in Eagle Hill, Willowmore, Highgate, Tramping Lake and Unity sections heavy damage to grain stands was reported running from 10 to 75 per cent.

Just outside of North Battleford

hail was a foot deep on highways an hour after the storm.

RINK DEMOLISHED

Plenty, Sask., July 26—A terrific storm, accompanied by a cyclonic wind, a deluge of rain and a small amount of hail, struck this place Tuesday night. Striking here from the north, a trail of damage was left in the path of the storm. The Plenty rink was demolished and scattered over the countryside. Many other buildings were badly damaged and practically all outbuildings were blown down or destroyed. There was but little hail damage, but crops were flattened by wind and rain.

AREA HAILED OUT

Kerrobert, Sask., July 26—Partially all the Broad Acres district was hailed out in the course of a terrific storm that swept over that area Tuesday night. Hail fell for 45 minutes and, driven by a gale of wind, literally drove the wheat into the ground.

Two horses were killed when a barn blew over. Threshing machines, cars, barns and odd bits of machinery were damaged. It is also reported here that Tramping Lake district has been hailed out. Communication by telephone is impossible.

ALLEGED RUM PLOT PROBED

Montreal, July 26—Ramifications of a rum runner operating in Montreal are being probed by customs authorities following the arrest of William P. Cohen, wholesale fish merchant of this city, and the seizure from a freight car of 175 cases of beer consigned as fish to the United States. Cohen appeared before Judge Albert Marchmont today in police court on a charge of falsifying bills of lading. He pleaded not guilty to the accusation and was ordered to be held on bail pending his preliminary hearing, August 2.

The beer, seized by customs authorities was concealed among 75 cases of genuine fish, which was being shipped to the Utica Fish Company, Utica, N. Y., according to customs officials.

Preliminary Hearing

The preliminary hearing of the case took place this morning in the police court before Police Magistrate Limerick. Mrs. Hannah Styran was the informant, stating in her evidence that Mrs. Smith made no attempt to separate the two dogs, but seemed bent on punishing the dog belonging to Mrs. Styran and repeating "I'm going to beat your dog." In spite of all the informant's pleas of "You're beating me, not the dog" the informant declares Mrs. Smith kept on beating at her and the dog with a club which she held in her hands. The incident occurred on Victoria street in the yard and porch of Mrs. Smith's home. J. B. McNair was prosecuting attorney while P. J. Hughes, K. C. appeared for the defendant.

Evidence Sufficient.

After Mrs. Smith had elected to be tried by jury the preliminary hearing was gone into this morning. The evidence heard was deemed sufficient for a trial to be held. The evidence of the following was heard this morning; Dr. W. C. Crockett, who attended Mrs. Styran for her injured arm; Mrs. George Hodgson a neighbor; Mrs. Robert Stevenson another neighbor; Mrs. Hannah Styran the informant; and Mrs. George Bolden, daughter of the informant. All morning was taken up by the cross examination of both counsels.
