MEMORY OF NURSE EDITH CAVELL HONORED BY LORD WILLINGDON AT JASPER PARK LODGE SUNDAY

Jasper Park Lodge, July 29—Far away from the old city of Norwich, where she lived as a child, far away from the war and from Brussels, where she died, in the midst of the Rocky Mountains of Canada, nurse Edith Cavell was honored yesterday afternoon. The citizens of the town of Jasper and the guests at Jasper Park Lodge held their fourth annual memorial service at the foot of the noble mountain peak which stands a monument to her deeds. Around the flagstaff which was planted on the moraine running down from the Angel Glacier they gathered, behind them the towering forms of Mount Cavell, snow-coated and ice-girt and the harsh Mount Sorrow, below the wide valley, the Green Lake and the river and about them the heavy sky. The chaplain of the Park, Rev. H. A. Edwards, who instituted the service and his white surpliced choir came in procession over the gravel ridge and the simple ceremony began with the singing of "The Rock of Ages." His Excellency the Governor-General, who was present, accompanied by Lady Willingdon, R. H. Knight, superintendent of the park, His Hon. T. A. Burrows, Lieutenant-Governor of Manitoba and Mrs. Burrows, and other guests at the Lodge, read the twenty-third psalm. Mrs. Edwards then offered prayer after which the congregation joined in singing "Nearer My God to Thee," led by Snape and the choir. As Sgt. Paton, of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police slowly lowered the flag, the bugler played the Last Post and not another sound was heard except the rush of the little

stream hurrying down into the valley. A shower of rain drops urged Mr. Edwards to eliminate his address and the last words of "God Save the King" had scarcely been sung when a flash of lightning sprang out of the sky over Mount Cavell, followed by a thunder clap—they seemed part of the service.

Jasper Park Lodge, Alta., July 30—Forsaking golf for the day, Their Excellencies, the Governor-General and Lady Willingdon, made the ascent yesterday of Signal Mountain, behind Jasper Park Lodge. The weather was without a blemish and from the summit they had a magnificent view of the surrounding country. Snow-covered mountain ranges pushed up all around them and the broad valleys were laced with rivers and jewelled with lakes of surpassing brilliance. With Their Excellencies rode Viscount Harding, R. Knight, superintendent of Jasper National Park, and his two daughters, James Thornton, son of Sir Henry Thornton, and R. Langford, supervising warden. The outing took a day with a stop for a delightful picnic lunch at the cabin near the top of the summit. Today Their Excellencies are again on the golf links. Sunday morning the Governor will attend services at St. Mary's Anglican church, after which they will lay the corner stone of the new building. In the afternoon he will take part in the Edith Cavell memorial service, which will be conducted at the foot of the glacier on the mountain peak which was named after the woman whose death made her heroic in English history.

11 A. M.—The elaborate street parade.

1 P. M.—Doors open for leisurely inspection of menagerie. Band concert 1 to 2 P. M.

2 P. M.—Afternoon performance concluding with a mammoth spectacle, with 700 people and 500 horses.

6 P. M.—Concert of popular and classical music played on world's largest steam piano, which can be heard for five miles without the use of radiophones.

7 P. M.—Doors opened to public. Inspection of menagerie. Band Concert augmented by J. H. Del Vecchio, master air calliologist of the world.

11 P. M.—Concerted night movement to circus trains.

12 P. M.—Departure of Circus trains for Woodstock.

Forest Conditions Good

Mr. Miller, who has been making a general inspection tour during the past two weeks in Restigouche, Northumberland, Gloucester and Kent counties, reports the forest conditions good and there is no immediate danger of fire outbreaks. The heavy rains of the past week are largely responsible for an optimistic outlook for the future.

New Tower

There is a possibility of several new towers being erected in the province some time soon. In his recent trip north, Mr. Miller spent some time in looking over sites for these towers in Gloucester and Kent counties.

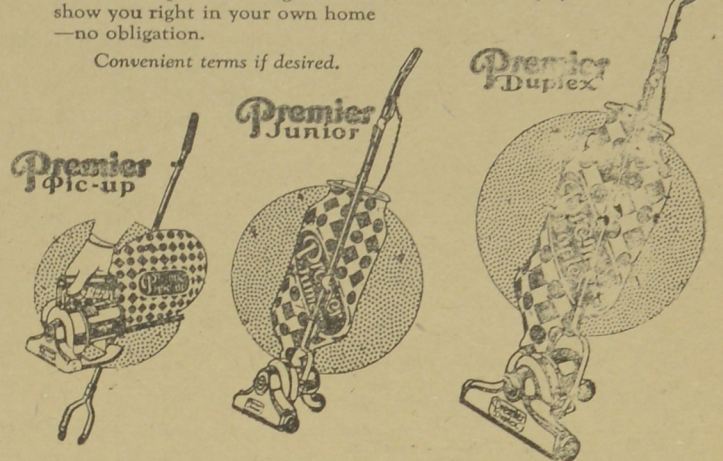

FINDINGS OF CONFERENCE ARE APPROVED

London, July 30—London press comment on the recommendations of the Imperial Wireless and Cable Conference, proposing an amalgamation of all the cables and wireless interests in the British Empire, has been so far almost unanimous in the approval.

The Daily Chronicle commends the recommendations in general but advocates a careful scrutiny of the details. Such questions as to whether the state is asking enough for the lucrative beam system or has a large enough representation on the board of directors, ought to be fully discussed, it says.

"Undoubtedly the best means of dealing with an anxious situation," the Daily Telegraph comments.

The Times says that the far sighted recommendations provide the right solution to what a short time ago was an apparently unsolvable problem. "Economically, they inaugurate a new era in the history of the empire communications; politically their unanimous character is a monument of imperial co-operation."

The Financial Times editorially says that in fashion alone lies a basis of permanent settlement.

The one exception to this chorus of editorial approval is the Daily Herald, the Labor paper, which stated that the report is nothing more than a series of surrenders to capitalism.

DECREASE SHOWN EXPORT RETURNS

The annual declared export return statement has been received from the American Vice Consul, Frederick C. Johnston of this city. This year's report shows a decrease of \$152,810.10 over last year's returns. The report is a statement showing quantities and values of declared exports from Fredericton to the United States of America during the quarter ended June 30, 1928 and a comparison with the preceding year. In 1927 the total value of export was \$496,395.64 while in the present year the value slumped to \$343,585.54. Lumber as usual was the biggest article of export.

Showers Yesterday

Heavy showers fell here yesterday between the hours of two and three o'clock. A shower in the afternoon a while after two o'clock cleared the air and following the shower which amounted to .35 inches of rain, the skies cleared and the rest of the day proved fine and clear, though a trifle windy. The total rainfall for the past week amounted to 2.96 inches. This is as much as has fallen during the entire summer previous to last Monday.

For summer use a northwest breeze is preferable.
