SIX KILLED AND ONE MISSING AS THE RESULT OF A CRASH ON THE WELLAND SHIP CANAL

St. Catharines, Ont., Aug. 1—Six persons were killed outright, one is missing, two others died in the construction hospital from injuries and probably three more will die, one in that institution and the others in the St. Catharines General Hospital, as a result of the crash to the bottom of Lock No. 6, of the Welland Ship Canal, at Thorold, just a few minutes before noon today, of a 400-ton section of a 750 steel gate, a portion of which was being hoisted into position by the two cranes.

Early versions of the affair to the effect that the boom of one crane had broken were this evening contradicted by some who witnessed the accident. They claim that nothing broke but

that the crane toppled over under the weight assigned to it.

It was the falling crane that brought death and injury to the riveters and iron workers. This huge piece of machinery toppled from the top of the lock wall and falling between the lock wall and the gate caused the east section of the gate to be torn from its fastenings, sending it to the bottom of the lock.

Falls 80 Feet

The majority of those killed were working within this section of the gate rivetting the section which crashed to the west section of the gate. It was just 10 minutes to lunch time when the crane holding the lower end of a 20-ton steel post which was being lowered into position tipped over. Two cranes were engaged in the operation of lowering the post into position in the gate. Those working about the crane which fell first saw it sway, then topple over and fall to the foot of the lock, a distance of 80 feet.

Mike Merkeley, engineer of the crane jumped and received severe injuries as did his fireman.

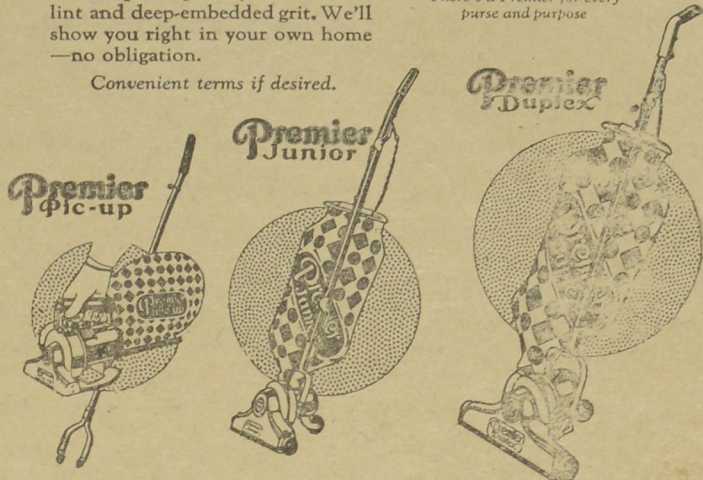

Cleveland, Aug. 2—"A one-track mind is the only one that leads to success," sentimentally observes Naomi Johnson, who has reached Ziegfeld stardom, and she says she has observed it many times in her own profession and others. So, to help along other girls trying to make a dent on the wall of Fate, she says: "Far too many girls lack grit and courage and are too easily discouraged."

Don't Get Discouraged

"There is just one way for women, as for men: Don't take the word 'NO' too literally. A girl starts out with high hopes and then is plunged into despair when she finds about a thousand other hopeful girls after the same job. This is a big mistake at first. She should honestly go over in her own mind her fitness for the place she sought and be square with herself—but not self-hostile—in criticism."

"Then when she locates her fault, it is up to her to correct it. The one thing that separates winners from losers is courage and determination to win by merit. "This silly superiority complex is not at all necessary; often it is a great liability. But the old four-leaved clover of success—grit, determination, fighting spirit and self-development are bound to win. Don't let any one tell you fairy stories, such as saying you are too tall, or too short, or too fat, or too lean. Just fit yourself for the individual quality and keep on your toes for the chance. Then grab it and hang on to it."
