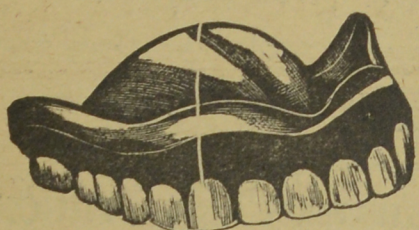

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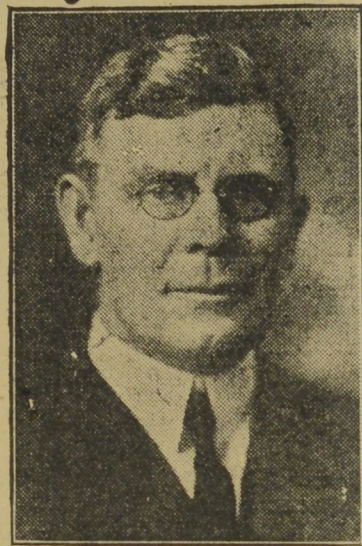
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LOCOMOTIVES OF ANCIENT VINTAGE PRESENTED TO THE PROVINCE OF NOVA SCOTIA

Halifax, N. S., June 21—Two famous old locomotives, the "Samson" and "Albion" among the first to operate on the North American continent, were presented to their native province today by John J. Cornwell, General Counsel of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company. The presentation ceremony conducted on the national day of this city, was held at the railway station, where a large number of people gathered to witness the event. Prominent railway men, civic, provincial and other officials were

present. The diminutive Samson and Albion were made more interesting by the presence of a huge locomotive, one of the latest type.

Mrs. Cornwell described the occasion as an emphasis of the cordial relations and kindly feeling existing between Canada and the United States.

"As an unofficial representative, a private citizen of the United States, I bring you a message of goodwill," he said.

Premier E. N. Rhodes accepted the gift on behalf of the province. Chief Justice Harris, presided in the absence of Lieutenant Governor J. C. Tory. John C. Fraser, of Pictou, engineer who originally drove one of the old engines was introduced during the ceremony.

The Samson was the first locomotive in Nova Scotia and the Albion followed soon after. Both were built in England, the Samson in 1838, and the Albion in 1854. They were both used for hauling coal in Pictou county. The Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company secured control of the two engines after their exhibition at the World Fair in Chicago in 1893. They were brought back to Nova Scotia last month.

Oldest in Canada

The Samson is the oldest of any Canadian engine in existence. It was built in England in 1838, and operated in the Pictou coal fields of Nova Scotia in 1839 and thereafter for many years. It was finally purchased for the Chicago World's Fair in 1893, thence went to the St. Louis World's Fair in 1904 and latterly was purchased by the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad for their museum of railway relics. By them it was returned to its former home today and received on behalf of the Nova Scotia people by Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Premier of Nova Scotia, and by him placed in the keeping of the Canadian National Railways and it will be kept in the new railway station in Halifax until such time as there will be erected in Halifax a suitable fireproof building to house the numerous valuable historic archives and relics of this province.

Accompanying the Samson was another locomotive of somewhat younger vintage, having been built in England in 1846. This one, the Albion, has been placed beside the Samson in the terminal station and both of them are the most unusual exhibits of the early days of railway locomotion that Canada today possesses.

The ceremonies of presentation were conducted in the presence of several thousand persons. The "exiles" had been placed in position with the train shed of the C. N. R. station and opposite to them a platform had been erected for the presentation exercises and for the specially invited guests of the government, among

them being John C. Fraser, Pictou county, who sixty years ago had been the engineer on the Samson; and other railway men of the past and present. Among them was C. W. Archibald, track master of the Canadian National, who in 1882 had accompanied the Samson to Chicago when it made the first of its journeys to foreign lands. It was then operated under its own steam. It was returned to the province and ten years later left for its long sojourn.

Accepts Custody

W. U. Appleton, General Manager of the Atlantic region of the Canadian National, accepting the custody of the locomotives, compared the Samson with the huge 6,100 locomotive of the National system which was brought into the station and placed near the ancient one. The draw pull bar of the Samson was about one thousand pounds where that of the greatest locomotive in the British Empire, the sixty one hundred of the National system, had a draw bar pull of seventy thousand pounds or seventy times that of its miniature.

In the absence of Hon. J. T. Tory, Lieut. Governor from the province, the administrator, Hon. Chief Justice Harris presided. The American vice-consul General Magnusson was among the speakers. The ceremony took place beneath the draped flags of the Empire and the Republic and as the American representative rose to speak the band played the Star Spangled Banner.

Among others present was S. L. Gibson, son-in-law of Hon. W. A. Black, who was the originator of the plan for having the engines returned. The two engines were sent back to Canada several weeks ago the Baltimore and Ohio bringing them to the frontier and from the frontier gateway the Canadian National had them taken over and brought free of charge to Halifax where they were refurbished and put into place.

TAX OFFICE ZEAL VEXES THE COLLECTOR

Paris, June 22—Too much eagerness to collect taxes may have cost France her prospects of being the European stamp center.

Collectors and experts of many nations gathered recently to organize and to consider opening a stamp "Bourse" or official trading market. At the opening session, government tax collectors, supported by police, descended on the congress and demanded proof that the stamp traders were paying the business turnover tax.

They found some victims, but the French delegates protested that the moral effect was to make foreign members feel Paris wouldn't be an easy place to do business. In London and Brussels, also contenders for the honor of being the European stamp market center, the business is not taxed.

INDIANS TAP PIPE TO GET GASOLINE

Farmington, N. M., June 22—Two Navajo braves called Breech Cloth and Flour Sack Packs did some original thinking when their motor car ran out of gasoline in the great open spaces.

A pipe line is near the roadway. The oil in it is crude, but near enough to gasoline for running a motor. The Indians tapped a hole in the pipe, filled their gasoline tank and drove on to their homes.

The Fire Menace.
